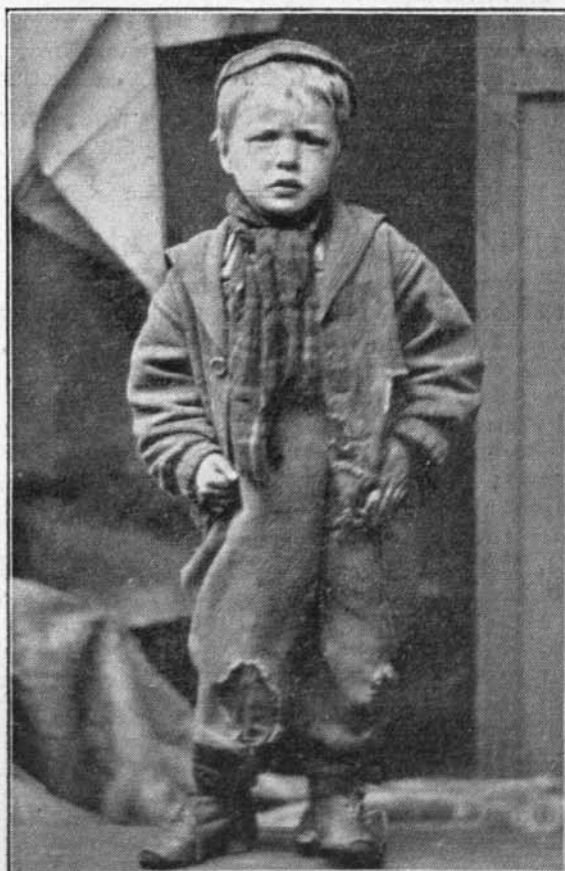

A statement of the accounts, duly audited by professional accountants, will be submitted at the annual public meeting, held each year in November.

STATEMENT ISSUED BY THE TRUSTEES IN NOVEMBER, 1903.

"At the date of Mr. Quarrier's death the trustees under the deed of constitution were Sir Thomas Glen Coats, Bart.; Sir Charles Cameron, Bart.; Mr. Robert Binnie, Ashford, Gourock; Mr. J. H. N. Graham, Larbert House; Mr. A. Cameron Corbett, M.P.; Mr. Forrester Paton, Alloa; Mr. W. A. Campbell, of Messrs. J. & W. Campbell & Co., Glasgow; Mr. R. A. Bryden, architect, Glasgow.

"These trustees all continue to act, and have arranged to assume, as additional trustees Sir Samuel Chisholm, Bart.; Mr. J. P. Maclay; Mr. David J. Findlay (Mr. Quarrier's son-in-law); and Mrs. Quarrier. Mr. J. P. Maclay has agreed to accept the position of honorary treasurer.

"In accordance with the desire of the late Mr. Quarrier, and with the cordial approval of the trustees, the management of the Homes will be carried on by Mrs. Quarrier and family on the same principle as in the past, and the trustees have appointed Mr. Bryden, Mr. Maclay, and Mr. Findlay as an advisory council, who will regularly report to them.

"The trustees do not propose to make any special appeal for subscriptions, as they consider that the system adopted by Mr. Quarrier of trusting to Divine Providence to provide for the maintenance of the Orphan Homes should be adhered to.

"The trustees hope that this statement will satisfy the many friends who have in the past supported the Homes by their subscriptions and donations, that no change will be made in the administration of this great and responsible trust, and they have no doubt the public will assist the trustees and the members of Mr. Quarrier's family by their contributions and Christian sympathy in maintaining and carrying on to its fullest extent the national work inaugurated by Mr. Quarrier and carried out by him with such remarkable success for more than a quarter of a century. The work of the Consumption Sanatoria will also be carried on without change."

N.B.—Since the death of Mrs. Quarrier the active management of the Homes is carried on by the Executive Council, which now consists of Miss Quarrier and Mrs. A. Quarrier Burgess, Pastor D. J. Findlay and Mr. J. P. Maclay.

NARRATIVE OF FACTS,

1907.

THE close of the thirty-sixth year of the Orphan Homes finds us with the same record to tell of God's faithfulness in supplying all the needs of the big family of children and of the Sanatoria and the Colony. We have, indeed, abundant reason for thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father who has graciously blessed and prospered the work beyond our highest expectations. The difficulties and disappointments which have met us and which are inseparable from every effort to help fallen humanity, seem to sink into insignificance in view of the countless mercies of our God, new not only every morning, but all the day long and every day of the year.

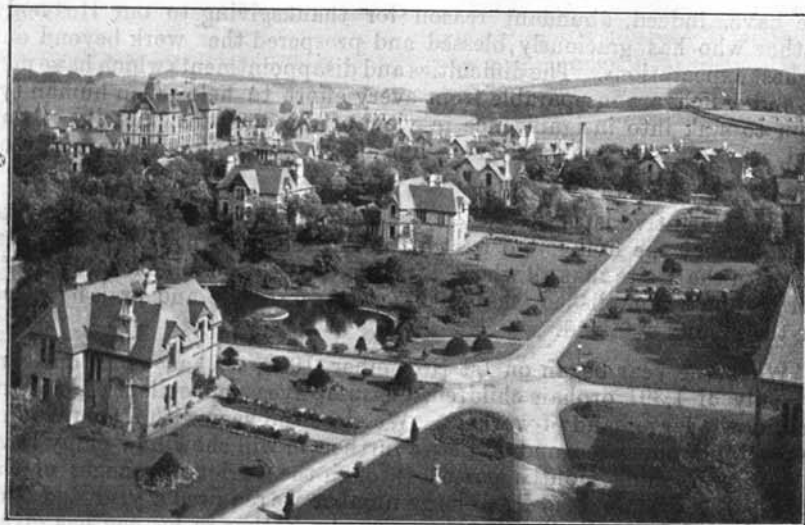
This Narrative is sent forth, not as an appeal, but as a testimony to the fact that the living God is still the Hearer and Answerer of prayer, and with the desire that all whose gifts have made it possible for this year's work to be accomplished, should join us in gratitude and praise to God for the results attained.

When the year began on 1st November, 1906, we had under our care a family of 1,391 orphan children, consumptives and epileptics, not including the large band of workers. We close the year with a company of 1,427 within our gates, and statistics further on will show how many have in the intervening months passed through the various branches of the work. For the support of this large number we required a year ago over £30,000, and from His limitless treasury our Father in heaven has given us His own good measure as will be seen from the following figures:—

Nor do these figures exhaust the sum of our receipts, for in addition there have been sent in large quantities of clothing of all kinds, tweed, flannel, boots, hats, provisions, bread, fruit, etc., all of which have been most welcome. We find it difficult to express the thanks we feel for the loving interest and sympathy of which these things are the expression, but the

Master knows and He will repay. Among all the bounties of the year, the electric lighting of the village, with good reason, has called forth special thanksgiving to God and gratitude to the two friends whose generous gift of £4,000 paid the cost. The new light has brought brightness to the Homes and streets of the children's city, besides lessening the risk of fire and lightening the labours of the workers. Another gift of £4,000 from "a sympathiser," was sent to build a second Home in the Colony for Epileptics, and plans have now been prepared and work begun, although it will probably be about a year before the house is ready for occupation. In the Sanatoria, the year has been marked by the opening of the third Block with its 40 beds for men and a smaller house for children with accommodation for 20. Under their own headings will be found fuller particulars regarding the Sanatoria and Colony.

In last year's Narrative we mentioned the need for a large addition to the School premises, and although no special donation has been sent to meet the cost, a number of legacies have been paid and will be used for that purpose, and so "in His own way" the Lord has provided for this want also.

We need hardly say that we constantly miss the beloved Father and Mother, and feel the blank their absence has made in the village life. For the fellow labourers who share with us the privilege and joy of this service for Christ's little ones, we are devoutly thankful, and they with us unitedly thank the friends known and unknown who have so generously ministered of their substance for the needy and suffering ones committed to our care.

In the year we have entered upon we expect even greater demands will be made upon our resources, and besides the current expenses of the

Homes, which amount to about £50 daily, or £18,000 per year, there will be required from £1,500 to £2,000 for emigration, £9,000 for the Sanatoria and Colony, besides special gifts for new buildings. We are longing for a covered-in gymnasium and swimming bath, which would be a valuable addition for the physical training of both boys and girls. Where it is to come from we know not, but believe God will move some heart to do this piece of service for the children. Great as our needs have been in the past the supplies have been greater still, and with renewed confidence in the Giver of all good we go forward.

The older friends of the Homes are familiar with the origin and progress of the work and with the principles under which it is carried on. It may, however, be well for the sake of those who have not read former reports to re-state some facts, and we cannot do better than quote from last year's narrative:—"In the year 1864, our beloved father, William Quarrier, began his public work among the street boys of Glasgow by the organisation of shoeblack and newsboys' brigades. Out of these developed the Orphan Homes, which to-day provide a Home and Christian training for 1,400 fatherless and orphan boys and girls of all ages. In the years between 1871, when the first Home was opened, and now, over 13,000 children have passed through the Homes, 5,000 of whom have been sent to Canada. Something like £670,000 have been received in voluntary gifts, of which £270,000 have been expended on buildings, land, etc., and £400,000 on the maintenance of the Homes and Sanatoria. The work is carried on in dependence upon God for daily supplies. No one is called on for money nor do we send out collectors, or resort to bazaars and entertainments to raise funds. The needs are committed to God in prayer, and we look to Him to move the hearts of His people to send all that is required. The aim of the Homes is to witness to God's faithfulness and to provide for the fatherless children of Scotland. No payment is necessary to secure admission. Any child in any part of Scotland, if fatherless and destitute, is eligible for admission, and friends knowing of such should apply to us at once and thus help to save the little ones from want and misery."

In the following pages we give notes of some of our gifts and letters received; also special items in the daily life at the Homes so that in this form as a history of the Homes they may be preserved, and also that our fellow labourers who read the record may be stimulated and cheered as we have been by the receipt of the gifts.

Nov. 1, 1906.—The gifts on the first day of our new financial year have always a special message of cheer to us as we think of our great family and its great needs. £9 4s. 6d. for the Homes and £2 for the Sanatoria have reached us to-day, and while the money is acceptable, equally so is the assurance that the donors pray for God's blessing to rest on our efforts. 1s. 6d. "with love and prayer" is from an unknown helper who often remembers us. Nov. 3.—From New Zealand a friend writes:—

I am so glad to send you a little money to help on the blessed work you are doing among the dear children. I count it a privilege to remember you and your large family at the throne of grace daily. Oh! may the Lord supply all your needs according

to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus. I was glad to see in your last year's report how the dear Lord had so wonderfully provided for all your needs. All praise and glory be to His dear Name. Oh! may the dear Lord give you grace and strength to do His blessed will every day is the prayer of your friend in Jesus.

From the same Colony comes a letter signed by eight boys:—

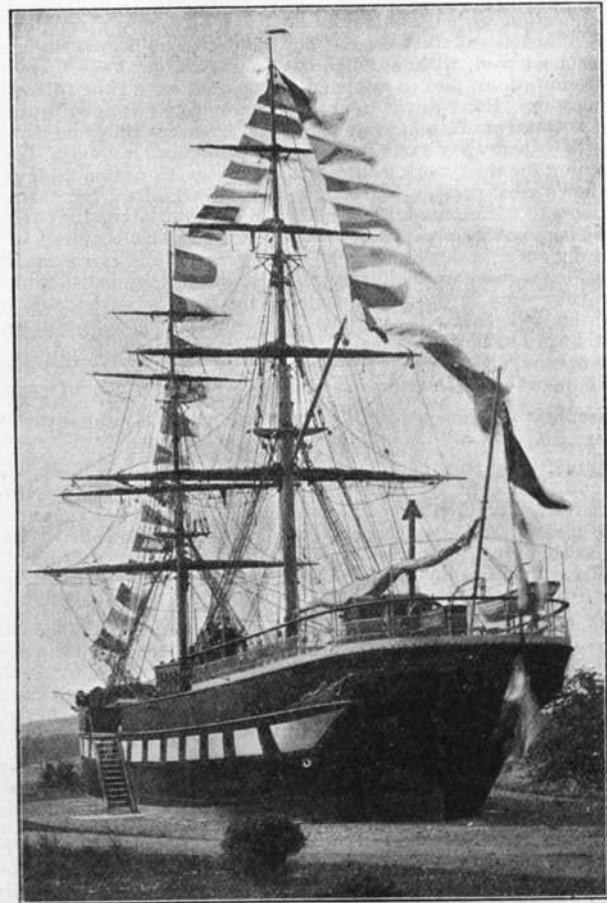
We, the boys of the Kaikiku School inclose in this the sum of £1 for the Orphan Homes of Scotland. The money is the proceeds of our school gardens during last summer. Trusting that our little gift will be of some use, and with sincere wishes for the welfare of the Homes.

Another helper in Manitoba says:—

Herewith find five dollars for the work of our gracious God under your hand. Use as you think best for Jesus' sake. Our hearts were burdened this afternoon until we mailed you. We only wish it a thousandfold larger sum.

A donor in Islay sends £1, and one near at hand £5, so from far-off lands and from many parts of our own country our Heavenly Father brings the supplies for the children's daily bread. Applications in behalf of needy little ones in Aberdeen, Dingwall, Edinburgh, Hawick, Alloa and other places have been made to us this week. A worker among poor children begs for the admission of a family of five. The parents are both in bad health and hardly ever sober. Needless to say, the children are very much neglected, and although the parents have been imprisoned for neglect, it has made no improvement in their conduct towards their children. Of another class are two orphan girls of eight and seven. They lost their mother a few years ago, and the father, a draper's assistant, has just died leaving only sufficient means to pay the funeral expenses. Half brothers and sisters cannot give the children a home and they are quite destitute. Besides these we have agreed to take a boy of eight whose father is dying, and two orphan boys from Edinburgh. Nov. 8.—Towards the support of our Invalid Girls' Home, £150. For over 20 years this house has been a means of blessing and healing to many a weary little sufferer, and the loving thoughtful kindness of the friends who built the Home, and who have long since gone from the scene of their earthly labour has been continued in the provision they left behind for the maintenance of the Home and its constantly changing families of invalids; One guinea from a Glasgow firm; £1 from a Woman's Guild; 10s. from "a poor disciple of the Lord Jesus who prays that you may be blessed in your labour of love"; £1 from an anonymous Glasgow donor, and 10s. from one who is sorry she is no longer able, because of failing sight, to send made up garments as she used to do. Nov. 12.—To-day brings us the fortnightly remembrances from A. G. N. and Alice, Willie and Jessie; also £2 "to help the meal poke," and 10s. from Forfar, the two latter anonymous. A Sabbath School in Edinburgh sends £3, and a legacy of £90 from Larbert has been paid. One of our boys, now on a Canadian farm, writes:—"Dear Friend, I write you a few lines to let you know that I am well, hoping you are the same. I am sending you ten dollars to help on the work. I will now draw to a close as I am in a hurry, Your loving friend." James is evidently better at working than writing letters, and we are glad to know from reports that he is much thought of by his employer, and is likely to become a successful farmer on his own account. Nov. 14.—Another of our old boys, now in London, who left the Homes sixteen years ago, writes:—"I can never repay the debt I owe to you, but I ask you to accept the enclosed £5 as a slight

expression of my gratitude." Such communications are most cheering, for not all return now, any more than in the days of our Master's stay upon earth, to give thanks. He knows when we need these bits of sunshine by the way, and He gives us from time to time to see something of the fruit of our labours. Nov. 21.—From an old worker, 2s.; a small Sabbath School in the Highlands, 5s.; from Bournemouth, £1; from Edinburgh, £2; from Shandon, £5; from a Scotch reader of *The Quiver*, £10; from

Maryhill, £1; and from one of our girls in a situation, 10s. She writes to say she has a Christian home and is herself a Christian, and also sends a good report of her brother who was also in the Homes. Nov. 29.—Yesterday the Annual Meeting of the Homes was held in Glasgow, and we were helped and encouraged by the presence and sympathy of the many friends who gathered with us. For those who were not present, the following account of the proceedings from *The Glasgow Herald* will be of interest:—

"The thirty-fifth annual meeting in connection with the Orphan Homes of

Scotland, the Consumption Sanatoria of Scotland, and the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, founded by the late Mr. William Quarrier, was held yesterday in the Christian Institute, Glasgow. There was a large attendance. The Hon. the Lord Provost, Mr. William Bilsland, presided, and among those present were Sir Samuel Chisholm, ex-Bailies Alexander Sinclair, J. P. Maclay, and James H. Dickson, Professor Ralph Stockman, Mr. Robert Binnie (Gourock), Pastor D. J. Findlay, Mr. Leonard Gow, Mr. W. A. Campbell, Rev. William Ruthven, and Drs. John Guy, A. W. Russell, and D. Fraser (Paisley).

"After praise and prayer by Rev. Mr. Hall, the chairman delivered an address. It was always, he said, a very great privilege to get into touch with the various organisations in connection with these Homes, and it was simply marvellous to note the great volume of beneficent work done. The children who passed through the Homes might for the most part, without some such organisation, have been left amid privations and temptations, and to a large extent would have gone to swell the volume of slum population. Many of them, no doubt, would have added to the work of the sanitary and hospital staffs, and even of the police force if they had survived the bad conditions of life where they came from. Instead of that, however, they received an excellent training for their work in life. It was no exaggeration to say that in these Homes they had a great national asset, for in them the children were trained to become worthy members of the community, whether at home or abroad. (Applause.) The work was not confined to orphans or to the young. They knew that the late Mr. Quarrier was a pioneer in dealing with the consumptive, and it was largely due to his enterprise and his earnest work that in that connection they in Glasgow were as far advanced as they were in providing some means for dealing effectively with those attacked by this fell disease. (Applause.) Progress in good work seemed always to be the watchword of those who managed the Homes. He knew of no philanthropic or charitable agency in Glasgow or the West of Scotland which called more loudly for the generous support of all who were in sympathy with such splendid work. (Applause.)

"The Financial Statement for the Orphan Homes was submitted by ex-Bailie Maclay.

"Sir Samuel Chisholm, in moving its adoption, said the income showed that £23,866 16s. 7d. had been received unsolicited during the year as donations and legacies. There was only one explanation for the largeness of this amount, and it was that the magnificent character of the work itself commended it to those who knew anything about it. (Applause.) With regard to the expenditure of £348 4s. 3d. for rates and taxes, he could not help saying that he thought the Orphan Homes were grossly overrated. (Applause.)

"Ex-Bailie Dickson seconded, and the report was adopted. The financial statements for the Consumption Sanatoria and the Colony for Epileptics were also submitted by Ex-Bailie Maclay, and these were moved and seconded by Professor Stockman and Dr. Russell, and Dr. Fraser and Mr. Campbell respectively, and adopted."

Two recent letters from a girl and boy across the ocean are as follows:—

DEAR FRIENDS,—It is with great pleasure that I sit down and write to you, although I don't write often. The dear Homes still remain fresh in my memory, and I will never forget the grand times I spent there. I suppose you are all looking forward to Hallowe'en. I spent Hallowe'en last year in Brockville Home, and wish I could spend it this year at Bridge-of-Weir. The children do look forward to it, because they get so many good things. I do not forget to pray for you, and that God may still help you to carry on the good work you are doing for the poor and needy. Hope I will be able to pay you back for what you have done for me and my little sisters. My little sisters in Canada are getting on splendid. They are now taking music lessons. My sister and I belong to the Y.W.C.A. and go every Sunday. Dear Mrs. Burges, I would like very much if you would send me a report book. I have a book I got off the Christmas Tree. It is a little volume about the Homes. I love to sit down and read that book. I have read it three times over, and would still enjoy it if I read it twelve times. It makes me feel so happy when I read about the Homes and the kind friends who are in them. I send my best regards.

DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—Just a word to let you know that I am keeping well, and I hope you are the same. I received your kind and welcome letter some time ago, and I am very, very sorry I did not answer your letter sooner. You will forgive me, I am sure you will. Dear Miss Quarrier, I am getting along first class at farming.

I can milk ten cows and drive two and three horses together. I can plough and mow hay with the two-horse mowing machine. I can chop wood, and I can shoot with a gun, and I can ride a bicycle, and I can do a lot of other things that I haven't got time to tell you of this time. Dear Miss Quarrier, when you answer this letter I would like you to give me all the news you can for I have not heard from home for a long time. I am in a nice home, and there is quite a lot of the boys around me that came out of the Homes, and I am not very lonely. I write to the boys, and they write to me, and so we are quite at home. I was very glad to hear that you had the electric light in the church and in Elim. I hope you will have it in the cottages. It will be a great delight to all I am sure. 31st October, Hallowe'en, the children will have a happy time on that night. I always enjoyed that night. Apples have not been so plentiful this year as what they were last year. But I think they will have all they want. I hope the children will all have a happy time.

Dec. 1.—From Kirkcaldy, £1, as a thankoffering for a dear wae baby daughter; 10s. from a doctor; 10s. from a Woman's Guild; 10s. from Mansfield; 10s. from Kintore; £1 from two sisters in Edinburgh; and £4 from Turriff are among to-day's gifts. The donor of the £4 writes:—"I am always glad to hear of your success in all your undertakings, as after the removal of the heads, many doubted, expecting there would be a falling off somewhere. So glad to find increase instead of decrease. It must be pleasing to all who are daily labouring among such a great family." The work is God's, and as long as there are fatherless children to be cared for so long may the Homes remain as a visible proof that the widow and orphan are His special care. Dec. 5.—We have received to-day £163 8s. 2d. for the Homes and £2 for the Sanatoria. £100 is from a new donor who writes:—"I had the privilege of going through the Homes one day this summer, and on seeing the bright and healthy surroundings of the children, it made me doubly sad to think of the miserable slums in which there are so many more left. I know that £100 cannot go far with you, but I leave it to you for any purpose it may be needed for. Kindly put it down as an anonymous contribution." The average cost of each child's maintenance in the Homes is £12 10s. per annum, so our friend's gift will provide for eight members of our family who have been rescued from such surroundings as he refers to. Dec. 13.—From Edinburgh, a friend sends the following letter:—

I enclose cheque for £4 10s. for behoof of your father and mother's Orphan Homes. What a blessing it is that his family are enabled to carry it on, so that he being dead yet speaketh, and truly his works do follow him.

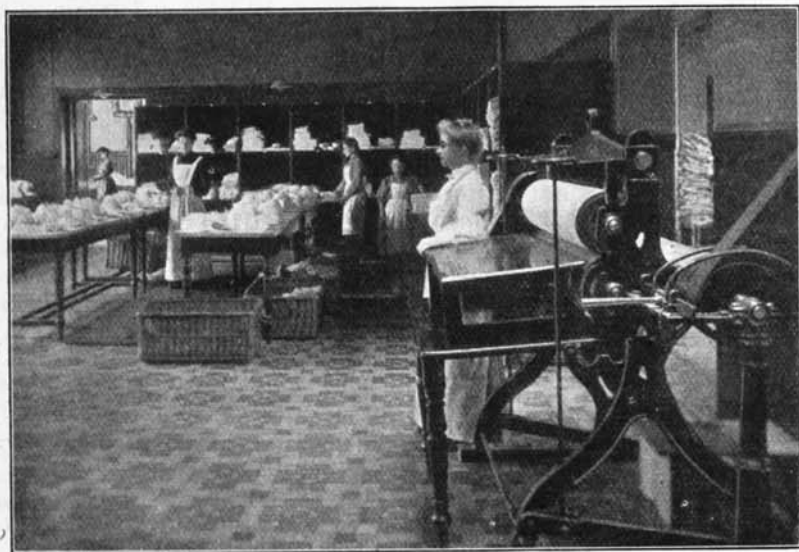
Your work is always associated in my mind with the love and admiration my dear old friend and nurse had for your father, and how she went on with her poor twisted fingers making little knitted jackets for his bairns, and how your father acknowledged her poor efforts as he might have done the Queen's. So wishing you and your family and your work all the best blessings for this life as well as for the future.

Another gift from the same city is £5, "a little Christmas offering to the Master." From Glasgow we have £20 for emigration; £1 without name from Govan; £15 from Dunfermline; and £2 from one of our old girls now in America. In her letter she says:—"You probably think I've forgotten you, but the reverse is the case. I always remember the great work at Bridge-of-Weir in my prayers. Thursday was 'Thanksgiving Day,' so I thought I had a great deal to be thankful for, and the mite enclosed is the result." One who has helped for many years writes:—

Thanks for sending me your report. I am really interested in your Homes, and so thankful you have a good balance. Long may it continue. Our loving Heavenly Father "is love," and He is almighty, so He will continue to supply all your needs

abundantly, and may you have much blessing in your own selves. You give your work and strength, and He gives as you require. I do wish I could send you a good big sum, but I have only a small income, but oh, I am thankful to have it. Enclosed is P.O. for 10s., and may it be blessed. You have a good large family to look after, and perhaps all of them are not so good and obedient as you wish, therefore try one's temper. May you have rich blessings in spiritual things as well as temporal this season.

We constantly feel our need of patience in our divinely appointed task of being in the place of parents to the boys and girls. It is frequently difficult to get them to realize that training is not letting them have a good time and their own way. We need wisdom from above, and abounding love and compassion to deal with the wayward ones who in many cases have never had a chance and do not appreciate the advantages that submission to discipline and control would bring to them. We pray and work that all may surrender to Jesus Christ, for He alone can

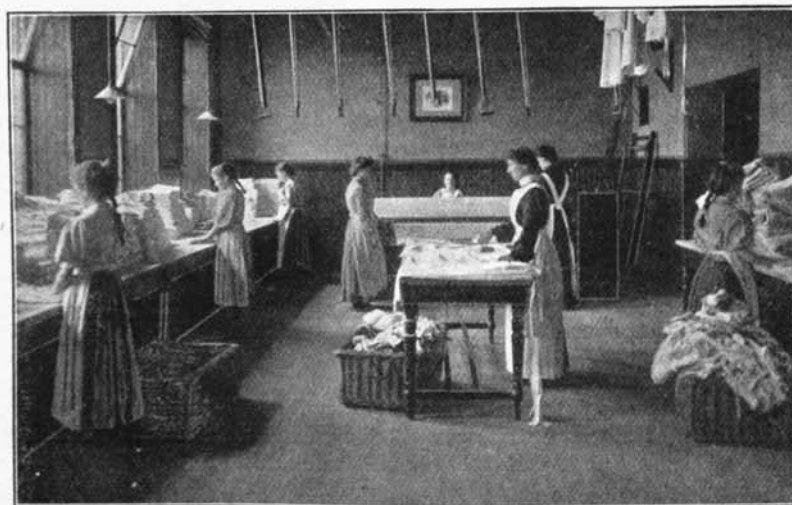


LAUNDRY RECEIVING AND SORTING ROOM.

change the heart and give the new life. Dec. 17.—From Duns, £1; from Dumbarton, 10s.; from a Highland Y.M.C.A., 7s.; from two Paisley friends "to help to provide the children's New Year treat," £1; from St. Andrews, £10; from Winchester, £4 10s.; from two children, 10s.; from New Zealand, £10; from Queensland, £1; from friends in Stornoway, £3 10s.; from a grateful patient and her mother, a thankoffering, £1; from an old "new helper," £5; from Pencaitland, £5 for the Sanatoria, and £5 for the Homes; from some warehouse girls in Hawick, £1 15s.; these with anonymous gifts of £5 from "one interested," and 4s. without any designation, have greatly cheered us to-day. The Christmas spirit is in the air, and during the past week we have had many tokens of it, not only in money gifts, but in the toys and sweets, clothing and provisions that have reached us from many quarters. The Apsley Place Sewing Meeting, as formerly, has sent a large donation of clothing and

toys, and from a Paisley friend who has frequently helped us in past years, we have 24 pairs of stockings, 36 pairs of combinations, and 36 shirts. One ton of flour from Ayr, and 1 ton of oatmeal from Montrose, also from old helpers, are specially welcome. We have great cause for rejoicing that so many friends continue without fail from year to year in their ministry of helpfulness. The grace of "going on" is manifested in their service, and all workers know how to appreciate such. A recent letter was a stanza composed entirely of the words, "Go on, go on," and the injunction became also a stimulus, because accompanied by a generous gift to help the "going." Dec. 25.—Among the many Christmas gifts to-day, none brought greater joy than the following letter with its accompanying £5:—

MY DEAR FRIEND MRS. BURGESS,—Many thanks for the papers, and also for the nice letter. I am kept pretty well posted from "Fairknowe," but I like to hear from Bridge-of-Weir occasionally, and often wish I could peep into Bethesda just to see some old faces I used to know. I never forget the kind friends there, and how faithfully I was nursed through sickness. Our dear friend Mrs. Quarrier who has gone home

would read to me every day. Probably if the many hundreds of us could speak in person at Bridge-of-Weir, all the Glasgow papers could not hold the thankful statements. There is only one thing that I regret, and that I would impress in the minds of all girls were I to speak to them, and that is, "Take advantage of all the education offered in the Home, for it will more than repay them in life outside of the Home." When the work got difficult at school I always tried to get out of it, and when I went out into the world for myself, then I thought of the good, kind friends and the school where one could learn so much. However, I went to work for ten dollars per month in the city near a school, and for 2½ dollars per month went to night school three evenings a week for two winters. In three years' time I saved enough to attend day school, Central Business College almost a year. I took a thorough business course, including shorthand and typewriting, but I always felt as though so much of my time in life had been wasted because I didn't take as much interest in the teachers at the Homes as they did in me. I believe your school and the Homes will fit anyone for any profession we wish to follow in life, if we would take advantage of all the many privileges offered while in the Home, but some of us never wake up till it is too late. I have nothing in my heart but thankfulness for what the good training did for me while at Bridge-of-Weir, although it did not impress me so at the

time, but there is no getting away from its memory. The future looks prosperous for us, though getting this world's goods, money, is slow. I had intended to at least have paid my fare to Canada before now; however, it is not forgotten, nor wont be, for when business adjusts itself satisfactorily, we may be able to afford more. Meantime I will inclose 25 dollars (made from my little vegetable garden), which I trust will help to make some little one happy. Though I have not sent money to the Home which I owe, yet I have striven to keep up a good record started in the Homes, for I must confess to you, even though it seems self praise, I have always been well liked wherever I worked and in my church connection. I think we can all do something even if it is only to be a credit to the Homes; that is something worth while. I am glad to hear of your prosperity in the work. Electric light will receive a royal welcome in the cottages I am sure. I will close these few lines, trusting you are all enjoying good health. Wishing you all a Merry Christmas, a Happy and Prosperous New Year, and that God may keep you well to see many more.

The gifts to-day amount in all to £276 for the Homes and £260 for the Sanatoria, and coming as unsolicited free-will offerings to the Lord, their value is much more than the mere figures shew. It is difficult to separate one from another, when all have their special message of encouragement and sympathy. Abundant provision has been sent for the special treats at the Sanatoria and Colony and Homes, and our hearts go out in gratitude to all who at this joyous season have remembered our family. Dec. 31.—Many hallowed memories crowd upon us at such a time as this while we pause at the threshold of a new year, and look back over the way we have come. Goodness and mercy have indeed followed us and the unfailing faithfulness of our God encourages us to go forward trustingly into the unknown days of 1907. May we experience the truth of Deut. 11 and 12, with which a donor has refreshed us to-day:—"The eyes of the Lord are always upon it from the beginning of the year even unto the end of the year."

Jan. 1, 1907.—This is the day of days to the children, and everyone in the village was astir early with bright and eager anticipation of all the delights in store for them. Gratitude fills our hearts for all the bounties that have come to us from those who have not eaten their morsel alone nor forgotten the fatherless. The children had a special breakfast, a real Christmas dinner with roast beef, turkey and plum pudding, and a bountiful tea with cakes, etc. The chief event took place in the church at 2 p.m., when the magnificent Christmas trees were dismantled, the boat's cargoes unloaded and the presents placed in the hands of the delighted little folk. If one could photograph the scene it might convey some idea of the gathering; but no picture could adequately portray the happy company. The day has also been a notable one in gifts, among which are £500 to pay one fourth of the outfit and passage to Canada of each of the 200 children we hope to send out this year; £200 from another donor also for emigration, with £200 for the Sanatoria and £50 for the Colony. From a junior clerk in Partick, 2s. 6d.; from the boys in one of the Homes, 15s.; from two workers, 30s.; from another, £1 10s.; from a grateful girl, £1; from two brothers of a girl helped, £1 4s.; "The Tenth," £1; proceeds from photographing, 10s.; three little girls, £1 10s.; an old helper sending £1, writes:—

"Your report for last year was simply glorious to me. How delighted and thankful I was to hear of the bountiful love of our Heavenly Father. What a number of earnest believers must be praying for the Homes. I also got the recent edition of your father's life. I cannot express my thoughts re same; I got seven more copies and gave them away. It is all so wonderful, wonderful to a poor believer like myself,

yet not wonderful to those who continually live under the sunshine of His presence. I am always praying for the Homes and will continue more than ever during 1907. Let us raise the good work higher and higher as a great mountain of rebuke against the awful unbelief of to-day."

Our sufficiency is of God. May He work in us to will and to do of His good pleasure.

Jan. 10.—Contributions from twenty Sabbath Schools, Bible Classes, C.E. Societies and meetings of various kinds in Edinburgh, Stornoway, Airdrie, Irvine, Galashiels, Leuchars, Montrose, Troon, Alexandria, Leith, Fraserburgh, Arbroath, Motherwell and Paisley are all tokens of the warm place the work among the children has in the hearts of other children. From Stirling we have a box of oranges, a much appreciated gift; from a Glasgow firm a quantity of bulbs for the gardens; from Largs a box containing 500 garments and useful things, welcome additions to fill up our store shelves which get emptied so quickly. A new friend in Edinburgh writes:—"I, a poor widow, had got this to help me and I thought I could spare it. The Lord is able to give me much more than this." He is indeed not only able but willing, and the giving that must have entailed much self-denial will not go unrewarded. Numerous applications on behalf of needy children have reached us this week. A minister asks help for a widow who has been left penniless with five children, the eldest not more than eight. We have agreed to take the three eldest, and with assistance from friends the mother will try to provide for the other two. We have also arranged to receive two orphan boys whose father has just died; a boy and girl 8 and 10 recently bereaved of both parents; a little boy six years of age who had been adopted, but through the death of his foster-father is now destitute; a little girl of 10, fatherless and worse than motherless, as the mother has been convicted of cruelty and the child has been sadly knocked about. We gladly receive all such and rejoice that there is no lack of funds to hinder us keeping the door open. The following letters from some of those who have been gathered in and are now across the ocean are specially cheering as we think of the past with its burden of misery and the present with its hopeful outlook.

DEAR MISS QUARRIE,—When I received your New Year letter for 1907 I almost wept with joy as I gazed upon the picture of faces and scenes once so familiar. It recalled memories of bygone days, and made me feel that it was but yesterday that I had been associated with you, and the thought came to me, "what have I done to repay you for all the kindness shewn to me," I who received special care and attention, and such as was the privilege of a very few. "Nothing," was the reply. To think that I have been cared for and remembered so faithfully from year to year, is more than my small nature can comprehend. However, I have made a solemn resolve that I shall endeavour henceforth to prove myself worthy for all your kindnesses and in some manner to reciprocate them. I am considering the advisability of paying a visit to my native land within the next year or so, but have not fixed the time definitely as yet, but I promise you that the O.H.S. will be the first place I shall visit.

Perhaps you would be interested in my doings since I left Bridge-of-Weir in 1896. I may say that I worked on a farm near Brockville for about two years, then attended public school, and then took a two years' course at High School. I afterwards moved to Ottawa where I worked with E. B. Eddy Co. I may say that I'm trying for a new appointment at the end of the month and with very good prospect of getting it. It will mean a larger salary and material advancement, though greater responsibility. On hearing from you I shall write you at greater length and give you more news. Wishing you all a most happy and prosperous year.

DEAR MISS QUARRIE,—I received your welcome letter. I was so pleased with the little books you sent me. I enjoyed the reading. I would have written to you

sooner only I had a sore throat, but it is all right now. I suppose the children had a lovely time at Hallowe'en. How I would have liked to have been there. I must now tell you about what I have learned since I came to Canada. Auntie and I have papered a large kitchen, and I have helped to paint Auntie's bedroom ceiling, and we are going to paper it now. I must tell you I can make butter, and we have packed 40 lbs. of butter, and Auntie wants from 75 lbs. to 100 lbs. for the winter. I wish you could see what we have in our cellar for the winter. You would be surprised. We are about to kill 55 turkeys for Christmas, so you see there's a lot to do; and we have got 11 pigs, and one of the little boys from the Homes stays in the same place where I am. He is a very nice little boy. Auntie thinks that there is not another little boy like him in Canada. We are having very cold weather just now. When you write give me all the news. I would like to hear all about how you are all getting along. I go to church and Sunday School both, and it is very nice.

DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—It is with the greatest of pleasure I now take up my pen to write a few lines to you in answer to your loving letter that you sent me some time ago. I am long in answering it, but although I do not write very often my thoughts wander back to the Homes. I cannot, when looking back to the place where I was fed and cared for, refrain from thinking how thankful I ought to be to my Heavenly Father and to you kind friends, although I did not quite realise it then, I do now. It gives me pleasure to read and hear about the Homes. It gives me a longing to do something to help on with the work, but it does not lie in my power except by prayer. We are having very cold weather just now; the snow has come in good time for Christmas. I don't suppose you will have much snow. I am sure you are having a very busy time just now, seeing it is so near the New Year. It don't take long to come round, but as I know it gives the children a great deal of pleasure when New Year comes. I think I will close now, as I have nothing more to say, and it is time I was in bed. With love to Mrs. Burges, and to all the kind folks at Bridge-of-Weir. Wishing you all a Merry Christmas and a bright and happy New Year.

DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—I received your New Year's Letter yesterday, and was very glad to hear how everything was getting along. I was very sorry to hear that Mr. Bryden was dead, and I am sure it will be a great loss to the Homes. I am sure the electric light will be a great convenience to the cottages. I was glad to hear that you were getting along so nicely with the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics. I am not in the same place that I was in last time I wrote you. I don't like this place as well as the other one, but my time is out 1st April, and I am going back to the old place. I was glad to hear of the two boys that sent a sum of money to shew their gratitude for the kindness received while in the Homes. I think I could guess the lad that sent the two dollars. I will only be too glad to send you a sum of money whenever an opportunity comes. I intend to bring my brother out in the spring, so it will keep me busy saving enough to bring him out. I see you are getting along nicely at the emigration work. Well, I am getting along nicely at farming, and am in the best health, hoping this letter will find you all the same. I will now draw this letter to a close. With my best wishes for you all to have a happy and prosperous year.

Jan. 25.—From Perth £50 for emigration. This will pay for the outfits and fares of five of the 100 boys we are planning and preparing for the outgoing of in March. Jan. 29.—One who annually remembers the work writes from the Western States of America:—"I have been away from Scotland for 15 years, but the Orphan Homes hold a very dear place in my heart. Wishing and praying for all the best of God's gifts for you." We sometimes wonder why it is that so few Scotsmen abroad covet the privilege of helping the destitute children of their native land. Not that we speak in respect of want, for what was lacking on their part God has, through others, supplied. An old helper writes from Canada:—"I met your father over 40 years ago on the steamer between Liverpool and Glasgow, and have corresponded with him ever since. I am glad to see you try to fill his place. Enclosed find cheque for ten dollars. Use it for the greatest need." Two barrels of apples from Edinburgh; 20 pairs of socks and 3 pairs of stockings from the same city; 12 pairs socks from Cupar Fife and 5 pairs and 6s. from an old helper, also in Cupar,

who reminds us that "Lo I am with you alway," is not only a promise but a fact, and the annual contribution of useful clothing, hats, provisions, etc., from the S.G.F.S. at Callander have been a real uplift to-day:

Feb. 4.—From a teacher, 10s.; from Orkney, 10s.; from London, £1; from a Leith Sabbath School, £1; from three little boys, 2s.; "In memory of little Winnie," £1. A Glasgow helper sending 10s. says:—"This is the widow's mite, but I trust some large hearted giver will have remembered you. I know they have." She did not know that the same day had brought us the promise of £4,000 to install the electric light in all the Homes of the village; but so it is, and many will rejoice with us that again our Heavenly Father has provided not only for the needs of the work, but has added His overflowing good measure in giving what might be called a luxury. We look forward with thankfulness and gratitude to next winter, when instead of having oil lamps, the Homes will be bright with the new light. Feb. 8.—From "Anonymous," £30 for the Colony of Mercy; for the Sanatoria, £6 10s.; for Emigration, £11; and for the Homes, £25 1s., of which 4s. was accompanied by the following letter:—

I am pleased to be able to enclose a P.O. 4s. towards the Homes, and praise the Lord for the privilege of a share in your glorious work. I should like to tell you the story of this donation. For some 20 years it has been my joy to tithe my income for the Lord's service, and He has kept and prospered me as He promised. Last week I was reading the Bristol Orphanage "Narrative," and was much struck by the self-denial of a working man who had forwarded £6 as the result of money earned for working overtime. I thought—I cannot earn any money this way, but I can tithe my own dress allowance per month; and as the Lord enables me I hope to do so and shall send it alternately to your work and to that at Bristol. 'Tis only a mite compared with your needs, but He sends it, so please accept and use it in His name, and His blessing will go with it.

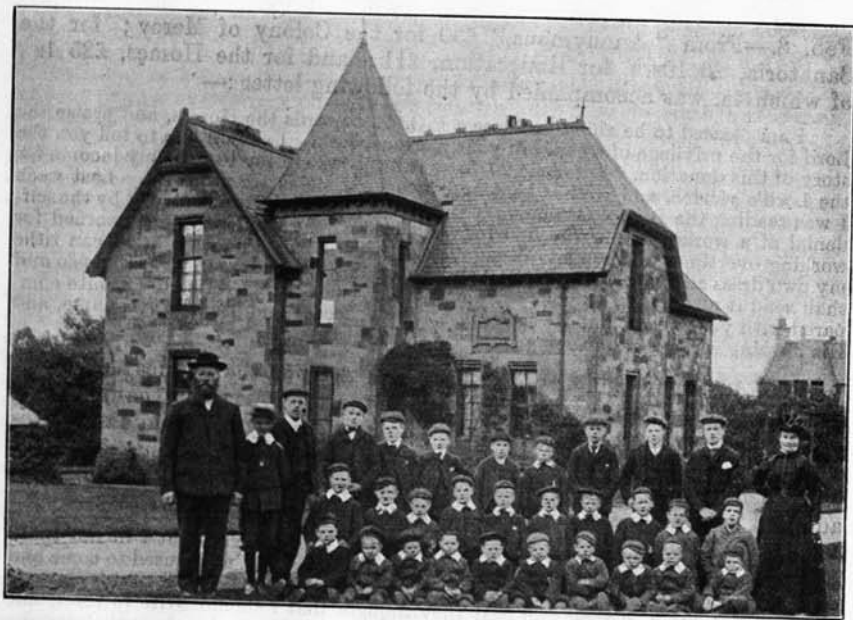
Feb. 12.—For Emigration, £100, with £10 for the Homes, cheers us in the midst of preparations for the boys' party. A family thankoffering of £3 which is sent annually, is added to this year by 5s. from a new subscriber, the little grandchild who has come to gladden the home, and is early being trained to be a helper of others. One of our girls who was adopted by a childless couple in Canada twelve years ago, writes:—

DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—I have addressed this letter to you, but I do not think that I remember you as I am more familiar with Mr. Burges, as he used to come and see me when I was small. We were talking over things the other day, that is Mamma and her relations, and they said that they thought that I should write to the Home and tell you all about myself, so you cannot say how glad I was when I got that permission, as I owe all mostly I have got to the Home. I have sorry news to tell you. My father died on the 25th of November after a year and a half of heart disease, and we sold the farm to a nephew of mamma's for eight thousand five hundred dollars to be paid in twelve years, so mamma and I are living quite alone. I go to the Academy, and I am in Grade III. Model. I have been taking violin lessons for nearly two years, and my term is nearly through, and then I intend to take painting lessons, if everything goes well with us here. Indeed I ought to be ashamed not to have written long ago; you must think me very ungrateful. I hope some day to come and visit at Bridge-of-Weir. Give my kind love to all at the Home that I have never acknowledged till now.

Feb. 18.—£1, "just a small sum to help on the great work of the Homes." The donor says:—"My thoughts are always going back to the day I visited your village last year, and the wonder of it all is with me still." The Lord has done wonderful things for us, and this evening we have a fresh token of His favour in a gift of £4,000 from "Sympathiser"

for an additional Home in the Colony of Mercy. We had been praying for this, and in a letter written to-day for the press mentioned the need, but before it appeared in print we had received the answer, and once more we are reminded that our Heavenly Father knows what things we have need of and moves hearts in His own time and way. £2 comes from a Missionary in China who says:—"I believe that one reason why your needs have been so abundantly supplied is that you continue to advance and push forward the different objects of mercy. God blesses every forward movement for the extension of His kingdom."

Thirty years ago on the 10th of February the first stone of the first Home in the Children's City was laid by Mrs. Stoddart of Port-Glasgow, who with her husband had given the money for the Home as a memorial of a beloved son. Only a few interested friends were present, and it was a day of small

things with great unknown possibilities wrapped up in it. The faith of the Founder laid hold on God for 10 Homes, and to-day there are 69. Truly we may say, what hath God wrought! We rejoice that this anniversary month has been marked by the special gifts of electric light for the Homes and the second Home in the Colony for Epileptics. We give here a picture of the Broadfield Home, where the first stone of the "Children's City" was laid thirty years ago. During that time hundreds of boys have been sheltered and cared for within its walls, and have been sent to Canada and different parts of this country, equipped in some measure for the battle of life.

March 4.—From "One who has known the Lord for many years and proved His goodness in numerous ways," £1; from a grateful girl, 10s.;

from one of our Canadian boys, £1; from a Sabbath School teacher who prays that God by His Holy Spirit may lead many of the children in the Homes to Himself. For this end we labour and pray, and when the harvest day comes there will be sheaves for the Master. March 7.—Among to-day's gifts which amount to £26 0s. 4d., are £20 from Greenock; 2s. without name; 25s., 10s., and 5s. from three Sabbath Schools; 15s. from York; 10s. from Coatbridge; £3 10s., "the value of a pig that was out in a snow storm for two days and ought to have died but came home all right, so the donation." March 13.—A Glasgow friend who has moved to San Francisco sends ten dollars, doubling his usual gift as "he failed to send a donation last year;" £20 5s. for emigration comes through a friend who has for many years interested others in this branch of the work. These with £5 from Hawick and £1 from Whitley make up to-day's total.

March 30.—Much of our time and energy this month have been expended in preparing the party of 100 boys who left us to-day for Canada under the care of our Superintendent, Mr. M'Fadzean. They are the children of many prayers, and go out, we believe, desiring to serve God in the new land whither so many of their companions have preceded them. We will not soon forget the farewell meeting in which God's presence was manifestly felt, as decisions were made we trust for eternity. Among recent letters from children who went out in former years are the following:—

DEAR MISS QUARRIER AND MRS. BURGESS,—I write to let you know that I received the New Year's Letter from Mr. Burgess, and was very glad when I read it to see that everything was going on all right at the Homes. There was one thing I felt very sorry about, and that was the death of our friend Mr. Bryden, but we know that God buries His workers and carries on His work. I enjoyed my Christmas dinner splendidly. We had plum pudding and goose. It made me think of the happy times I had spent at the Homes in which I had been for seven years. I will have to tell you something about the farm I am working on. It consists of three hundred acres, and we have 25 head of cattle, 20 sheep, 7 pigs, 4 horses, about 50 hens, etc. I don't think I have much more to say at present, and as you read the letter you will see as your letter says, "I am a very poor correspondent," so I will close by showing you a little of my gratitude by sending you the enclosed 5 dollars for your kindness to me while in the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir.

DEAR FRIENDS,—I suppose you are wondering at me not answering your welcome letter I received in the summer. I am sorry, but it seems as if I had really no time. I suppose the weather there is not half so bad as it is here. We have a terrible snow fall here at the present time. I don't know as I told you it is a farm I am on, so I will tell you now. I am kept busy all the time. We have not a very large farm, so we only keep 8 cows. I attend school every day. I have to get up and milk three cows every morning, and then come in and get my breakfast, then get ready for school as quick as possible, and get there by 9 o'clock. But it is not quite so bad as I drive to school. When I come home at night I am simply nearly frozen, and thankful to find a hot supper awaiting for me. Then as soon as I get my tea I get my lessons learned. Sometimes it takes me until late to get done, so I tell you it is pretty hard for me. I suppose there are quite a number of new girls entered the Homes now to fill up the vacant places of the girls which came to Canada. I am ever so thankful that I have been placed into a Christian home. I am not so very lonesome, as I have a great many of the Home girls all living around me. We have a little baby girl where I am staying. She is only going into her third year. She is awful mischievous, always getting into some mischief or other, but still she is a terrible good young one. Now, Miss Quarrier, please answer this letter as soon as possible. Now I guess I will close, as it is getting pretty late.

DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—Just a few lines to let you know that I am keeping well

and hope you are all the same. We are having splendid weather out here for this time of the year, and I hope it will be a winter like last year. I suppose you are having the winter now or will soon have. I suppose you are all busy preparing for Christmas like ourselves. I have not seen better 'Xmas trees than the ones at Bridge-of-Weir. I suppose Mr. Robertson is busy with his singing boys and girls. If they sing as well as they did when I was in the singing they will be all right. The Christmas Tree I was at was nothing like the one at Bridge-of-Weir. The singing was not very good, and we had not very much of it, but they did their best. I remember as though it were to-day the last Christmas tree that I was at. It was fine to hear the boys and girls asking for each other to let them see what they got. I could have sat in the church all night, and heard the boys and girls sing. How are Mr. and Mrs. Findlay keeping and Mrs. Burges? How are you getting on with the work? I now think of the presents you gave me while I was in the Home, and it is my duty to give you one now, and you will find enclosed two dollars for your Christmas present. Dear Miss Quarrier, I would like very much if you could send me a Hymn Book and a Leaflet of Mr. Mackeith's Choruses, and I will send the money on for them if you can send them.

April 8.—Yesterday there passed away in Bethesda Home, Mrs. Duncan, our oldest helper in years and in length of service. Twenty-eight years ago she came to Cessnock Home to assist with sewing and nursing, and many of the boys and girls will remember her care of them in sickness. Now in her 82nd year she rests from her labours. April 9.—The donations to-day only amount to £3 7s. 6d. Among yesterday's were 4s. 6d. from a grateful girl; 5s. from a working man, and 10s., "the widow's mite with gratitude for God's goodness." April 12.—From a Greenock Sabbath School, £2 2s.; In memoriam, 10s.; a Minister's Bible Class in Maryhill, 30s.; another in Laurencekirk, 10s. 2d.; a father sends 7s. along with 3s. from his son, his first week's pay. One of our girls visiting her old home, brought 6s. April 20.—For the second time this month death has come into the village, and we mourn the loss of our helper, Miss Fergus, who for nearly three years was "Mother" in the James Wilson Home. We had hoped she would be spared for many years longer to work for the Master, but He saw otherwise, and to-day she fell asleep after months of weakness and suffering.

May 1.—The last few weeks there have come to us many welcome gifts of clothing, the output of the winter's work of various gatherings of young people, for all of which we are most grateful. Among to-day's letters is the following:—

It was my late father's desire that as far as possible I should continue to sympathize with the good works he assisted when alive. I notice he was in the habit of sending towards your Homes £100 per annum. I now enclose cheque for this amount, and shall continue to do so as long as it is possible.

This gift, with £5 14s., provides for to-day's needs. For the Sanatoria there is only £1 5s. The work there is expanding and the third block is now ready. We long to be able to open the door to every sufferer without question as to money payment, but so far the way is not clear for that. One of our old girls sends a message of cheer:—

DEAR MRS. BURGESS.—My thoughts are specially with you all at this time, thinking how very soon another party of girls will be leaving. But, what seems to make me so grateful is the fact that year in and year out your labour for God goes on just the same. Only recently I once again read with reverence the life of your dear father and our beloved friend. The older I get my heart melts when I think of the kindness I have received from you all, and yet it is God's love that prompts you to care for those who are left alone in the world. I will remember you in prayer, but how blessed to realise that your care is God's care.

MAY 7.—Yesterday's donations amounted to £4 9s 6d for the Homes and £1 13s 6d for the Sanatoria, but in addition we received £250 towards the building fund for the new addition to the School. To-day £7 4s has come for the Homes, and £1 for emigration; a Glasgow firm has sent a welcome gift of 72 jars of jam; a ladies' work party at Roseneath 53 useful garments; a frequent helper 10s and seven garments and two Bibles; and a baker has sent six dozen loaves.

MAY 15.—£9 16s for the Homes, and £2 7s 6d, the proceeds of sweets sold, for the Sanatoria, have reached us from various quarters to-day, including £4 10s from a family circle; also a legacy of £100 from one who in her lifetime remembered the Homes frequently with small donations, and another legacy of £180 from the trust estate of a gentleman whose name was unknown to us and of whose interest in the Homes we were not aware until the lawyers sent the notice of the legacy. The money is specially acceptable at present in view of the new addition to the school now being built.

MAY 16.—An anonymous gift of £55 called forth thanksgiving this morning, as we have been looking to the Lord for the money to provide the outfits and passages of the 80 girls we are sending to Canada in June. We cannot personally thank the donor of this sum, and there are many other friends who minister to our needs not letting their left hand know what their right hand does.

MAY 20.—From Elgin £7; from Dumbarton, £1; from a Bathgate Sabbath School, £4 10s; from Brechin, £5; from "Inasmuch," 5s; from our fortnightly helper, A. G. N., 5s; paid into our bank account, £5; from Giffnock, £3, and the following letter with 17 useful garments have found their way to us to-day.

Just a few things to help to clothe the Orphans under your charge. Glad always to hear the good tidings of our Heavenly Father's help to those that trust Him; and how He year in and year out puts it into the hearts of His children to aid and give of their means towards your great object. What a cheer, and how it will strengthen your faith more and more in these covenant promises in His word. May it ever continue to the end when all shall get His blessed approval who have been faithful, and those on whom the Master may depend.

This week a Y.W.C.A. has forwarded 102 garments made by the members, and in her letter the secretary says, "I know that much prayer has gone up during the doing of the work. I earnestly trust you are being much helped and that strength is given you for your arduous duties. I sometimes think it must be a matter of the dear Lord carrying both you and your burden. The Lord has put a great honour upon you in entrusting such a great and glorious work to your care." We are deeply conscious of our own weakness and insufficiency, and value very highly the blessed heritage of work to which we have succeeded in the providence of God. May He keep our hearts tender and full of sympathy and love toward those He gives us the privilege of ministering to in His name. Among the number recently added to our family are the following:—Four children, 11, 9, 7, and 3. Father a miner, was killed 18 months ago, and the mother with the insurance money started a small business which proved unsuccessful. She is left with an infant whom she hopes to maintain by her

own efforts, while the four are provided for in the Homes. Two boys, 10 and 8, and their sister, 7, taken at the request of their mother who died a week ago after a long illness in consumption. A younger child, at present in hospital with bone disease, is to be admitted also. The father, a railway surfaceman, died in 1904, and friends have been kind to the widow and her helpless family, but now that she is gone the children are homeless. An older boy has phthisis, and has been admitted to the Sanatoria, where it is hoped his health will be restored. Two little girls, 9 and 6; mother was found dead sitting in her room last February;

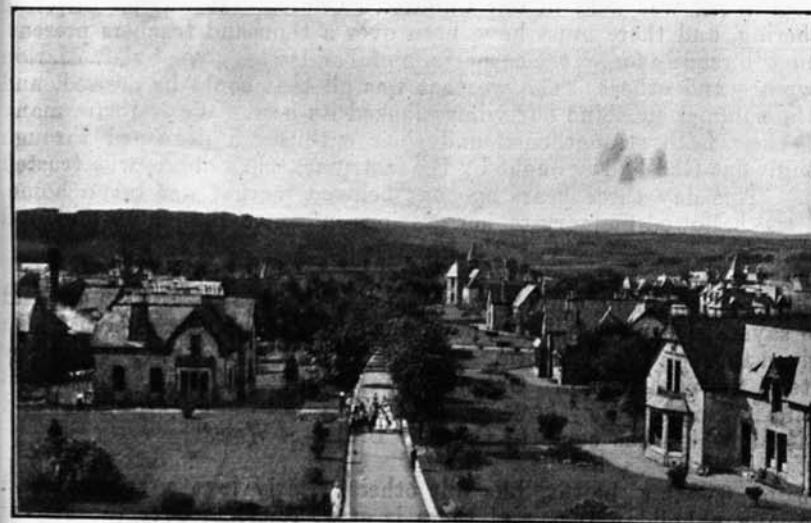
the father, an invalid in the poorhouse and totally unfit to have the care of the children. A boy and girl, 12 and 8; mother died two years ago, and the father had to be removed to a hospital for the insane last week. Three boys, 11, 9 and 6; mother a respectable Christian woman has had a hard struggle; friends have promised to help her with the three younger children, and now that the boys are provided for she hopes to earn her own living. Three children, 11, 9 and 7; father died of pneumonia in 1904; the mother married again, but not to her profit, as the man neither works for her or the children, and she has three others to support.

JUNE 8.—To-day we said good-bye to 80 of our girls who sailed on the Allan Line *Sicilian* for Canada, in charge of Mrs. Roberts, who has crossed the ocean with previous parties, and Mr. and Mrs. Simpson, our helpers in "Killearn Home," who go for the first time. All the money required for the outfits and passages of the whole party has come in, and in this we see again God's guiding hand in the special provision made.

JUNE 20.—From Canada ten dollars. The donor says, "I intended to have sent it a month ago, but lost your address and happened to find a letter from you a day or two ago. I pray God's blessing on you in the work in which you are engaged, and that He may give you grace and wisdom to conduct it to His glory."

JUNE 21.—The following letters speak for themselves:—

I enclose order for 15s 9d for your great work—from my wife and myself 10s,

and 5s 9d from our little girl, Evelyn Mary, who came and placed that sum in my hands yesterday morning, and asked me to "send it to Quarrier." It was made up of money she had got on her birthday last Sunday, and pennies that she has been gathering up for a long time; and this action was quite voluntary on her part, and we were pleased with it all the more on that account. We ourselves, as you know, are old subscribers, and it was very pleasant to find our little one manifesting in such a practical way her interest in your work.

My small daughter has been most interested in reading of your Homes, and had much pleasure in sending her "very own" letter and money. Enclosed please find £1 as my small contribution. Our little helper writes, "I got a present of money, and I want to send some to you."

The gifts of children are peculiarly helpful in the present and hopeful for the future, and those just mentioned are typical of many that are sent to us. This week a parcel containing 25 warm garments has reached us from a mission school in China, where one of our old workers is labouring

for the Master. We are accustomed to think of China as our foreign mission field to which our gifts should go, but here we have those who were only a short time ago heathen, now practising the "things that accompany salvation" and ministering to the fatherless in Christian Scotland. A friend who helps and gets others to share the privilege with her writes—

I have sent away a box with 52 articles of clothing for the children. I have a few young folks come about me at nights, and I supplied the cloth and they sewed very willingly, and others I got to knit the stockings and socks. One neighbour gave me two pairs of her own knitting; another neighbour knitted the shawl, and so I interested a few in the Homes that did not know anything about them. I will if spared send another box later on. I would like very much to come and see the Homes, and bring some friends with me. I am more than pleased to get these things for the Homes than if I had been getting something myself. It has been a pleasure to me to cut and sew and knit. I trust you will always get what your large family needs.

JUNE 22.—This afternoon, under the auspices of the Paisley Sabbath School Union, the fourth annual West Renfrewshire conference on Sabbath School Work was held in our Children's Church. It was an inspiring gathering, and there must have been over a thousand teachers present. None will readily forget the earnest, helpful addresses given by Mr. Marion Lawrence and others. The weather was all that could be desired, and in the summer sunshine our village looked its best. We feel sure many had their faith strengthened and their enthusiasm deepened through seeing what God had wrought by the instrumentality of one who trusted Him. This day three years ago our beloved mother was taken home, and the hallowed memory of her gracious influence lifts us upward and Godward.

JUNE 28.—Among our correspondence to-day is a letter from a friend who says, "I cannot tell you how much we appreciate the help which is given through the Sanatoria. We are grateful, and I need not say how grateful the patients are. One and another have called upon me to tell of all the kindness they have received, and of all the help, physical and spiritual, which has come to them at Bridge-of-Weir."

JULY 6.—Our bairns, like all others, dearly love a holiday, and especially a holiday trip, and there is great rejoicing over the arrival to-day of a gift of £150 from "anonymous donor" to provide for the annual outing to the seaside. In addition to this special gift we have £20 from a Glasgow firm; £1 from a Tollcross Sabbath School; £1 from a frequent helper in Scotstoun, and 5s for the epileptics. One of our Canadian girls writes—

DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—I received your last letter, and I liked the little books very much. I often think of the good old times we used to have at Bridge-of-Weir. We used to have many a happy afternoon in the park. On the first Saturday of May I was thinking of old times, of the happy days we spent in the park on May day. It will soon be summer holidays again. The weather here is still very cold, but it will be pretty warm when summer does come. I told you before that I was living on a farm, and we have some little lambs. I remember when we went for walks on Saturday afternoons how we used to like to see the little lambs playing in the fields. We have a lot of little chicks, and we have also some tame rabbits. We have two old rabbits and seven little ones. The little ones are very nice, but we do not see them very often, because if they think we are watching them they will run away. We had a picnic on the 24th of May. I suppose it would be a holiday at Bridge-of-Weir too. I think this is all at present.

JULY 15.—One who has had a prosperous year in business doubles his contribution and sends £10. "Inasmuch" sends 10s; I.M.B., an unknown friend, £5; and a Coatbridge Sabbath School provides £1 7s 6d for the Sanatoria, and £1 5s for the Homes. While one helper rejoices in prosperity an opposite experience is the lot of the writer of the following letter:—

DEAR FRIENDS,—I regret very much that through a heavy financial loss I have not been able to send my usual contribution for the benefit of the Lord's cause through your much honoured Homes. Should our ever Loving Father see it to be well that I should again be in circumstances that I can send you a little I shall certainly cheerfully do so.

Our sympathies go out to her, believing as we do that inability to give is a sore trial to one who has hitherto been a succourer of many. God will perfect that which concerns her, and in His own good time.

JULY 30.—A letter to-day reads, "I am soon going off for a holiday, and always like before doing so to send something for the bairns, so enclose

£1. £2 comes from an aged friend now in her 87th year. Her son, who forwards the gift, mentions in his letter, "I saw off to Canada on Saturday, Mrs. M'C. and her daughter going to join her son who went out from your Homes about 16 years ago and is now married. He has a small farm and seems to be getting on well." Quite a number of our boys and girls have been able to help mothers and other relatives out to Canada, and while in some cases their efforts have resulted disastrously because of the drinking habits of the parent, in others it has meant a happy, comfortable provision for the one helped.

AUGUST 1.—From Paisley S.S. Union, £25, "trusting that as hitherto the blessing of God may richly rest upon you." A friend at the Gareloch writes—

In these summer days, when most people are enjoying holiday and change, I have often been thinking of your large "family," or rather collection of families.

But "thinking" won't do [much good, unless it turns into something practical! So please accept the enclosed P.O. for 20s, and use it for whatever department of the Homes there is most need of support just now. It is a grand work, and we are always interested in it. Wishing you continued and even increased blessing on all you and your helpers are doing for the bairns and for the sick folk.

A grateful mother whose children have been with us for some years writes—

As I have got an appointment with sufficient income to keep my family, will you please arrange for me to have them? I cannot express to you how grateful I am for the help it has been to me to have them at the Homes all these years, and feel sorry I have not been able to give as I would have wished to, but mean to have a little collection box in which to put all our spare pennies and send them to you occasionally, and I am sure as they grow up they will understand and appreciate what has been done for them as much as I do.

AUGUST 2.—Through the generous gift already referred to we were able to arrange for the girls' excursion to the coast to-day. The weather was somewhat showery, but not sufficient to interfere with the enjoyment of the 600 who journeyed by brake and cart to Kilmacolm, from thence by rail to Greenock, and then by steamer to Troon. Happy hours were spent on the shore, and meals were provided in a hall secured for the occasion. The homeward journey was made by rail to Bridge-of-Weir, where, through the kindness of our neighbours, carts, brakes and other vehicles met the weary travellers and brought them safely home.

AUGUST 6.—Our 700 boys had to-day a similar outing to Troon, which was thoroughly enjoyed, although memorable to some for having given them their first little experience of sea sickness. Among to-day's gifts, which amount to £13 10s 6d for the Homes and £5 for the Sanatoria, is 10s 6d "from a few teachers who had tea at the Sabbath School Conference, but who could not remain till later part of meeting;" 3s comes from a little girl as a thank-offering for good weather during holidays.

AUGUST 23.—Of the £12 10s 4d, the amount received to-day, £5 is from a Christian worker; £5 from one of our old girls home on a visit from America after 24 years' absence. She is comfortably married, and gratefully acknowledges what she owes to Mr. Quarrier for having rescued her from ill-doing friends. To-day also we have this letter from one of our Canadian boys.

DEAR MISS QUARRIER AND MRS. BURGESS.—I write to let you know that I am keeping well and getting along fine with the farming. I am working with another farmer. The first farmer I was working for said I was a first-class worker, and the one I'm with now says I am a very willing worker; and as you know well that a good name is rather to be chosen than great riches, it is worth while trying to earn one. I was just reading that little blue book about our dear father and about his wonderful work which he has done for God in the past years, and as I read about the great sum of money that is needed each year to fill 1,400 mouths every day, I thought it was the least I could do to send a little bit after being fed and clothed for seven years, so I herewith enclose the small sum of two dollars, as I know it will be accepted thankfully. I don't think I have any more to say at present.

SEPTEMBER 4.—No money gifts have come in to-day, but we have helpful remembrances in the parcels of clothing to hand from Edinburgh, Comrie, Langside, Yetholm and Strathaven, which last brings with it the prayer wish—"May you be kept in perfect peace amid all the perplexing

duties that surround you and ever see His hand guiding and planning, for without this the stress could not be borne daily."

SEPTEMBER 6.—From Paisley, 10s; from Shotts, 1s; from two visitors who were shewn over the Homes on the 4th, 10s; and 10s with the following letter make to-day's receipts 31s in all:—

I herewith enclose Postal Order for ten shillings, which I have no doubt you will find useful among your big family. It has been a very trying summer for every one. I have no doubt but you will feel the increased cost of living very heavily. I fear it is to be a hard winter for poor people. Some make themselves poor by their own manner of life, and nothing seems to be a lesson to them; but for God's children the promise still holds good: "My God shall supply *all* your need."

SEPTEMBER 17.—For many weeks very little has come in for the Sanatoria with its 120 patients, and we were greatly cheered by a gift of £250, with £100 for the Homes, to-day. The applications from sufferers of all ages are as numerous as ever, and we are hoping very shortly to open one of the houses for children under 14. This will increase our accommodation to 140 beds, and our financial needs will be increased also.

SEPTEMBER 21.—A gentleman visiting the Homes left £50 in behalf of the Sanatoria. An invalid sends 10s in celebration of her silver wedding. A widow who finds life a hard struggle out of her small means sends 2s. A Glasgow friend contributes £20; one of our own girls, £3; and our total for the day is £81 3s.

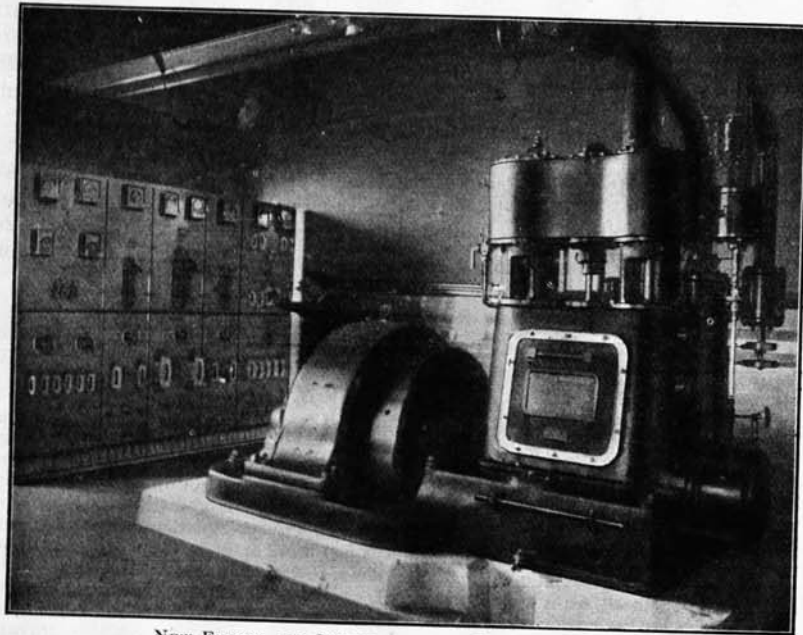
SEPTEMBER 23.—We have £12 for the Sanatoria, and £28 5s for the Homes to-day. An old friend sending 30s writes—

I am staggering through my 88th year in wonderful health. For more than 50 years the reports of Müller's "Orphan Homes" at Bristol, and, later, of the "Orphan Homes of Scotland," founded by your blessed father, have been *means of grace to me*, making prayer and the over-ruling providence of God practical realities, which stamp the prevailing agnosticism and unbelief as not only wilful blindness in the face of evidence, but obstinate stupidity, satanic and appalling. If you will kindly send me done up for posting, 12 copies of the "Occasional Paper" for September, I hope so to use them that, by God's blessing, they may open blind eyes, and also bring pecuniary help for the vast undertaking at Bridge-of-Weir, toward which such trifling contributions as the enclosed seem almost ridiculous. But each of us has his own burdens, known to the Father as definitely as the minutest facts of the physical universe which He orders so wisely. As a military chaplain, I was brought through the storms of shot, shell and rifle bullets of the Indian Mutiny at Cawnpore, Lucknow, and other places, without harm. My wife also was kept safe. "Through all eternity to Thee a joyful song I'll raise." The letters of the children sent out to Canada are charming, and prove the abiding blessing on the work. May you and all co-workers at Bridge-of-Weir (where I saw your dear parents long ago) and all the invalids, and all contributors even of pence, and all who pray for the succour of your work, enjoy the divine blessing from on high!

SEPTEMBER 27.—This evening the electric light was switched on to the village, and every Home was brightly illuminated. The new lamps in the avenues and roads are a great improvement, and it is impossible to appreciate too highly the advantage the new light will be in all the Homes. After the ceremony of turning on the light the children and workers with a few interested friends gathered in the Church, where short addresses were given, and as a family we returned public thanks to God for this fresh token of His love. Through the kindness of a friend

an exhibition of fireworks was afterwards given in the grounds, and the children will long remember with pleasure this special day in the history of the Homes.

SEPTEMBER 30.—Yesterday was the 78th anniversary of Mr. Quarrier's birth, and on Saturday and to-day we have had many tokens that his memory is still fresh and fragrant in the hearts of those who knew him. The mother and girls in one of the Homes sent £3; the boys in another, 15s; a worker, £4; a mother, £1; and from Canada we have thirty-five dollars with the following letter from one of our boys who went out three years ago. He is not much of a writer, but he is a good worker, and has a grateful heart towards those who helped him in his hour of need.

DEAR FRIEND,—I write you a few lines to let you know that I am well, hoping you are the same. I received your letter you sent me. I am sending thirty-five dollars for the Homes, and I hope it will reach you safely. It won't be long to Hallowe'en. I suppose the children will be having a good time then. I always had a jolly time then. Could you send me a picture of the Church and hospitals. We have had a very dry season out here, and the crops were very light, but we will have to take what we get. Hoping this will reach you,—I remain, your loving friend.

Two other letters which have come to hand recently from a boy and girl who went out last year shew how they have already taken to their adopted country.

MY DEAR MISS QUARRIER,—It seems a long time since I have written to you, but I often think of you all, and wonder what you are doing, and how you are getting along. I went to school four months last winter. I got along very well with my studies. I am in the junior third class. I will soon be starting again. The weather has been very dry all throughout Canada, the crops are very light, and the pasture is short and

dry. It will be very hard on poor people. I like Canada better all the time. I can milk eight cows, and I drive the milk to the factory every morning. I will soon be picking potatoes now. I like that very well. The Sunday School held their annual picnic at Lake Ontario Park. I went and had a most enjoyable time. I like to go to Sunday School. We have quite a large attendance. Superintendent is very nice. I attend Presbyterian Church in the morning quite often, and Methodist Church in the afternoon. I would like to hear from you very soon. How is Mrs. Burges getting along? I wrote to my aunt a long time ago, but have not received any answer from her as yet. I am enjoying good health. I think I must close, hoping that you are well and happy. Remember me to all.—With kindest regards.

MY DEAREST FRIEND, MISS QUARRIER,—I can often bring back my memory to the happy days that I enjoyed when I was in the Homes. It has always been a good home for children, and they are always enjoying themselves. When I was reading the New Year's letter I was just thinking that it was true what the lad said who gave the 25 dollars, that we can never pay the debt we owe. We were always treated so kindly that if we gave all we had we would never pay our debt. It will be quite a pleasure to the children and others also to have the electric light in their Homes.

It will lessen their labour, and also save danger. You were saying you would like to have our pictures as we are. I was thinking that I would have mine taken with my sister, and send you one. I am sure you will not know us, for there is a big difference in us now, we have grown so tall. I would like to make a visit to the Homes again. When I look at the Christmas tree it always causes me to remember the good time I had. I am thankful to-day that I was brought up in such a good home as the Orphan Homes. I am getting along very well in Canada, and I am earning five dollars a month, and my little sister Lizzie is earning three dollars a month. I think I will close, wishing you all love and prosperity from your friend.

OCTOBER 1.—Two friends in New Zealand write—

We are sending you our donation of ten pounds ten shillings (£10 10s) to show our love and sympathy in the Christ-like work you are engaged in, and because God has blessed us and we are trying to show our gratitude to Him for the many blessings He has given us. We thought to please God by doing this act, and encourage you at the same time, for you cannot go on unless you have funds. So the desire was put into our hearts to give some one else a share in the blessing we received, and we would like if it is possible for you to select one boy and devote this money for his expenses,

and send us his photo and history, and destination, so that we may take a personal interest in him as our younger brother, and the odd ten shillings, or whatever part of it you can spare might be given him for pocket money, and we shall be very pleased to hear about him at any time; how he is progressing, and we hope to meet him in the heavenly home, even if we never meet him on earth.

We gladly selected a little boy as their protégé, and trust their prayers for him will be abundantly answered.

OCTOBER 5.—From an annual donor, £2 for the Sanatoria. He says, "I am pleased to see you still get the necessary supplies through the love and wisdom of our Heavenly Father. Your noble father and I were next neighbours, when in his early struggles to establish the good work his courage and faith upheld him then and to the end."

OCTOBER 8.—5s from one who was helped by Mr. Quarrier, and who has "always been going to help but put it off;" £1, "a mite for the little ones," with the text, "Your work shall be rewarded." Along with a "gift in kind" we have the following letter:—

It is most marvellous how the work of the Homes goes on increasing. How the Lord has set His seal to the work in providing fully for every department, and better by gathering many into His family that shall bear witness through coming generations and in many lands. No doubt your strength and energies are taxed; indeed, were it not for the assurance and fulfilment of the promise: "As thy day so shall thy strength be," the work would fail. That you and your co-workers have been made the honoured instruments in carrying on such work makes it manifest that He is the Father of the fatherless. That you may all have in every trial and temptation the consciousness of the living, reigning, almighty, victorious Son of God is the prayer of yours in Him.

OCTOBER 16.—This day four years ago our beloved father finished his earthly journey. His work goes on, and we who are privileged to have a share in it see some of the fruit of his labours. What the harvest will yet be will only be revealed when the Lord comes. We have felt touched by the number of gifts that have recently come to us in memory of loved ones—A baby, a little son, a mother, a daughter, have left behind them tender sympathetic hearts which because of sacred memories seek to soothe the sorrows of others.

OCTOBER 18.—A dear friend who has for many years knitted for our boys writes—

I am sending to-day 16 pairs boys' socks, which completes the 100 pairs for this year. I feel so thankful that I have been strengthened to do this once more. Also enclosed are 7 boys' cravats by one of my colleagues, indeed the first on my list who so willingly offered to help. You will be rejoicing in your "new light" in the village and homes. May it be an "outward sign of an inward grace," so that you all may be also "walking in the light" which comes from above.

We rejoice with her that the task she set herself has again been accomplished in the allotted time.

OCTOBER 26.—From the Thomas Porter Equipment Fund £150 to provide outfits for boys and girls. One of our old girls writing to-day says, "How I long for a look at the Homes once more, but there are two faces I should miss very much, your dear father and mother. It is the

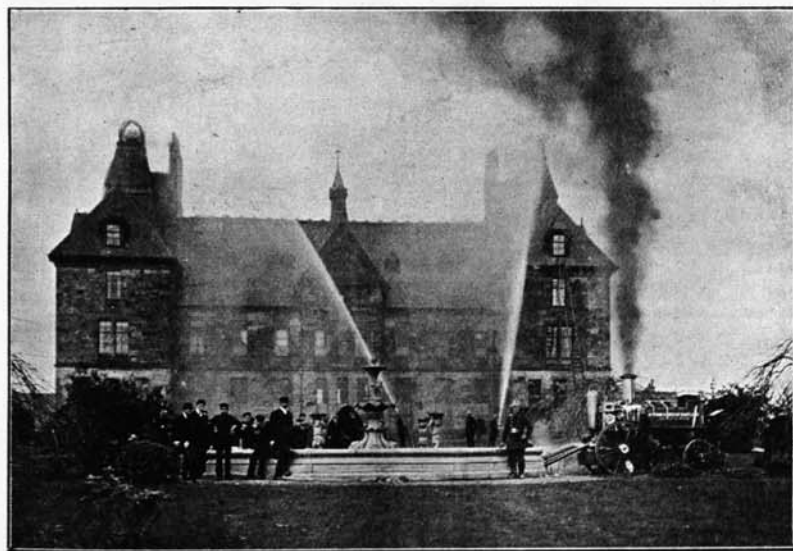
only taste of a home I ever had. I gave my heart to Jesus there. I am five years married now, and have a good, kind husband."

OCTOBER 28.—Among the gifts to hand these closing days of the year is one with quite an interesting history as the following letter shews:—

Herewith enclose a Postal Order for 10s as a small donation towards your "Homes." It is really a gift from my little niece, age 7. Early in the year I read to her in a missionary magazine of what some children had done by trading with a penny given them by their minister, and asked her if she would try and make something from a penny if I gave her one. She quite took up the idea. The first step was to buy a fine chrysanthemum from her grandpapa, for which she paid the penny. She sold the flower for fourpence, and with this her mother bought some wool. This the child knitted into wristlets, which she sold to an uncle for eightpence. Then she bought more wool and made bed sox, which were sold to a friend for one shilling. With this, material was bought, and three pincushions were made in cross-stitch work, which sold for a shilling each. Then she embroidered a table centre, which sold for half a crown, and so on until now her penny has become ten shillings. I thought the money was to go to a missionary society, but she made up her own mind very soon that any money she made was to go to Quarrier's Homes, so here it is.

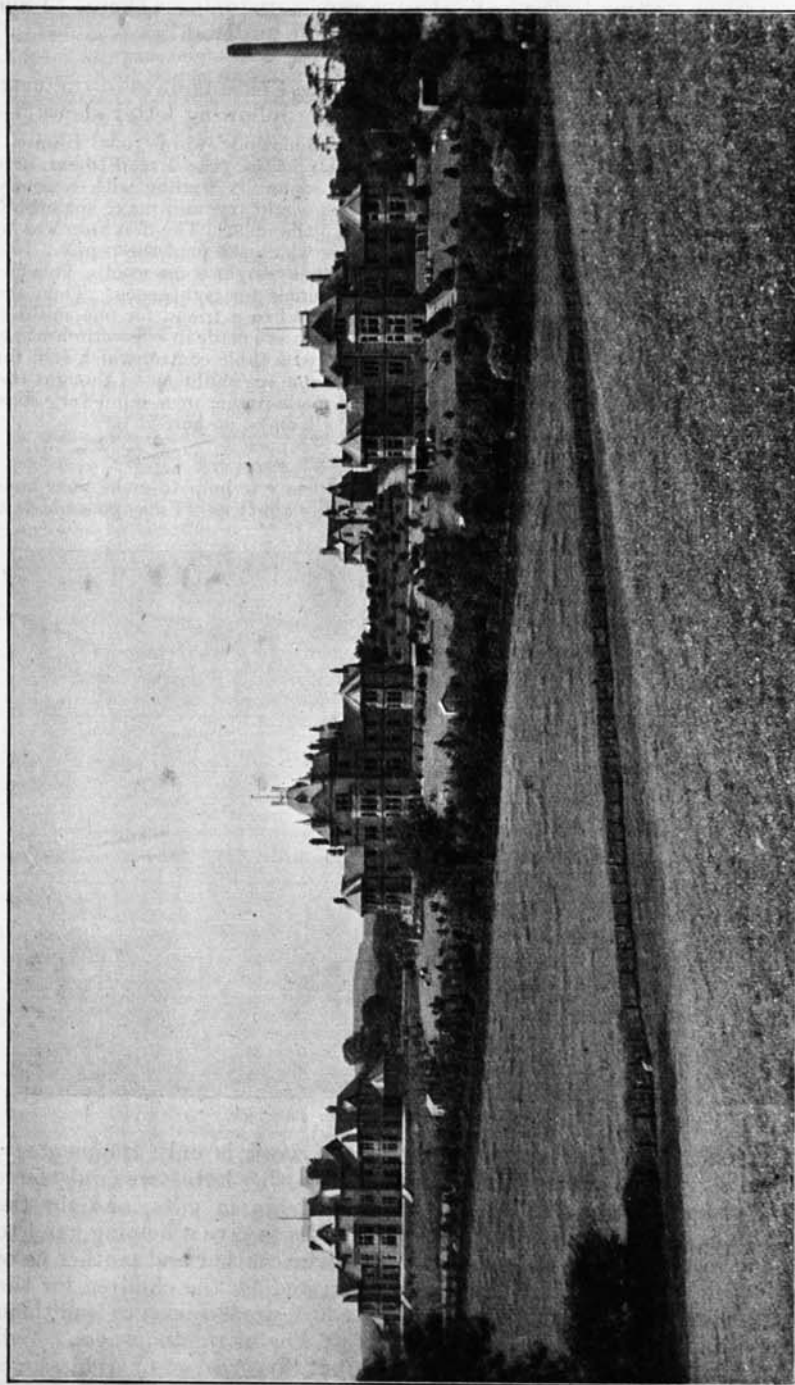
Our little helper herself writes—

£8,000 per year required for maintenance. £12,000 for each additional Sanatorium.

ON the beautiful hillside a few hundred yards from the Homes of the Orphan Children stand the Consumption Sanatoria founded by Mr. Quarrier. Probably no finer site could be found in the West of Scotland. Sheltered from the cold winds there are few days, even in winter, when patients are not able to sit out and have exercise in the grounds.

As is generally known, the Consumption Sanatoria is a distinct institution, although under the same auspices, and all the accounts are kept quite apart from those of the Orphan Homes.

During the past year there has been considerable development in the work, and men, women and children are now being treated. A new block to take in 40 men was opened in April, and a Home for 20 children in September, giving a total accommodation of 140 beds.

There is a constant stream of applicants for admission, many of whom have to be rejected as coming when the disease is too far advanced to make betterness possible, it being the aim to take only cases in the early stages, for whom there is some prospect of complete cure or definite betterness. One of the saddest duties in connection with the work is to refuse so many advanced cases, and the need is constantly felt of the necessity for city and county authorities providing accommodation for such, as they are meantime to a great extent left in their homes not only a burden to their friends, but affecting others with the disease.

While it cannot be said that the percentage of complete cures is large, yet there are many, while others have the disease arrested, and some have their lives considerably extended.

It has been gratifying from time to time to hear from those in the Sanatoria, as well as others who have left, of the blessing received, not only in the way of bodily health, but spiritually. Regular services are held on Sundays as well as a week day service, and patients have shown much appreciation of same.

With the opening of the new block for men, and the Home for children, there comes increased need for donations, and the estimated cost for

maintenance in the year is between £8,000 and £9,000. The cost of upkeep for each patient is about 24s. per week. Some patients are admitted free, and others pay sums varying up to £1 per week, according to their circumstances.

The Dispensary in James Morrison Street is much taken advantage of by out-door patients, and last year the attendances numbered 2030.

The Report of the Medical Officer and Medical Advisory Board on succeeding pages will be found interesting and instructive.

The medical staff at present consists of Dr. John Guy, M.D., assisted by two fully qualified lady doctors, Dr. Davidina Davidson and Dr. Jessie Morton. The trustees acknowledge with gratitude the assistance of the Medical Advisory Board, who ungrudgingly give valuable time to visit the Sanatoria and further the interests of the patients.

There is ample accommodation for further houses similar to those already erected. Each house costs about £12,000, including furnishings. The trustees would also be glad to receive gifts towards the erection of suitable workshops for men able to do a little work and for other purposes:

ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL OFFICER.

GENTLEMEN,—I have pleasure in submitting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st October, 1907.

During the year there have been 256 patients admitted, of whom 181 were females and 75 males, and there have been discharged 225, of whom 180 were females and 45 males.

There are now in residence 111—68 women, 38 men, and 5 children.

RESULTS.—When classified, the 225 patients discharged are found to come under the following categories.

DEFINITIONS — DISEASE ARRESTED.—Under the heading of Disease Arrested are included all cases in which signs of active disease have disappeared; temperature, pulse and respiration are normal; and no tubercle bacilli can be detected in the sputum or in any secretion from the mouth or throat.

IMPROVED.—Cases in which physical signs are only slightly modified, and tubercle bacilli are still present in sputum, but the general condition is greatly improved, as evidenced by increased weight and absence of constitutional disturbance.

NOT IMPROVED.—Cases showing no signs of constitutional or local betterment.

STAGE OF DISEASE.—The cases discharged were found, on admission, to be in the following stages of the disease:—

It is of interest to note the results of these separate classes as emphasising the much better results which accrue from beginning "open-air"

treatment at as early a stage as possible in the disease, and the comparative hopelessness of the curative treatment of advanced cases.

The advanced cases as a rule are those which have come from a considerable distance, with their real condition not quite manifest from the medical certificate, and it is difficult to refuse them admission, although they almost invariably do badly.

In the four cases which died the causes of death were

1 Acute Tuberculosis.	1 Haemoptysis.
1 Pneumothorax.	1 Asthenia.

DIAGNOSIS.—Tubercle bacilli were found in the sputum of 170 of the cases, and in the remaining 55 the diagnosis was based on physical signs, evening pyrexia, haemoptysis, and in a few cases on reaction to tuberculin.

During the year every bed has been almost continuously occupied. Pavilion 3 has been completed, and is utilised for male patients. It is built on similar architectural lines to the other pavilions, but several improvements have been added, notably the "rest rooms" at either end of the block. It is built to accommodate 40 patients and at the moment of writing contains 38. As the men have now been transferred to this pavilion, the small block formerly used for their treatment will be used for the reception and treatment of phthisical children. It will accommodate 20, and is in process of being filled as suitable cases present themselves.

RESIDENCE.—The term of residence, taking an average of all the cases, was 127 days or approximately 4 months. The longest stay was 430 days, the shortest one week.

DISPENSARY WORK.—This work carried on at James Morrison Street, Glasgow, consists in giving advice and, when advisable, medicine to those afflicted with phthisis amongst the poorer classes of the city. There is something specially trying about this branch, as the patients live in most unsuitable environments, so much so that their chances of recovery are very small indeed, and the utmost that can be done is to

alleviate their condition. On being thus brought into close proximity with the extent of tubercular disease amongst that class who cannot with any hope of success cope with the malady at home, and whose ability to maintain proper sanitary conditions is at a minimum, it is most forcibly impressed upon the mind that the disease will never be successfully combated until provision is made on a large scale by Municipal and other authorities as well as by Parish Councils for the treatment of the great numbers who are not in a position to avail themselves of the ordinary sanatorium. The Dispensary work conveys some idea of the magnitude of the problem with which we are confronted, and the utter inadequacy of the present means of attacking it, as the individuals who can be treated in sanatoria are only a mere fraction of the number of the sufferers from phthisis. Thorough grappling with the problem involves deep social and economic questions, such as the housing of the working classes, the hygiene conditions of workrooms, the drinking habits of a section of the people, the ignorance or neglect of domestic and personal hygiene and of the fundamental laws of health. Until these various questions are more fully discussed and properly settled, the stream of sufferers from phthisis will flow on without satisfactory abatement in its force.

The following figures give some indication of the work done at the Dispensary.

REPORT BY MEDICAL ADVISORY BOARD.

During the past year meetings of the Board were held in March, July and October. At the March meeting the Board met at the Sanatoria, when the members inspected the new block III. then nearing completion. In addition to the ordinary duties arising from the consideration of the Medical Officer's Quarterly Reports, the Board have endeavoured to shape the policy to be pursued regarding the many new questions arising in connection with the scientific and medical aspects of the work at the Sanatoria. Amongst other matters the classification of results, following upon the report of a sub-committee convened by Dr. Duncan, has been dealt with. The Board have also had under consideration the advisability of arranging for the provision of light employment and pleasant occupation in suitable cases for patients who are regaining strength. Successful results in this direction have been achieved in the Adirondac Cottage Hospital, Suranac Lake, U.S.A., with the superintendent of which the Board have been in communication. The monthly visits of the members to the Sanatoria have been continued as formerly. Dr. W. L. Reid, president of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons in Glasgow, has consented to take the place on the Board vacated on his retiral by Professor J. G. M'Kendrick.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

Having completed a full year of work in connection with the above we are glad to be able to furnish a fairly satisfactory report.

While there has been much to discourage, there has also been much to cheer us in our efforts to care for the epileptic. Epilepsy is one of the most difficult diseases to treat, and up to the present medical science has been able to do little for it. Mr. Quarrier's view, when he conceived this work, was that fresh air and out-door life was the most desirable and helpful treatment for sufferers, and this is proving to be correct. Quite a number of the colonists have greatly improved, and it is hoped as time goes on a fair percentage of cures will be effected. At the same time there are many disappointments, and some for whom recovery or betterness had been looked for have gone back.

As far as possible endeavours are made to give suitable employment to the colonists. Some who are able for inside work are engaged in shoe-making, carpentering, painting, etc., but the great majority are employed in the garden and at out-door labour.

Ample time is allowed for recreation, and generally the colonists are putting in a happy, comfortable time.

As is generally known the first Home was given to men, it being felt that their claim was the most urgent, and the Home is now full, but we rejoice that it is being made possible to deal with women, as a special gift of £4,000 has been sent for a new Home, of which the construction is now beginning.

We hope as time goes on to receive further gifts. It takes about £4,000 to build and furnish the most economical size of Home, but smaller buildings might be erected, and donations large or small will be gratefully welcomed.

We are also desirous to have a building to be used as a workshop for the men in winter and for amusement purposes.

Each colonist contributes 10s per week towards the cost of his board, and keeps himself in clothes. In some cases friends supply the funds, and in others Parish Councils.

EMIGRATION WORK.

THE picture below is one, the sight of which makes the blood flow more quickly in the veins of our children of the Homes. It is a lorry-load of boxes on their way to the steamer in which one of our parties is to sail for Canada. Each box is the property of one of our young emigrants, and contains a capital outfit to enable him (or her) to make a good start in the new home beyond the sea. The other two pictures which follow are photographs of the parties of girls and boys who left us in the spring and summer of this year, all of whom are now happily settled in the land of their adoption. One hundred boys left the Homes in March and seventy-two girls followed them in June. The ever-open-door on the other side



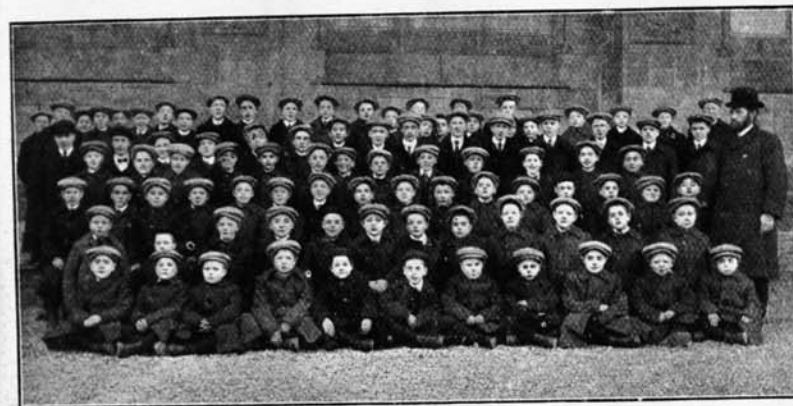
GIRLS' BOXES EN ROUTE FOR CANADA.

eagerly swallows up all we are able to send out, and would take a great many more if we could spare them.

Accounts of and from the children in the past year have been most cheering, their after lives in most cases giving us much cause for joy and thanksgiving. We have also had quite a number of visits from members of the great family who have crossed the ocean, and some of them are now occupying positions of much usefulness in Canada and the United States. The gifts which reach us from time to time from old girls and boys are not the least pleasant of the many ways in which the needs of the new generation are day by day supplied.

We are looking forward to send out about 200 children in the coming

season. Each of them will cost on an average £10, or £2,000 for the whole number. Of this sum about one eighth is already in hand, and we have no doubt that by the time it is required, every passage and outfit



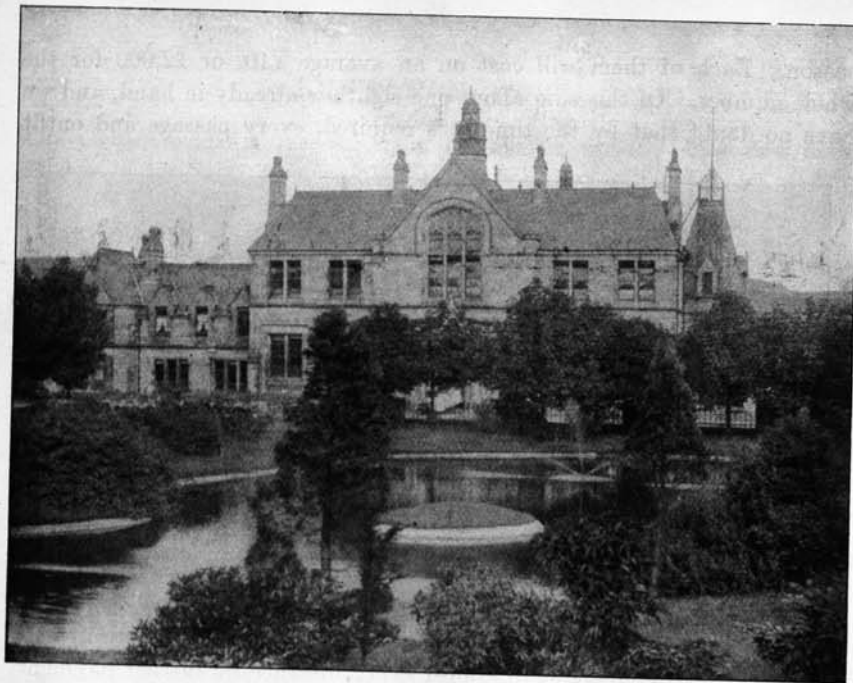
PARTY OF BOYS WHO SAILED FOR CANADA, 30TH MARCH, 1907.

will be forthcoming. This is one of the best and most complete investments that can be made as in almost every instance no further payment of any kind is necessary, and every child sent out reduces to that extent the competition and pressure in the labour market at home.

We stand *in loco parentis* to every child until he reaches the age of 18, and at least once every year visit each and make careful inquiry as to their well-doing and well-being.



REPORT ON THE ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND SCHOOL.

School Managers, { Mr. J. P. MACLAY, *Chairman*, Sir SAMUEL CHISHOLM, *Bart.*, Mr. ALEX. P. FORRESTER PATON, Mr. ROBERT BINNIE, Mr. W. A. CAMPBELL, *Pastor* D. J. FINDLAY, Miss MARY QUARRIER, and Mrs. A. QUARRIER BURGESS. Mr. R. LOCKHART BRYDEN, *Clerk*.

In reporting on the work of the school connected with the Orphan Homes of Scotland for the past year, the managers beg to state that good progress has been made in the various departments. In addition to classes for elementary education, a supplementary class for senior boys and girls has been instituted. There were in the day school, as on 31st October 1907, 988 scholars with an average attendance of 934, a percentage of 94.5. This taxes the available class-room accommodation to the uttermost, but the new addition to the main school building when completed will do much to place matters on a better footing. Mr. J. Gordon Kennedy, the headmaster, is assisted by a staff of 14 certificated teachers, 5 assistants and two pupil teachers. The work going on has been reported on in favourable terms by Mr. D. Munro Fraser, H.M. Inspector, who officially visited the school in March last. He reported as follows:—

"The Infant Department is taught with praiseworthy tact, skill and enthusiasm. In the large Junior and Senior Divisions the results of the instruction bear generally the impress of intelligent and well directed effort. Clear and distinct reading is successfully cultivated, oral composition, leading up to written composition, receives careful attention, and the written exercises are, as a rule, very neat and legible. The fundamental operations of arithmetic are well understood, though there is a tendency in one or two of the Junior Classes to adhere to old methods and to devote too much time to computations involving the use of rather large numbers. Mental calculation of prices, so important for the business of practical life, shows well.

"Progress has been made with the grading of objects in the drawing lessons. Two large classes are under instruction with a view to the passing of the Qualifying Examination, and, though the work is at present somewhat uneven, it is hoped that by the end of the session a large number of the pupils will be able to enter upon a supplementary course.

"In the existing supplementary course records of work are well kept, and a considerable amount of home reading has been overtaken. The cultivation of a taste for wholesome reading among the pupils is calculated to have moral effects of a far-reaching character. A satisfactory start has been made with practical geometry. As the girls attending the course receive instruction in cookery, the managers would do well to consider the possibility of providing a course of manual instruction for the boys.

"A very pleasing tone pervades the school, and the supervision of the headmaster over all departments of the work deserves special recognition."

A series of continuation classes for the benefit of lads and girls over fourteen was again carried on by a staff consisting of twelve teachers. There were on roll 171 scholars, showing an average attendance of 162 a percentage of 94.5. Many of the "students," as the scholars in the continuation classes are called, pass out of these classes before the session is ended, while others are studying in more than one class. Viewed from this standpoint, there were in Division I. (Elementary Subjects) 187 scholars, and in Division II., which comprises classes of Cookery, Housewifery, Navigation and Ambulance, 98 scholars. The following Report has been received from the Department in regard to Housewifery and Cookery following upon a visit of Miss Crawford, H.M. Inspectress:—

HOUSEWIFERY.—"The work of this class has been attended with much success. No effort has been spared by the teacher to make the training in this subject of the greatest practical use to the girls, and the systematic and thorough way in which the lessons are given calls for special comment. Every detail pertaining to general household management is carefully explained and practised, and no more useful course of lessons could be adopted to fit these girls for positions of usefulness and honour at home and abroad."

COOKERY.—"The management of this class gave much satisfaction. Much good and useful work has been accomplished, the pupils answered with average intelligence, and note books were much improved."

As regards finance, the Managers have expended in connection with the day school for year ending 31st January last the sum of £2,247 2s 2d. They carried forward from the previous year £307 11s 10d of Parliamentary Grant then unexpended; and during the year they have received Annual Parliamentary Grant £1,088 2s 7d; Grant in Relief of School Fees, £552; General Aid Grant, £138 12s; Aid Grant, £139 10s, and Bank Interest, £21 5s 9d, leaving a balance on hand of £27 19s 2d.

The expenditure on the continuation classes amounted during the year to £170 19s 11d. In addition to the balance brought forward of £1 11s 8d, the Managers received from the Department a grant of £117 4s 7d, from the Renfrewshire County Council a Navigation Grant of £3 10s, and Bank Interest, 11s 8d. The balance of £48 2s was defrayed by subscriptions.

The school accounts have all been duly audited and reported to the Scotch Education Department.

The Annual Demonstration of the Scholars took place in December last. Medals were presented to the dux boy and the dux girl of last session, both of whom were in the supplementary class, and prizes were presented to the other scholars who stood highest in their respective classes throughout the session.

A Company of the Boys' Brigade is carried on in connection with the school under the captaincy of the headmaster, with gratifying results as regards drill and physical training.

The thanks of the Managers are due to Mr. J. Gordon Kennedy, and his able staff of teachers, for the good and substantial progress which has been made in all the various departments of the school during the past year.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FUND.

THIS youngest branch of ministry in connection with the Orphan Homes has gone steadily and quietly forward on its beneficent course in the second year of its recognised existence. The funds at our disposal have been principally provided by the same generous friend, who again—as last year—donated £1,000, and the gifts of the children and our fellow-workers at Bridge-of-Weir, which aggregated the goodly sum of £306 5s 8d. A few small gifts have come to hand from friends in different parts of the country, but as yet very few of our kind donors appear to have been moved to take a practical interest in this service. May we hope that all of them through other channels are doing something to help forward the great missionary cause which lies so near the heart of our Lord Jesus Christ? We are not all called to help in the same way, but surely if we have the spirit of Christ we must be doing something in some way to help to gather into His kingdom the lost ones for whom He died. Our personal testimony is that the deeper and larger the interest we are enabled to take in missionary work the more blessing we receive in our own hearts and in the home departments of the work.

It has been our joy to send help to many workers scattered over different parts of China, India, Arabia, Egypt, Tunisia, Algeria, Morocco, West, South, and Central Africa, Brazil, the Argentine, Peru, New Hebrides, the Colonies, Canada, etc., and to do something to help forward work amongst Jews, both at home and abroad. Gifts have on different occasions come to hand in a most timely way, and have called forth many expressions of deep thankfulness to God for the manner in which—through this fund—very pressing and urgent needs were met just in the nick of time. All the missionaries we have been privileged to help are in connection with the various existing societies, and as the funds of many of these have been exceptionally straitened in the past year the contributions that we have been able to send have been specially acceptable.

Donations have also been sent to some of the excellent Home Missions which are at work in our own land, and the infirmaries and kindred institutions have not been forgotten.

In addition to the more desultory and occasional help referred to above, we have been able to provide for all the temporal needs of "our own Missionaries." These remain, as last year, four in number, but there are several young workers undergoing preparation in training institutions, whom we partially support, and whom we shall be thankful if we are enabled to adopt when their courses of home training are completed, and they are ready to go forth to the Regions Beyond.

Mr. Cuthbert Nairn (South Morocco Mission) has had a very varied experience during the past twelve months. At the beginning of that period he was just taking up again his work in Marrakesh, after a short visit home, and never had the prospects of the work seemed to him so hopeful. The glad promise of fruit after so many years of patient, faithful sowing has been repeatedly broken in upon by the troubles in that sad, dark land, and now for several months our friend and his fellow-workers have been forced to leave the interior and confine their efforts to the coast

towns. It is to be hoped that the way may soon be re-opened for Mr. Nairn to get back amongst the people he loves so well, and for whose best welfare he has so wholeheartedly given up his life. Mrs. Nairn was only able to remain in Morocco for a few months on account of the serious illness of her youngest child, and she is now in Scotland making a home for her three children. Will those who take burdens of this kind on their hearts pray for these devoted workers separated for Christ's sake, and for the sake of the poor Moslems in Morocco for whom Christ died?

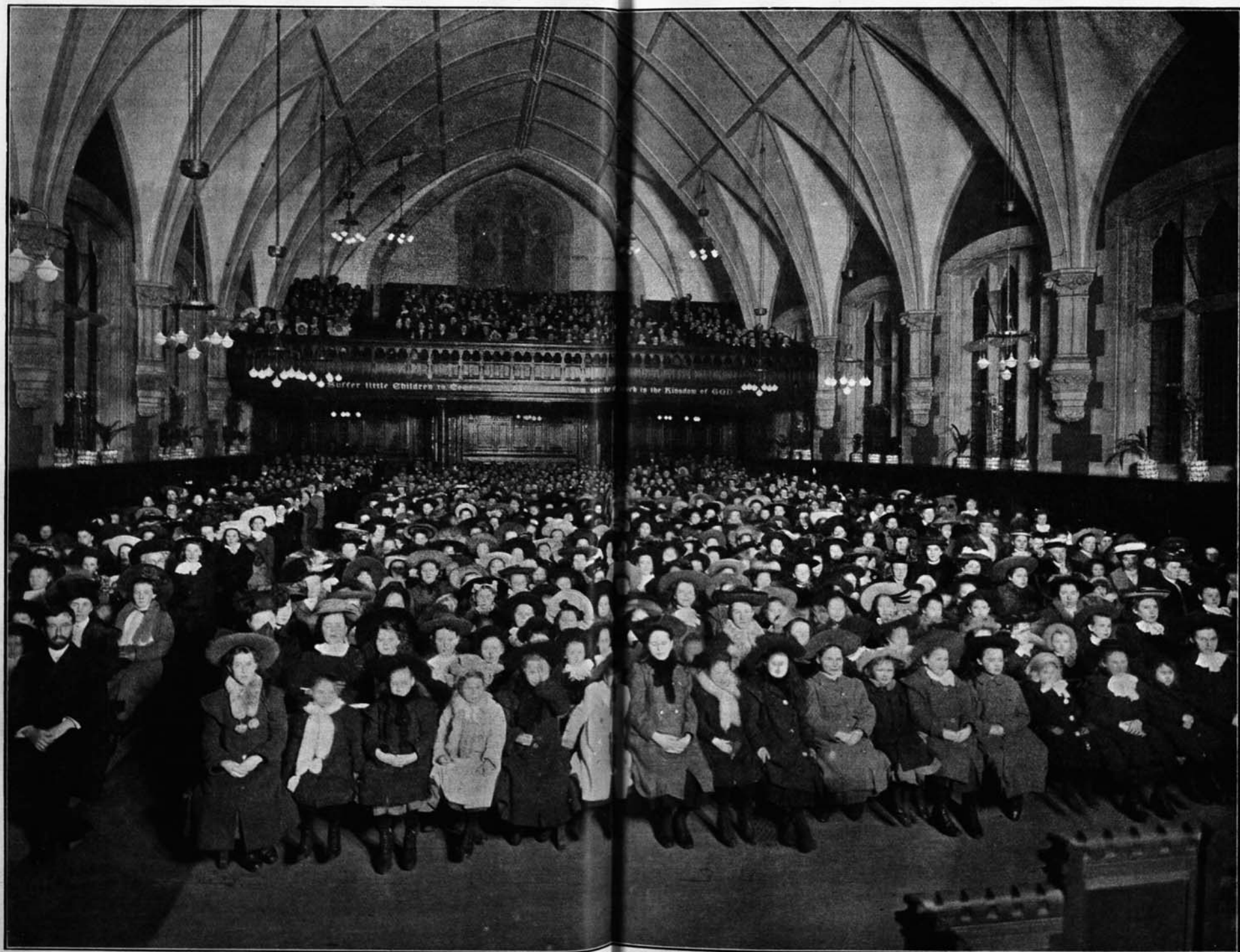
Mr. John Ritchie (Regions Beyond Missionary Union) has done a year of excellent and varied work in different parts of bigoted priest-ridden Peru. He has made such remarkable progress with the language that, when Dr. Harry G. Guinness spent some time with him last spring, he found him preaching the gospel with almost as much readiness in Spanish as if he had been using his own mother tongue. The exigencies of the Mission have necessitated Mr. Ritchie's temporary removal from Arequipa to Lima, where he is at present carrying on preaching and teaching work. He sends us interesting letters from time to time, but it was of added interest to have Dr. Guinness amongst us recently, and to learn from his lips of the high esteem in which he holds our young missionary, and have his testimony regarding the excellent work that God is enabling him to do in the "neglected continent."

Miss Agnes G. Leith (China Inland Mission) is busily engaged in happy and fruitful service at Kwei-ki, on the Kwang-sin River. She is an excellent correspondent, and from her letters, as well as from those of her splendid co-worker, Miss Marchbank, we have been enabled to take many an intelligent look into the work which God has so wonderfully honoured and blessed. The latest report (just to hand) speaks of an expected visit from the superintendent—possibly Mr. Orr-Ewing—and a goodly number of candidates for baptism awaiting to be examined.

Miss M. E. Tomlinson ("Help for Brazil" Mission) was only getting a grasp of Portuguese and beginning to enjoy the work when her health broke down so seriously that she had to be sent home in the early summer. The doctor does not give any hope of her being able to return to Brazil for some time yet. The Brazil Mission met with a serious loss recently in the death of its honoured secretary, Mrs. S. P. Kalley, the wife of the founder. Praying friends might make mention of these four missionaries and their fields of labour when they have the King's ear, and ask that they may know more and more of true spiritual success in their work.

There is no bit of service in which we take more delight than this, and it will be a joy to us indeed if friends are led to enable us still further to extend the usefulness of our "Home and Foreign Missions Fund." £400 more have been distributed this year than last, and the possibilities are only limited by the funds placed at our disposal. We know where another £1,000 could be spent right away if we had it, and the investment would bring in far more than cent per cent in heavenly debentures, but meantime we have not got the money to send, and must patiently wait on God until He opens the hearts of His servants to give.

CHILDREN IN CHURCH



A SABBATH DAY AT THE ORPHAN HOMES.

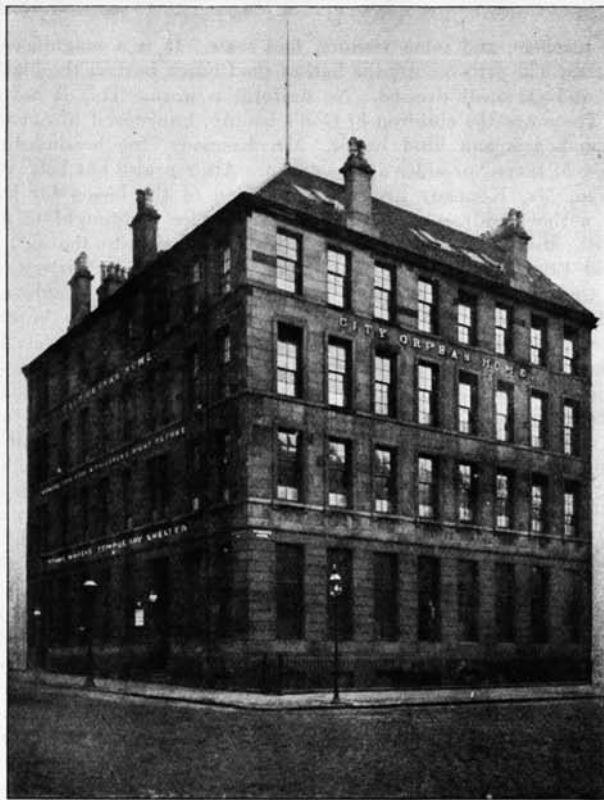

As we look out of our bedroom window on Sabbath morning, the sky is bright and the sun is shining. The wind has been blowing high through the night, but now it has almost subsided. A number of the cottages are within the range of our view. Each one contains its complement of orphan children. As we think of the great company we will meet in the Church, to whom it will be our privilege to tell the story of redeeming love, we breathe a prayer for help. The gong rings at nine o'clock for breakfast. There are fewer at the table than used to be. We think of Mr. Quarrier, and where he sat; of Mrs. Quarrier, and where she sat; of Mr. Burges, and where he sat. It is easy in vision to see them yet. But they have passed beyond. But Mrs. Burges and her sister Miss Quarrier are here, and right bravely they are carrying on the great work left to their care. Family worship follows the morning meal, and at a quarter before eleven we set out for the Church. Each cottage is furnishing its contingent. Along Faith Avenue, and Love Avenue, and Praise Road towards the Church the companies of children wend their way, marching two abreast, with their guardians accompanying them. It is an interesting sight. Reaching the Church, we tarry for a minute or two in the vestry, and as the clock in the Church steeple strikes eleven, we find our way on to the platform. A survey of the youthful congregation never fails to charm us. It is nearly twenty-one years since we spent our first Sabbath in holy service at the Orphan Homes. Then the children met for worship in the large hall in the central building. The Church was not then built, and the congregation did not number more than four or five hundred. Now there are thirteen hundred children. The floor of the large, spacious Church is filled from end to end. We think we have never seen it so full. Several of the cottage families are accommodated in the gallery, where also a number of the

helpers and teachers, and some visitors, find seats. It is a magnificent sight that meets the gaze. The girls occupy the half of the Church nearest the platform. They are prettily and variously dressed. No uniform is worn. This is not a poorhouse gathering. These are the children of God's bounty, ministered to not by State aid, but by loving hearts and kind hands. Mr. Kennedy, the headmaster, leads the service. Miss M'Intyre presides at the organ. After praise has been rendered and prayer offered, Mr. Kennedy gives an exposition of the lesson for the day. We follow with a short address, and at 12.20 the service is brought to a close. In company with Miss Quarrier and others, we pay a visit to the sick children in Bethesda and Elim Homes. The first-named is tenanted by girls, the second by boys. Miss Quarrier carries with her a supply of sweets and booklets, and as she moves from cot to cot, scattering smiles and speaking words of cheer to the suffering ones, it is easy to see that her visit is prized. At one o'clock we gather round the hospitable board in Homelea, and at 2.30 we meet once more in the Church. Being the first Sabbath of the month, according to custom, a special service is held for the celebration of the Lord's supper. The "fathers" and "mothers" and workers, and some of the older children, gather round the table of the Lord, and partake of the sacred emblems. The children, who are all gathered, look on. In days to come they will celebrate the same ordinance, many of them in widely different parts of the world, and they will not fail to carry with them the memories of the feast days at the Orphan Homes. Our next move is to No. 2 of the Consumption Sanatoria, where a service is held every Sabbath afternoon for the patients who are able to attend. We count over eighty present. Nurses and others bring the congregation up to about 100. The windows are all open, and with the wind blowing from the north-east, there is no scarcity of fresh air. Following on the opening hymn and prayer, Miss M'Intyre sings a solo, which has as a refrain this question—"Is this Saviour who loves you yours?" We follow with an address on the blessedness of the man whose sins are forgiven, and at a quarter to five the service ends. At six o'clock the evening service in the Church is held. Two years ago electric light was installed in the Church. The oil lamps as illuminants have disappeared. The lighting of the children's sanctuary has been brought up to date, and the new form is an improvement on the old. To-night, in addition to the residents from the Homes, there are a great many visitors in the gallery, and, as we look on the great congregation of young and old, under the glare of the electric light, the sight is inspiring. Many jewels have been won for Christ's crown here. Mr. Quarrier used to speak of the young people under his care as his Father's children. By faith he claimed their salvation, and abundant tokens were given of God's saving power operating effectually among them. We eagerly embrace the opportunity within our reach of making known the worth of the sacrifice Jesus offered when He died upon the tree, and the children follow us attentively from point to point. Prayer follows the address, and, as it closes, the children, with the organ accompanying, start up their evening hymn, "Jesus, tender Shepherd, lead me." We never hear anything that touches us exactly in the same way as the singing of that evening hymn does. We feel as if heaven is very near at hand. We are quite certain there are angels hovering round. The congregation slowly disperses, but our service for the day is not yet over. We make our way to the Colony of Mercy, to conduct, as is the custom, a short service for the epileptics. On our arrival we find them all in their places. There are about thirty present. Nearly all look hale and hearty, but, poor fellows! theirs is a sore affliction. The service lasts for about forty minutes. Miss M'Intyre and Mr. Wm. Burgess sing as a duet—

"Some day the silver cord will break, &c."

When the service is over, we make tracks for Homelea, where the rest of the evening is pleasantly spent. It has been a day of high privilege. God is in the midst of this place. Its walls may be called Salvation, and its gates Praise.



CITY HOME.—SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To give even a summary of the work of twelve months in such small compass is not an easy task.

With heart engrossed and hands full day by day, there is a tendency to see only the "common round" and lose sight of the romantic or tragic aspects of human life. A novice has striking facts indelibly stamped on his mind, but hearing similar tales of sorrow time and again, makes them become familiar and common-place. There is much need for those who "hold the ropes," by their prayers to bring abundant grace to the almoners that their hearts may be kept tender and sympathetic towards every appeal, while exercising a wise discernment in decision. The failure and demerits of relatives have sometimes to be ignored, and the children helped for their own sakes, with the hope that thus the rising generation may be better than the present.

A large number of those admitted are the orphans of respectable parents, many of whom have been cut off in the midst of their days by the consumption scourge; but a good proportion are destitute through the intemperance and profligacy of those who should provide for them. In not a few cases drunkenness and kindred vices in successive generations have left the child under par physically, intellectually and morally, which necessarily makes education and training more tedious and difficult, and

good results more doubtful. As we behold the sins of the fathers bringing forth awful fruits in the lives of their children, we are led to exclaim, "What a mercy it is not man who has to unravel the tangled mass of human life, and render to every man according to his deeds."

The Orphan Homes of Scotland—according to the principles of the Founder—is the Heavenly Father's hand to feed, clothe, love and train His destitute little ones deprived of their natural guardians. The great Provider has by means of His wingless ravens sent day by day an abundant supply for every need, and so it has been possible as in all the years that have gone before to receive every eligible applicant. They have come singly and in families from every part of Scotland, and after the necessary preliminary of recording the facts of their histories and the more necessary process of cleaning and clothing have been passed on to the "Children's City" to receive what will largely decide the success or otherwise of their whole after-life.

The total number has been rather less than last year, but about the average of recent years, and probably about the average which will be received in the years of the immediate future.

Work among the working lads and young women has gone on as usual. The numbers still dwindle down, while the behaviour and progress remain quite satisfactory. A good many of the older lads have finished their apprenticeship or have otherwise become fit to support themselves and leave us. During the year not a single boy has run away or left in a dishonest fashion. They spent a most enjoyable holiday at Downan Farm, Ballintrae, through the oft-repeated kindness of Mr. Wright. The girls were as usual at Bridgeof-Weir during the Fair Week.

The Mission work has been maintained by our Biblewoman, assisted by a goodly staff of voluntary workers and many occasional speakers and singers. It is encouraging to see so many belonging to the district so regular in their attendance, and no doubt an influence for good has its centre in the Hall. The Women's Meeting, held every Monday afternoon, has been quite a success. At the close of the session in June, the "mothers" to the number of over 80, accompanied by many of their young children, in spite of a wet day, drove in brakes at their own expense to the Homes, Bridge-of-Weir, when a fresh bond of attachment was formed by what their eyes saw of the wonderful works of God in providing for the fatherless bairns, and through the great kindness of Miss Quarrier, Mrs. Burges, Mr. and Mrs. Maclay, and other workers in making the visit so enjoyable: The attendance of outside children at the Sabbath Forenoon Meeting has been larger than for many years, and while we do not see the immediate and definite results we pray for, we are convinced that young lives are being influenced in the right direction. The Bible Class seems to have got a fresh impetus since the holidays, which we trust may be maintained.

By God's help, supported and sustained by the intercession of His saints who remember us, we go on extending the hand of help to the destitute children, caring for the bodies and souls of the older ones resident in the Home, and telling out as we best can the good news of salvation through the crucified, risen, exalted Saviour, believing that if we do at times go forth sowing sorrowfully and return depressed by ingratitude and disappointments, the day will yet dawn when there shall be a glorious harvest.

REPORT OF MR. AND MRS. M'FADZEAN,

Superintendent and Matron at Bridge-of-Weir.

The months of the past year have flown so quickly we can scarcely realise the time has again come for issuing our Yearly Report. Surrounded as we are with so much young life, with its incessant demand for care in some way or another, time does not hang heavily on our hands. During the year there has been the continuous coming of children, reminding us of blanks made in happy homes, and the need of God's provision for fatherless ones. It is our privilege to receive all newcomers to the village, and to us it is often very touching to meet the look of mute inquiry, giving, deeper than any words could express, "Are you really to be my friend?" then the sense of relief that comes when words pass between us. We sometimes wish interested ones left behind could see how very quickly the ones they are anxious about adapt themselves to their new surroundings. Very many of the children received this year have been little ones. The welcome they receive from the fathers and mothers is none the less because of that—in fact, a baby in the Home is a real joy to all. Every house has its equal share of bigger ones to help with the work. The training to some of these, unaccustomed to method, is sometimes irksome. We feel no greater blessing could be bestowed on our helpers, by God's remembrancers, than to ask that special grace for that great work may be theirs in their dealings with these older children, both in temporal and spiritual training. They will so soon pass out into life, with all that it involves, and our deep desire is that they shall be well equipped:

The provisioning such a family as ours means much thought. As far as money is concerned, there has been no care, but the using of gifts so graciously bestowed needs wisdom God alone can give. We constantly wish friends who send us gifts in kind could know how very often they have been made the channel of blessing—the right thing at the right time—and our hearts have been melted before Him with a fresh sense of His faithfulness. Our God's exceeding abundants have been very many to us, for His needy ones this past year, and we, who have handled every gift, would like His busy-fingered children to know how our anxiety has been lessened and our hearts inspired and strengthened by their continued mindfulness.

We went in charge of the boys' party to Canada in the spring of this year. The preparation for that work brings a good deal of buzz for a short time, but there is a buoyancy in the prospective travellers, and a feeling in our hearts that the best is being done for each emigrant, that carries us along. We had a stormy voyage, but got safely to the other side of the Atlantic, and to Brockville Home. In a very few days every boy was placed out in a home fixed for him before our arrival. We met many of the boys who had gone out in former years, and were greatly pleased with their development and manly bearing, even twelve months had so altered some of them, which was very gratifying. In a work like ours every day brings something that fills hand and heart. We sow in hope, not fearing but there shall be a great harvest. Like our late beloved founder, "we would expect great things from God." May we, like him, be enabled to do great things to God's glory.

IN MEMORIAM.

During the past year we have been called upon to mourn the departure of many loved helpers and friends whose fellowship in gifts and service we will sorely miss. To the bereaved relatives upon whom the sorrow falls heaviest our sympathies go out, and we pray that God's peace may be their portion. We trust many new friends will be raised up to fill the vacant places which become more numerous as the years pass on.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1906, there were resident in the Homes 1,300 boys and girls. During the year 356 new cases have been admitted, making a total of 1,656 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows :—Outfitted and sent to domestic service, trades, and situations, 42 ; outfitted and sent to sea, 4 ; outfitted and sent to Canada, 177 ; deaths, 11 ; children under 5 years adopted, 8 ; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 104 ; left and dismissed, 18 ; sent to other institutions, 6 ; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1907, 1,286, of whom 687 are boys and 599 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 231 boys and girls have been given a start in life and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, sent to sea or to Canada. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and, where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND.—336 patients were treated during the year, and there were 2,030 attendances at the Dispensary, showing a large increase over previous years.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.—The first Home has been in operation for 15 months and is now filled with 30 young men.

THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year in answer to prayer is as follows :—For the General Fund, which includes the keep of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home Refuge and Mission, including £688 4s. 5d. earned by working boys, and sundry amounts, as per Cash Statement, £31,886 17s. 6d.; for Consumption Sanatoria maintenance and Building Fund, £6,567 1s. 5d.; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £5,342 19s. 2d.; for Home and Foreign Missions, £1,326 4s., making the total amount for all purposes, £45,123 2s. 1d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

In connection with the City Home work, regular Sunday and Week-day Gospel Meetings have been held in our own Hall, and thousands of tracts have been distributed; nights' lodgings were given to homeless wanderers, and many visits were paid to the homes of the poor by our workers. Sick and ailing ones have been provided with lines for Infirmarys and Convalescent Homes, and many others have received help and advice in their time of need.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to fellow-labourers, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country ; to ministers, evangelists, and others who have aided in the Gospel work ; to Sabbath school superintendents, teachers, and scholars ; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones ; to the accountant who audits the books ; and to the Press which has given notices of the work. Their ministry and helpfulness have brought joy and blessing to many lives, and we trust the record of what has been attempted will add glory to our Lord and Master:

CONCLUSION.

OUR readers who have patiently read through this narrative of facts—collated the facts—and studied the various balance sheets, are no doubt thinking and saying, "Wonderful!" So it is to us ; but then we are dealing with a God whose name is "Wonderful," and so this record of His doings on behalf of the orphan children and the consumptives and epileptics of Scotland is only what we ought to expect. The record certainly proves that He can work through any instrumentality that it pleases Him to use, and the weaker and more insignificant the instrument the more glory to the Almighty worker.

£40,000 of the needs enumerated on this page last year have been met in His own "exceeding abundant" way. Here is a brief forecast of the needs for this year as far as they appear to us :—

£18,000 is the sum required for maintenance of the Orphan children.

£8,000 for maintenance of the Sanatoria.

£1,000 for maintenance of the Colony of Mercy.

£2,000 for Emigration.

£4,000 for a Gymnasium, Recreation Hall, and Swimming Bath for the older boys and girls. (N.B.—This need is pressing itself on us more and more, and we shall be thankful indeed if it is soon supplied.

£12,000 each to build and equip further blocks for Consumption Sanatoria.

£4,000 for an Executive Block at Colony of Mercy and £2,500 to £4,000 to erect additional houses. £1,000 to £2,000 would also be acceptable to erect a workshop and meeting rooms.

£2,000 for "Home and Foreign Missions Fund."

We have no anxiety about any of these matters, for we know that if our desires concerning them are from God He will in the right time move the hearts of His children with regard to them, and if otherwise then He will make it plain.

If our many thousands of helpers all over the land, who of their abundance or want, have ministered to the needs of our great family of needy ones, have had more joy in giving than we have had in receiving, then they must have had a happy time indeed. We pray constantly that God may bless this great army of our fellow-workers and enrich them to all bountifulness, and "supply every need of theirs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus."

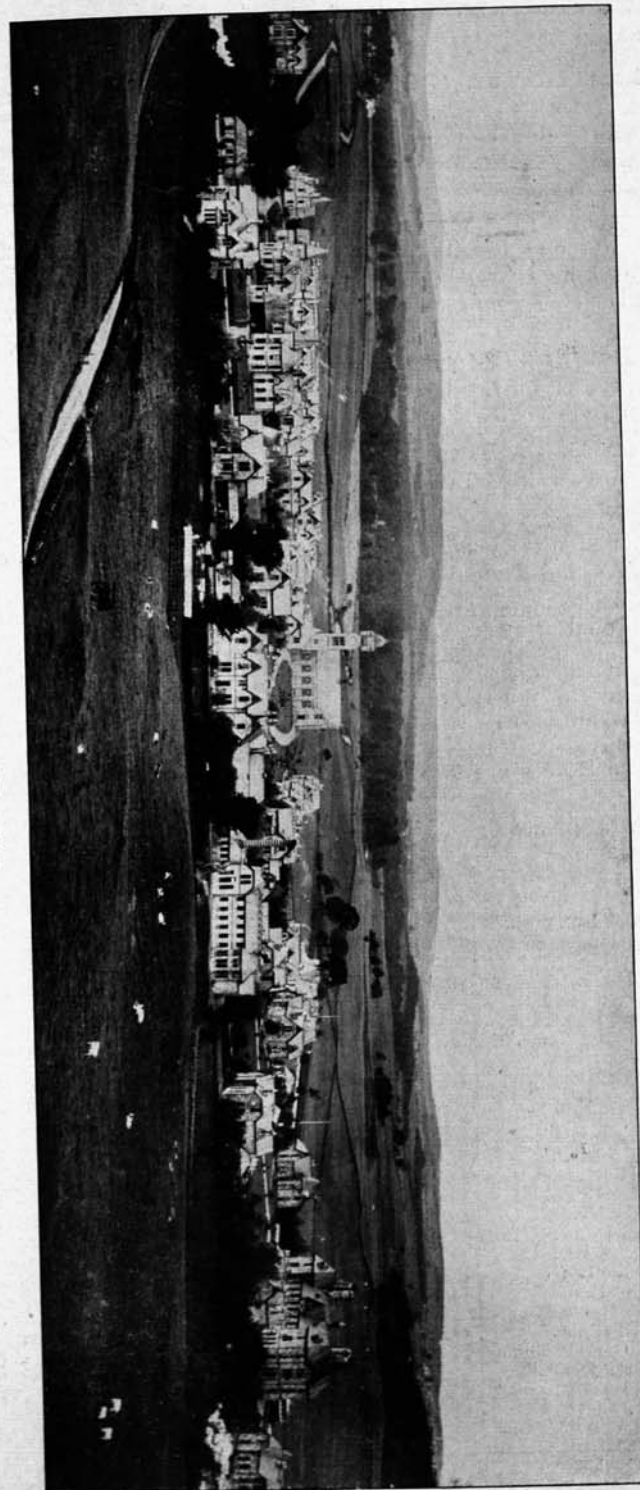

There are 69 Buildings already connected with the work. Additional Homes are still required, to cost £2,000 each; also more Sanatoria, to cost £12,000 each, and more houses for Epileptics in the Colony of Mercy to cost £2,500 to £4,000.

CLASS OF CHILDREN ELIGIBLE FOR ADMISSION.

Orphan Homes, Bridge-of-Weir.—Orphan boys and girls deprived of both parents, and children of widows, with no relative able or willing to keep them, from 1 to 14 years of age, from any part of Scotland. *Destitution is the title for admission, and there is no subscriber's line or voting paper required.*

City Home and Night Refuge, James Morrison St., Glasgow.—Children found begging, sleeping out, or destitute, from 2 to 13 years; working boys who have no home, from 14 to 18 years; and virtuous homeless young women, from 14 to 30 years of age.

Mr. Douglas, Superintendent City Orphan Home, 13 James Morrison Street, off London Street, will deal with all cases applying for admission, from 3 to 5 o'Clock P.M., on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

Pastor D. J. Findlay may be seen by appointment at the St. George's Cross Tabernacle, 284 New City Road.

Patients applying for admission to Sanatoria can see our Medical Officer, at Dispensary, 25 James Morrison Street, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, at 1.30 o'clock.

The Superintendent or Matron of the City Home will be glad to show friends through the house any day (Sabbath excepted).

The Homes at Bridge-of-Weir are also open for inspection every week-day, and visitors will be shewn round from the Central Building, at the hours of 11 A.M., 1 and 3 P.M. From one to two hours is required to see the leading parts of interest.

Trains leave St. Enoch Station (G. & S.-W. Railway) almost every hour. The Homes are two miles from Bridge-of-Weir Station.
