NARRATIVE OF FACTS.

1910.

THE history of the Orphan Homes has been one of steady growth and expansion throughout the thirty-nine years that have come and gone since 1871, when Mr. Quarrier, after seven years of work among the street boys and girls, was led to open a Home for them in an old workshop in Renfrew Lane. As we look back on the day of small things and see what God wrought through His servant in the years between our hearts are filled with wonder and thanksgiving. The one room has grown into 76 separate Buildings erected on our own land; the first destitute child has been succeeded by 14,305 others, most of whom are now men and women; the income of £1,400, which sufficed for the first year's operations, is now about £40,000 annually, and never once in the thirty-nine years has there been a meal wanting nor a penny of debt. Surely all these things call for gratitude and praise to our Heavenly Father for His unceasing care and bountiful provision. Throughout the year with which this "Narrative" deals we have had abundant tokens of God's favour, and although the "daily round" and "common task" are in these days harder and more beset with difficulties than ever before, we can yet give thanks that His grace has been sufficient at all times. Our great family of children on 1st November, 1909, numbered 1,388, and during the twelve months 343 were admitted, and 423 consumptive patients and 69 epileptic men and women were in residence, making a total of 2,223 helped. For the maintenance of these and for new buildings and other purposes we have received during the year the following sums:—

Other gifts of clothing, boots, provisions, fruit, toys, etc., have come from many helpers throughout the country, and have been God's messengers of encouragement to us times without number.

The largest amount received in one sum was £5,000 given for and expended on the enlargement of the Children's Church. Those of our friends who were with us on Thanksgiving Day, or later, will agree that the

addition is a great success, and has not in any way detracted from the beauty and comfort of our Mount Zion. Speaking of the Church reminds us anew of our indebtedness to the preachers who freely minister on Sabbaths to our congregation, and count this as part of their own parish. We feel sure they carry away with them fresh stimulus for their own people. The various departments of the work are referred to further on, and it will be sufficient here to mention them briefly.

1. The new house, Stronvar Home, is now occupied. Barnhill Home and Laurie House are in progress, and very soon after New Year we expect to break ground for the Hospital Home for Sick Children, which a friend has promised in memory of his dear wife, who took a warm interest in the children. We are still hoping for additional gifts towards the £5,000 for a Gymnasium and Swimming Bath, for which £1,000 is on hand.

We would also like to have another Home at the seaside, so that more of the workers and children could have the benefit of change and rest during our all too short summer season.

2. We are glad to notice in many circles an increased interest in the problem of consumption, and we hope for a large outcome. Meantime our Sanatoria, with 140 beds for men, women, and children, are quietly filling a gap, and have been a blessing to many sufferers. Patients from any part of Scotland are eligible, if not too far advanced, and are admitted on payment of a portion of the cost of maintenance or, if necessary, free. 423 have been in residence during the year, and many others have been helped at the Dispensary.

3. The Colony for Epileptics is growing, and we hope next year to open the third Home, which is now in the builders' hands. We will then be able to help children in addition to the men and women who occupy

the existing Homes. Another Home for men is even now a felt need, and we will rejoice if some interested friend is led of God to send £4,000 to build it.

4. The fourth branch of the work has no stone and lime to represent it, but to many labourers in the dark places of the world the Orphan Homes Mission Fund has lent a helping hand, and Missionaries of the Cross have through it been sent on their way rejoicing.

Our grateful thanks are due to the dear friends who minister to the needs of the work by prayer, gift, or otherwise, and to the devoted helpers who spend their lives with and for the needy and the suffering. It is never an easy matter to help those who have fallen by the way, and the Christian worker of to-day more than ever needs to deny self and "keep on keeping on" even in the face of seeming failure. "Let us not be weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

For the sake of friends who have not seen previous reports of the Orphan Homes the following states the basis under which the work is carried on:—

In the year 1864, Mr. Quarrier began his public work among the street boys of Glasgow by the organisation of shoeblack and newsboys' brigades. Out of these developed the Orphan Homes, which to-day provide a Home and Christian training for 1400 fatherless and orphan boys and girls of all ages. In the years between 1871, when the first Home was opened, and now, over 14,300 children have passed through the Homes, 5619 of whom have been sent to Canada. Something like £839,000 has been received in voluntary gifts, of which £280,000 has been expended on buildings, land, etc., and £559,000 on the maintenance of the Homes and Sanatoria and Colony, and Home and Foreign Missions. The work is carried on in dependence upon God for daily supplies. No one is called on personally, nor do we send out collectors. The needs are committed to God in prayer, and we look to Him to move the hearts of His people to send all that is required. The aim of the Homes is to witness to God's faithfulness, and to provide for the fatherless children of Scotland. No payment is necessary to secure their admission. Any child in any part of Scotland, if fatherless and destitute, is eligible, and friends knowing of such should apply to us at once, and thus help to save the little ones from want and misery.

We trust this 39th annual Narrative of Facts may be in no way behind its predecessors as an instrument of blessing and encouragement to those who read it. We have received many communications from friends all over the world thanking us for last year's report and telling how their own faith in God has been deepened by reading of His wonderful provision for the work He has laid to our hands to do here. The more confidently therefore do we pass on such words of encouragement as have been peculiarly precious to ourselves and make mention of donations of special interest or such as may be suggestive to others. In the following pages we shall also give a brief account of the principal events in our village during the year.

NOVEMBER, 1909.—On the threshold of another financial year we are encouraged to go forward, once more relying upon our Heavenly Father, who has so bountifully supplied our every need in the year that has gone

and set us on our journey through this new one with a larger balance than before. We praise Him for providing for us so long in advance, and pray that we may never look to our balance sheet, but far beyond it to the King's own treasury, which can never be impoverished, no matter how great be our demands upon it. God grant that we may put our whole trust in Him, but though our faith be weak, "yet He abideth faithful."

As the years roll on and one and another of our old helpers are called away, we are glad to welcome new ones, but it is very gratifying to find those who have been long familiar to us again manifesting their interest in the work by their renewed gifts. Of these we may mention 10s. from a friend in Crief; 1s. "with love and prayer;" 10s. from Shetland; Alice, Willie and Jessie, 10s.; an old helper in Lancaster, £20; and a large

consignment of clothing from the Phoebe Band, Edinburgh. An old lady of eighty-four years has sent us £5 and a parcel of socks which she herself has knitted. Another, sending 5s., says, "In the name of the Master I send this small sum on behalf of the orphans. I am now turned seventy, and as long as my Heavenly Father gives me health and strength to work I will send what little I can to His orphan children." As a contrast we have the following:—

It is with greatest pleasure and heartfelt thanks that I enclose to you six shillings for your Homes, my own boy's first week's wages. When we were little my dear mother always gave the first of everything to God.

Thanks be to God for the memory and example of such a mother.

Alongside a gift of £50 from an English health resort comes sixpence in stamps; £1 is a "thanksgiving for answered prayers;" a grateful mother sends 12s.; from one who adopted a little boy some years ago and hopes some day to get a little sister for him, we have £2 as a thankoffering for health unexpectedly restored to one of his horses; and from an old girl the following:—

"I hope the work is still going on the same down in the village, and that Mrs. Burges and yourself are both keeping well, as I must say I am quite well and healthy, and that I do not forget all that was done for me while I was in the Homes, and as an offering of thankfulness for all that was done for me I send on this small gift of ten shillings.

One who wishes to be known as "a Scotch Thistle," writes:—

Please accept this very small tribute to the Orphan's treasury from one who has benefited by that same treasury and is very grateful. My earnest prayer is that our Father in Heaven may bless you all, more and more abundantly.

A Sabbath School in Pretoria has sent 30s.; another in Dublin, £1 7s. 6d.; whilst a third has supplied some Hallowe'en apples and nuts for our bairns. From "an exiled Scot" we have a few articles of clothing; from New Zealand a bank draft for £20, and one for £10 from South Australia, "in the name of our Lord Jesus," besides £2 from West Africa.

Twelve boys and ten girls have been added to our family this month, and of the ten who have left us we have placed four in situations, where they will be able to maintain themselves.

For the benefit of friends who were not able to be present at our annual meeting on 22nd inst. we insert the following extract from the *Glasgow Herald*:—

The thirty-eighth annual meeting in connection with the Orphan Homes of Scotland was held yesterday afternoon in the Christian Institute, Glasgow. Mr. A. Cameron Corbett, M.P., presided, and among those present were Sir Samuel Chisholm, Dr. W. L. Reid, Mr. Alexander Sloan, C.A.; Mr. J. P. Maclay, the Rev. Gordon D. Watt, the Rev. William Ruthven, Mr. Alexander Mackie, Mr. D. J. Knox, and others.

The Chairman, in opening the proceedings, said he could think of no more inspiring meeting than that in connection with the Orphan Homes of Scotland. What a vast work was carried on in that institution. During the past year no fewer than 351 children had been admitted to the Homes, and over £40,000 had been received in aid of the work. (Applause.) Besides what was being done at the Orphanage, the trustees had, by inaugurating the consumptive sanatoria, given a lead which others must largely follow, and the work which was being done at the colony of mercy for epileptics was beyond question of a beneficial nature. It might be argued by critical people that there must be some inner explanation as to the success of this institution for the carrying on of which such an abundance of money came in without solicitation. But there was no inner explanation. The late Mr. Quarrier had the utmost faith that his work would be continued, and the success which attended the Homes to-day was the divine recognition of that faith.

Mr. J. P. Maclay submitted the annual report. It showed that on November 1, 1908, there were 1,355 boys and girls residing in the Homes, and during the year 351 new cases had been admitted, making a total of 1,706 dealt with. In the consumptive sanatoria 431 patients were treated during the year, while in the colony of mercy for epileptics there were in residence at the beginning of the year 31 men. During the twelve months 7 men and 16 women were admitted and 14 patients had been discharged, leaving 40 in residence. The gross income for the year had exceeded £40,620, and that amount had covered every need in every department of the work, while there was a satisfactory balance on loan and in bank. The hope was expressed that a continuance of the liberal support which had hitherto been accorded the Homes would be experienced during the coming year.

Mr. Alexander Sloan moved that the reports be adopted. The work being done in those Homes, he said, could not be over-estimated, and it was pleasing to observe the interest which was being taken in them. He trusted that interest would long be manifested, and that the excellent effort which had been initiated by Mr. Quarrier and in the future of which he had such faith, would further prosper.

Sir Samuel Chisholm seconded, and the reports were adopted.

Dr. W. L. Reid, Pastor Findlay, and others spoke, and hymns were rendered by a number of children from the Bridge of Weir Homes.

According to our usual custom, on the evening of our annual meeting the bairns had a special tea, after which they all adjourned to the Church to hear the songs and recitations which our choir had rendered in Glasgow, and also for the distribution of the prizes for gardening. Around the playground of each Home there are a number of little gardens which are planted with flowers in the spring. Thereafter they are taken care of by the boys and girls themselves, and three prizes are awarded in each Home at the end of the season for those best-kept.

DECEMBER, 1909.—Perhaps at no time of the year are we so busy as in the month of December. At other times different sections of our staff are specially pressed by duties, but during the last four weeks of the year everyone is working at the highest pressure. Every day seems to feel the cheerful glow that radiates from Christmas, and all rejoice to make this festive season as bright and happy as they can. Each child in our big family is looking forward to receive some fruit from the trees on New Year's Day, and so many minds and hands are busy choosing, making up, and labelling presents for the bairns. Night after night the School gives back the echo to the songs and choruses that are to entertain us on the first evening of a new year. Each cottage has its own peculiar preparations, and the helpers at the stores have all they can do to deal out the extra supplies which innumerable parties require. To meet all our ordinary requirements and provide these little Yuletide luxuries we have received a vast number of gifts from very many kind friends whose hearts have been touched by the spirit of an old time Christmas, and it is the acknowledging of these, together with the despatching of our New Year Letter that keeps our office staff going from early morning till late at night.

Many donations, large and small, have come to hand for the extraordinary expenses of the month. Of these, £5 is "to help along the little ones' Christmas;" £1 "to help your Christmas dinner;" two boxes of toys "for two wee Willies, in memory of my wee Willie who has gone home;" six boxes of oranges; and $7\frac{1}{2}$ dozen books for the Christmas tree. A family in the East of Scotland who have often helped at this time have sent over £450, and our invalid girls in "Oswald" Home have again been remembered with special gifts.

A friend sending £3 10s. says, "It is indeed a great object lesson to find your wants supplied so steadily by your faithful reliance in our Heavenly Father. This should be helpful to all." From another comes the following:—

Many thanks for sending me your "Narrative." I so enjoyed reading it, and, I trust, also encouraged to go on in the ways of the Lord. The same yesterday, to-day, and forever, may He Himself keep us all humble and trusting in Himself, "for He is our life." I enclose P.O. for 5s., remembering 1 Chron. xxix. 14, "Of Thine own have we given Thee." It may provide a brick in the proposed Servants' Cottage.

For the same purpose we have received two other gifts of 5s. £1 has been collected by a few friends for the Epileptics, and another has sent £5 with some evergreens and fruit for them.

A great multitude of children have sent along with their gifts their good wishes for our bairns' Christmas and New Year. Sometimes a child's contribution to a missionary box is not given very willingly, but it is particularly gratifying to know that such a large number of our young helpers really give heartily and think kindly of their poorer brethren. From three boys we have 5s., which is part of saved pennies and ha'pennies; four small children have written to say, "We wish to send eight shillings to your boys and girls, and hope they will all have a merry Christmas and a happy New Year;" £1 5s. 6d. is a contribution from the teachers and pupils of an Edinburgh day school; a boy sends 3s. 6d. collected by

him from the members of his family; and, in a boy's childish hand, we have a blunt little note which from its very brusqueness speaks volubly of the tender heart of pity behind it. He says, "Here is some money from my box for the poor children."

Twenty-seven children have been added to our family this month, and seven have left—five of whom have been returned to friends who are now in a position to keep them—thus making an increase of twenty, but with the growing need there is ever our Heavenly Father's growing provision, of which the following is an illustration:—

I enclose my cheque in your favour for £2 10s. in payment of my annual subscription, and ten shillings more this time as your work is so greatly increased.

"His grace is sufficient for the years to come," is the cheering message

of one dear friend, and, "He having begun this good work will carry it on," comes as an assurance through another.

Quite a number of friends from time to time send sufficient to keep a child in the Homes for a year, and this month one of these encloses £1 9s. "to finish our year's subscription of £13 for our little orphan." Side by side with this we place a sum of 5s. from one who, not being able to do so much, but with as deep an interest, "hath done what she could," and says, "Please accept this small gift (I give it with a glad heart). It will help to keep some little one a week."

Four years ago we sent a boy to Canada, and this month he called to see the old folks and the old Home, leaving with us £2 as a token of gratitude before returning again to the Dominion. An old girl sends 5s. "In remembrance of loving kindness received." Other two have each added 5s. to our treasury, whilst a fourth encloses £1 with this—

As to-morrow is the first anniversary of our dear sister's death, I thought I would like to send you the enclosed little gift.

One who was a boy in the City Home sends 10s. on the anniversary of his marriage, and 2s. 6d. from his two bairns whom his wife and he are seeking to bring up in the fear of the Lord.

Portugal, Montreal, New Jersey, Mafeking, British Central Africa, California, and Natal, have all been represented on this month's donation list, as well as all classes and conditions in our own island, from the poor mother of a big family who sends 6d. to the mother and son who subscribe £50.

Among the donations in kind, besides a large quantity of very much appreciated articles of clothing, so necessary in such a severe winter as this has been, we may note 2 sheep, 38 rabbits, 2 boxes of fish, and a pair of socks, to which was sewed a P.O. for 5s.

Mention was made in last year's Report of our boys' annual camping holiday, and already £2 10s. has come in for that purpose.

A sum of £20 has also come to hand for emigration work, which, with the opening of the year, will soon be occupying our thoughts.

On the evening of Friday, the 17th inst., our usual Workers' Fellowship and Prayer Meeting was held in the new workshop at the Colony of Mercy, which was then dedicated to the Master's use in the service of the poor afflicted sufferers from epilepsy. The building, though plain, is a thing of beauty and well fitted to do service as a meeting-place or concert hall, as well as a workshop for the male colonists. Such simple dedicatory services as occur here from time to time are always a wonderful blessing to ourselves and the friends who gather with us, and it was with hearts full of praise and gratitude that we wended our way homewards to our own big village, remembering that not a very long time ago it too was in its infancy.

Santa Claus does not visit us till New Year's Day, so our friends can imagine the state of our children as we close our diary for the last month of the old year and leave the bairns to enjoy the short interval of anticipation that is still theirs ere a new day and a new year bring the realisation of what they have hoped for so long.

JANUARY, 1910.—A year ago the shadow of a great loss hung upon us through the home-call of our helper Mr. M'Fadzean, but the opening day of 1910 was one brimful of pleasure to the big family at Bridge-of-Weir. What Christmas was to Charles Dickens, New

Year's Day has been to us and ours for more than a generation past, and not even he could have picked a fault with anything we did to make this day live in the memories of our bairns for many years to come. On such a day as thi they need no second bidding to awake from sleep, and long ere the sun has risen the festivities have commenced with a real "tea breakfast." A little tidying up and a great deal of impatient anticipation fill up the time before a turkey, roast beef, and plum pudding dinner, after which all is bustle and hurry to get to Church in time for the great event of the day—the dismantling of the trees and boat which many willing hands had loaded with gifts, useful and ornamental, the afternoon before. An opening prayer of thanksgiving to God for all His rich provision in the year that has gone and for the blessings of the day, a song of praise, and then begins the work of distribution. And such a scene is witnessed as would warm the heart of the most callous misanthrope. The afternoon is all too short a space in which to try the prowess of their newly-acquired aeroplanes, motor cars, and various other mechanical diversions, and reluctantly they lay them by so that there may be time for a special tea before assembling again in Church for the evening entertainment and united family worship which has ever been the fit conclusion to our New Year's Day.

For a very long time a dear old friend has been in the habit of knitting about a hundred pairs of socks for our children every year, but failing health has prevented her from knitting much now, and so she sends £4 5s. to buy wool. Two guineas come from another old lady who says, "I am in my eighty-second year, but I promise myself (if spared a little longer) the pleasure of seeing again this standing miracle of God's faithfulness and goodness."

About two hundred different Sabbath Schools and various meetings for young people have sent us their contributions amounting to more than £200. Three children of an old helper have remembered us with 30s.; £5 13s. 7d. has come from a Working Boys' and Girls' Religious Society; £1 from a junior sewing class; and 3s. from two children in a northern county.

Of the gifts received for the Colony of Mercy 10s. is from Massachusetts, and with two guineas we have the following:—

Enclosed you will find £2 2s. towards helping on that merciful work you are doing—opening doors and making a home in reality for the poor epileptics who are denied what they require to save them in all our institutions throughout Scotland. It is not a large sum, £1 of which was made by tablet made and sold and the other £1 2s. by contributions from a few friends, but I trust it will have our Father's blessing, and help a little your great work of love. My sister and I have resolved to do whatever we can to fill up mother's place, so that while she is gone her work for these afflicted ones may not be forgotten by us nor lost to them.

From beyond the Atlantic we have received five dollars from Alberta; 10 dollars from British Columbia; 25 dollars from Ontario; 10 dollars from a Philadelphia minister; 14 dollars from a husband who has given his first week's wages in a new situation, to which he has moved to make a home for his wife and family; 3 dollars from one of our girls, now married; and enclosed in the following letter, 5 dollars from a girl who left us in June last year.

I have just received your New Year Letter to-day, and was so glad to get it. Yet I am sorry to hear of Miss Miller's death. We are wearying to see someone

from the old home. I am sending 5 dollars. I meant to send it for Christmas or New Year, but found I couldn't, but I know you won't mind and that you will accept them just the same. I have had a very happy Christmas and received quite a number of presents. I still try hard to lead a good Christian life, but I miss the help I received when in the Homes. Miss — helped me a great deal. I think I will stop now, wishing you a very happy New Year.

Such a letter as this brings real encouragement, not only because of the gift enclosed, but also and more so, since it tells that the seed sown here has borne abundant fruit in the writer's life, and that the ministry of God's servant has neither been forgotten nor in vain.

Several others who once were numbered in our family, and are still included in our prayers, have helped to meet our daily needs. One of

these says, "I shall still sign myself your old girl," and another in a situation in this country writes—

Just a few lines in answer to the nice letter you sent me some time ago. It was a most interesting letter indeed, as there are always changes, and one always likes to hear of the work that is going on in the Homes. I am still liking my place and getting on very well. Since I came Miss — has taken me to quite a lot of places, and I have enjoyed it very much. They just make it like home for me. This is just a small gift I am sending you, which I hope you will receive all right. It is not much, but it is with the greatest of pleasure I send it.

Six large donations varying from thirty to seven hundred pounds, and including one from Cheshire, have amounted to £1,180, of which £150 has been placed to the account of the emigration fund. Twenty shillings has come from Coventry; twelve pairs of socks from South Devon, and £1 15s. from Dornoch, besides two gifts amounting to £6 from friends in far-off Australia.

To maintain a girl in "James Wilson" Home £12 has been sent; £6 10s., a half-yearly instalment towards the upkeep of a boy; as much more as will keep a girl, from a gentleman and his family; and other two gifts of £12 10s. to support two more children in the Homes for the current year. A donor who usually sent us a like amount writes—

I took in hand my cheque book to write my usual sum, £12 10s. There was an impression on my mind as if a voice said, "double it." Immediately there was opposition thus, "You must keep in mind the many other claims pressing at this time." However, I was enabled to overcome this other voice and humbly and sincerely make out the cheque for the sum of £25, and with earnest prayer for much blessing on all your labours on behalf of God's orphans.

£1 has been added to our funds by the mother of two children helped; 12s. comes from another grateful mother; £2 from a "Women's Own"; a birthday gift of £3; two memorial gifts of £2 each; 40 copies of "Black-board Talks"; £1 "from a farm servant who was early left an orphan"; over 300 garments besides toys, books, etc., from a branch of the Scotch Girls' Friendly Society; 12s. 6d. "being a working man's thankoffering for 1909"; and 3s., with the following note:—

I hope you will not be offended at my widow's mite. It is years since I hoped some day to help in some little way, but this time it is only paying a vow I made to God. I have my only boy an orphan in Canada who wrote me every week, but was this time three. I tried to plead to God on his behalf and promised a little to your work if I had good news. My boy could not get letters away, as the rivers were frozen where he is, but I had a letter from him last week, and he was well. So accept my small contribution from a sailor's widow.

The first four weeks of 1910 have brought into our family twenty-one boys and fifteen girls, but sixteen have gone out from us during the same time, so that we shall begin a new month with twenty additional children to provide for. The loving Father who has cast so many new cases on our care, and will most surely meet their every need, has called to Himself two of His own little ones, and one of our "James Arthur" sailors has gone to seek his fortune on the deep. For him especially our hearts go up to God that he may be kept safe from every danger and temptation peculiar to his calling.

FEBRUARY, 1910.—"Will you please get an orange for all the children for to-morrow," was the request which reached us on the first day of this month from one who has long taken a great interest in the work and does not forget to bring the children and the children's needs before his Heavenly Father. The young people attending a Sabbath Forenoon Meeting have sent 10s. to help to build a block for little ones at the Colony of Mercy, and £10 1s. 6d. has come as the proceeds of a cake and candy sale held by some young friends in Glasgow. 10s. has come from one who was an inmate of the City Home, and a like sum from one who used to be at Bridge-of-Weir. A girl sending 5s. writes:—

I am sorry for not writing sooner and thanking you for the nice New Year Letter! Oh! How pleased I am to have it! It is my greatest pleasure to send you this little sum of money to show a little what was done for me while I was in the Homes. I was telling the ladies at the Y.W.C.A. it is just like home for me to look back to. They got a fright when they asked me how many were in the Homes, and I said, "Fifteen hundred, if not more." They said to me, "My —! How can they keep it up?" and I said, "All that they do is pray and God answers them."

Day by day we seek to instil into the young minds of those who sojourn here that the great petition, "Give us this day our daily bread," is no vain repetition, and that the unbroken, undelayed provision for them is the direct fulfilment of God's promise to be "a Father of the fatherless." It is our earnest hope that all our children may fully realise and appreciate the fact that it is to God and God alone we look to meet each rising need, and such a testimony as we have above proves that our efforts in this direction have not been fruitless.

This month's gifts in kind have included ten bags of sugar and two deer, besides a large and useful donation of clothing from members of a sewing society, who have also sent £8 15s. to be equally divided between the Homes and the Sanatoria.

Five memorial gifts have been recorded, and of these one is "in memory of our little boy Robert." £2 has come from a New Zealand Sabbath School; £1 from an Orkney orphan; £5 from our old friend "Fellowship;" £6 16s. 6d. from a "Willing Helpers' Society" towards the Emigration expenditure; and £5 2s. 9d. from the Highland Society in New Brunswick.

A lady sending £2 for the Sanatoria, writes:—

I enclose a small donation to the Sanatorium with my thanks for your kindness in taking into your Home a woman whom I recommended to you as a very deserving case. She has written to me telling me of the great kindness she has received and also of the benefit she has derived from the treatment.

Our largest gift for February is one of £400 from two friends who ask that £100 of this amount be placed to the credit of the Consumption Sanatoria. A cheque for £100 is to be divided equally between the Homes and Emigration work. Another friend has sent £50, and another £20 to take some of our boys to Canada. Besides, we have received several smaller gifts for the same purpose, and a large number of donations sent for the object most in need at the time of receipt have been put aside to defray the passage and outfit of more young emigrants. The month's legacies have amounted to £1,318 8s. 5d. for the Homes, and £500 each for the Sanatoria and Colony. A faithful donor, "Inasmuch," has again contributed 20s.; and £18 19s. 6d. (of which £5 is for emigration expenses) has come to us from the office of *The Christian*; 2s. 6d. has reached us from a boy in the South of England, with this little note:—

I trust you will accept this small gift towards your Homes. It is my first earnings which I wish to give to God as a thankoffering for all the blessings I have received from His hand. Hoping your Homes will still continue to prosper.

Having honoured the Lord with his substance, we pray that he may receive the reward of "plenty" which the Scripture promises to those who give of their increase. A donor sending £10 for emigration purposes has remembered the work of the Colony of Mercy with £5, whilst a gift of £20 is accompanied by the following:—

I have pleasure in enclosing cheque for £20 for your Orphan Homes, and congratulate you on the good fruit that they bear for the wellbeing of Canada.

Quite a number of letters from our old boys and girls have already been given, as we feel that by doing so we can best convey to our kind donors their true condition after leaving us. Moreover, so many friends have intimated their interest in and appreciation of these that we are anxious to give as many of them as we can.

Though there are many of our family scattered throughout the Homeland we have fewer letters from these, because the chances of a personal return to the old place are frequent, but the majority of our greater family across the ocean have to rest content with correspondence. A girl who left us in the summer of 1908 writes a long and interesting letter from which we make an extract:—

It seems to be such a long time since I have written to you. I received your loving New Year Letter. There have been so many changes, yet the dear old Home seems always to be the same. When a person leaves the place where they have spent so many happy days it makes them feel endeared to it more. Well, the New Year has begun with its new resolves. How many of us keep them? I am well just now, hoping you are also. I am enclosing two dollars. It seems to me to be very little to give, but when a girl's money isn't in her own keeping she has just to take what she gets. I am glad it is not, for I would have none saved. This is the first, but I hope it will help a little to supply the needs. I feel very grateful for what was done for me in the three years I was among you. There is no place like home. I do not want you to thank me for this, for it is only my duty to God. Was so pleased to hear you need a bit put to the church, for it lets me see that there are ever more to follow. Now it is bedtime. I still keep to the old rule—bed at 8 o'clock. In fact, we all go then. Some mornings we are not up till 7 o'clock in the winter, but in summer it is five every morning. Now I must close, trusting this will reach you safely. Ever yours gratefully.

The net increase in our numbers this month is thirteen, and of the sixteen who have been taken off our list seven have been placed in the care of relatives who have satisfied us that they can afford them a suitable home. Four have been placed in situations, and one little one has been adopted. Again the hand of Death has removed one from our midst.

MARCH, 1910.—Every corner in our village is full, and more than full with the large addition of forty-one new cases of whom twenty-four are boys. The dismissals curiously enough amount to sixteen, being the same as the two months previous, but ere another month has gone we expect to delete at least a hundred names from the family register, and our whole population is just on the *qui vive* to know who these may be. At the beginning of March a list of those desirous of emigrating to Canada was made up, and as this was too large, reductions had to be made. Objections of relatives, considerations of conduct and expediency, together with the doctor's veto, all combine to exclude such as would prove unsuitable and to bring the numbers within the limits of our funds.

To defray the cost of the coming exodus we have a gift of £20 from a South Ayrshire dairy farmer; £5 from some friends interested in one of the emigrants; £1 from the grandmother of other two; and £20 from another friend to cover the passages and outfit of two more. Besides these, a large number of donations (to be used at our own discretion) from 5s. to £50 have been allocated to the same fund.

A week seldom passes without one or more gifts of bread, cakes, scones, etc., from a number of bakers and purveyors, and for such we are very thankful. Other donations in kind have been two tons of potatoes; 14 trees; 22 articles of clothing from a lady and her two maids; 14 articles and a watch from another; three articles knitted by an old lady aged eighty-five; quantities of clothing from a branch of the B.W.T.A., and several branches of the Y.W.C.A.; and six carvings valued at 25s. from one who says, "Nae siller tae send, hope you will get them sold."

One who used to send us half his prize money, writes to say :—

I have no sheep now, and consequently no prize money to send you, but I enclose you cheque for £5 to assist you in your noble and much blest work. Praying that the Divine blessing may rest on it and you.

Two girls have sent three guineas, the proceeds of a sale of work-Sabbath Schools, from Wick to Lockerbie and from Oban to Montrose, have had a share in supplying our wants this month. Three little loving friends have contributed £1, "the proceeds of saving and work done at odd times ;" and with the donations of a few others has come the following explanation :—

We the teachers of the senior classes of — S.S. forward to you the sum of 23s., being the amount raised by them for the children of Quarrier's Orphan Homes. Some time ago the children came to us and asked our help in raising money for your Homes. There are only six of them altogether—4 boys and 2 girls—and we got up a concert in the church and some of them made candy and sold it. We forward this money to you, and though it may seem a small item, yet to the boys and girls of our classes it seems quite a large sum, and has meant quite a lot of hard work. We are also asked on behalf of the classes if there is any possibility of us visiting the Homes at an early date that they may see for themselves, and perhaps they may on a future occasion raise a larger sum. We pray that the blessing of God may continue with you, and that He shall prosper your work.

Two legacies, amounting to £200 and £152 5s. 4d. respectively, have been paid, and several who were once with us as children have sent tokens of their gratitude. The following letter from one of our old boys, who was a long time with us and is now in business on his own account in Canada, will be read with great interest :—

Just a few lines to let you know how I am doing since I started out for myself. I may say I have been doing well, although I took over the business in a poor time of the year, but I am well pleased at the good success I have made so far. Although some days seem dull and not much doing, yet I do not worry over it. Summer will soon be here and things will go much better. We have had a mild winter and are having an early spring. How are all the people at the dear old spot? I suppose there are quite a few changes in the past few years. I don't suppose I would know any of the children now. I should have liked very much to have received your Annual Report for last year. However, I was pleased to have your New Year Letter, which I enjoyed very much indeed. But if it is not too much trouble I should like if you could send one, because I have an interest in the good work you are carrying on. It is my prayer that the day will come when I shall be able to give to the grand and good work. I shall be pleased to hear from you at any time, but will be on the lookout for a letter in the near future.

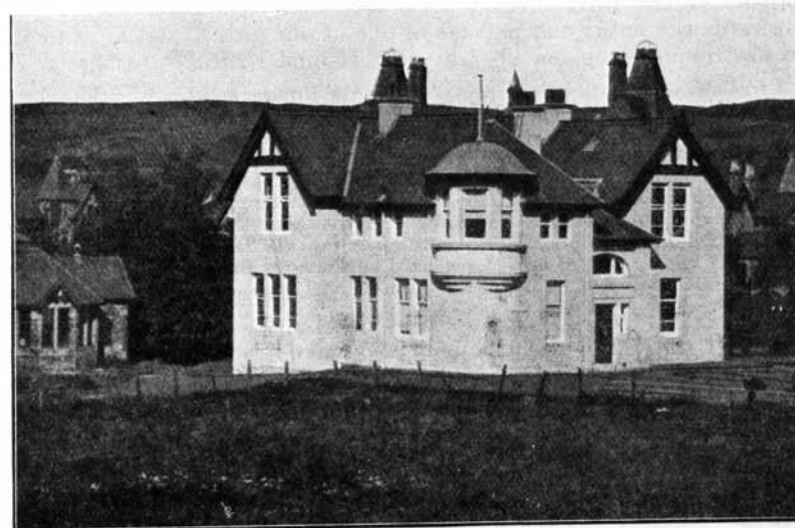
Other donations this month have been—10s., "a thankoffering to God for His goodness to me and mine;" £12 to support a girl; three separate gifts from South Africa; 10s. from Belfast; £1 from New South Wales; and £10 from one who says, "I have read your letter in to-night's *Citizen*, and beg to hand you cheque for £10 from a sympathiser towards your good work."

On the eighteenth of the month at a meeting of the trustees, convened to consider the enlargement of our Church, a letter was received from a friend promising to defray the entire cost of the proposed addition. This very generous donation not only brought a thrill of joy and gladness to every one in our village, but served as a stimulus to our faith in the Almighty Father who sends the money just when we need it—never a moment too late. May our trust in Him increase till we expect and cease to be surprised at any of His gifts!

In the Church on the evening of the 21st inst. we had the annual distribution of school prizes, most coveted amongst which were the silver watches awarded to the dux boy and girl for the past year. The former is an intending emigrant, and we expect great things from him in the land of his adoption, where there are so many facilities for improving one's education, and where the highest academical distinction is more easy of access to the hard working student than in the Homeland.

On the succeeding night the last meeting for the present season of the Girls' Guildry was held in the Central Hall and took the form of a social. Every Tuesday night during the winter our older girls have met as a branch of the Girls' Guildry, and once a month the usual work has been relieved by an entertainment provided in turn by the various squads.

The last Saturday of the month was marked as a red-letter day by the visit of a gentleman who gave us the promise of a much-needed and long

desired Cottage Hospital for the treatment of acute cases of illness. It will be a memorial to his wife, who took a keen and practical interest in the work, and besides keeping her memory fragrant will afford more room in our invalid Homes for the treatment of those who require special care.

APRIL, 1910.—Again the time has come for us to bid good-bye to our Boys' Canadian Party. This year they number exactly a hundred, and are to be looked after on the journey by our helpers, Mr. Anderson, and Mr. W. Douglas. The customary adieux were said at Greenock, and sadness sweetened with joy filled our hearts as we committed them to our Heavenly Father to guide them safely to the other shore and through all the untried paths that lie ahead. In ten days a cable message brought us the good news of the safe arrival of the whole party at "Fairknowe," and a few days afterwards a letter informed us that the sea passage had been an exceptionally fine one.

The following is from a girl who left us in 1906 :—

I received your letter on Tuesday morning, and with it the tracts and post cards which I thought pretty indeed. In my last letter I mentioned that I would help the church by giving a little money towards its enlargement. I am sending ten dollars with this letter instead of next Fall. There has been unusual excitement in our neighbourhood this month. There was a wedding on the ninth and another on the twenty-second. As they were both church weddings I was present at the marriage ceremonies. We have had nice warm weather this week, but we expect it will snow to-morrow or the next day. I suppose that when the boys sail for Canada it will almost be time for the children in Bridge-of-Weir to think of May Day and of the races, as I know they cause some excitement. I hope that it won't be long before I can go back to Bridge-of-Weir, and I wonder if I will recognise everyone whom I used to know?

"To send a boy to Canada" two helpers have given £10. Another in Edinburgh has sent an equal amount for emigration, and a third sum of £10 has come as "a thankoffering," to be used in the same way. A Glasgow Company of The Boys' Brigade have asked that their donation of 30s. go towards the outfit and passage of one of our girls; and a gentleman who has frequently given liberally to this fund writes :—

I was absent when I usually contribute to the Homes, and I now enclose cheque for £250 for the fund for emigrating suitable boys and girls in the Homes to Canada, with the sincere wish that those who go out there under the very well worked out conditions in which you send them, will turn out as well and in as large a proportion as those sent in former years. If they do I feel sure that with the continued large percentage of unemployed here they will have a better opportunity of turning out well, and leading fuller, happier, and more useful lives than they could if they returned to the surroundings from which they were taken into the Homes. I shall be glad to contribute a further sum of £2 10s. per head on the boys and girls sent out this year up to my previous limit of a total of £500, when I hear from you as to the sum that will be required.

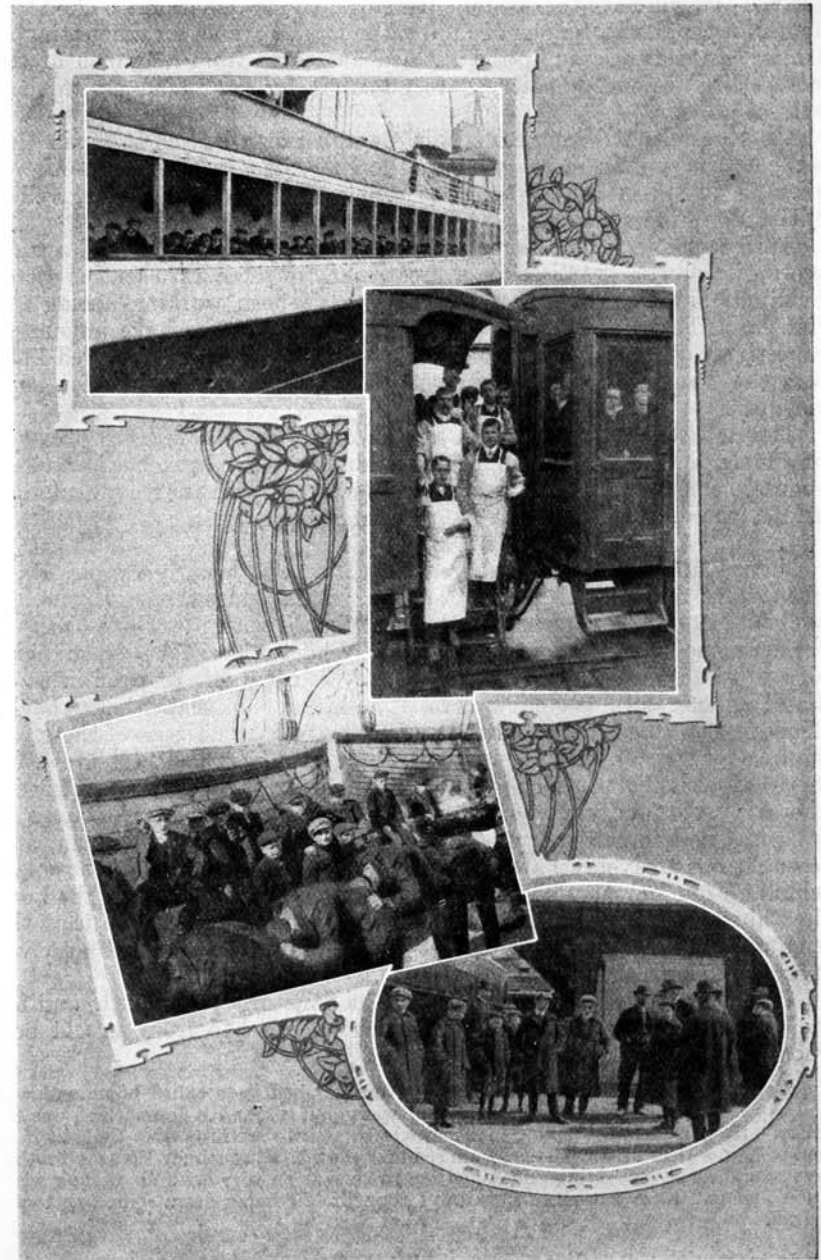
We feel grateful to all our donors who make it possible for us to carry on this branch of the work which has ever been most successful. To help children in this way is no ordinary charity, but an appreciation of the fact that the great Dominion has better opportunities in many ways than we have here, and that we in return for these can supply it with worthy citizens who will one day bring wealth to the land of their adoption and credit to the land of their nativity.

No less than three gifts have reached us from "Thrums," one being from a Bible Class, another from a Boys' Brigade Company, and a third from a branch of the B.W.T.A. 2s. 6d. has come from one who often helps and takes the name of "Topaz." A lady writes to say, "I have had a little meeting all winter of a few mothers. The enclosed 10s. is their own contribution of halfpennies and pennies." A guinea has been sent by the men of an Ayrshire Brotherhood, and a friend sending £2 10s. for the Homes has enclosed £1 for the Home and Foreign Missions Fund.

Children's gifts this month have included £4 from a boys' boarding school; £2 2s. from the children in a Sabbath School, who intimate their intention of coming to see the place for themselves; and the following from a school in Inverness :—

We have just had a little sale of work in aid of different charities, and would be glad if you would accept 10s. in aid of your fund. We are very much interested in and are very glad to be able to help you in your good work.

In memory of a fellow labourer in the work we have received 10s., and a shilling in stamps is sent as "an old worker's mite." "An invalid's

mite," as well as 10s. from a few warehouse girls, have also been gratefully received and will have the Master's blessing. Of the donations to hand this month for the Sanatoria one of £100 is the largest; another amounting to 10s. is "In memoriam;" and a third has come from a branch of the Scotch Girls' Friendly Society, "in gratitude for your kindness to their little neighbour."

£28 10s. collected from friends in Campbeltown has come again this year; £8 is sent in memory of the donor's sister, with the promise of other £8 in six months to keep an orphan girl, and £10 have travelled all the way from Shanghai.

April seems to be the favourite closing time for all manner of sewing meetings and work parties, for a great many of these have sent us useful contributions of clothing at which they have been working during the winter and have just now got finished. Three legacies have amounted respectively to £1,000, £500, and £270, and again we have received £150 from the Thomas Porter Equipment Fund to provide outfits for boys and girls.

The departure of so many boys to Canada has relieved the pressure for a little, but during the month our admissions have broken all previous records, being three in advance of May last year with its record number of forty-three. Twenty-six of the new arrivals are girls.

MAY, 1910.—Our time-honoured May Day, and latterly Empire Day, celebrations must stand aside at such a time as this when we, with all loyal subjects of the British Empire, and indeed with the whole civilised world, are mourning the loss of our king. Whilst it has ever been our chief duty to teach our children to "fear God" and one day to be citizens of His Kingdom, still we have always endeavoured that they should "honour the king" and be fitted to become worthy citizens of the great empire over which our late beloved King Edward has ruled so righteously. On the afternoon of the 19th inst. we held a memorial service in the Church, where as a big family we poured out our thanks to God for the one who has gone, and for all the prosperity vouchsafed to us in his reign, and besought our Heavenly Father to bind up the broken hearts of those left behind. From our hearts we say "God save the king," and may the Lord bless him and keep him, guiding him in all affairs of State so that the reign of George V. may be marked by peace and prosperity and a revival of true religion.

£1,100 has been paid in legacies for the Sanatoria this month, and for the Orphan Homes £617 4s. 10d., which includes £5 from an old boy whose sister writes:—

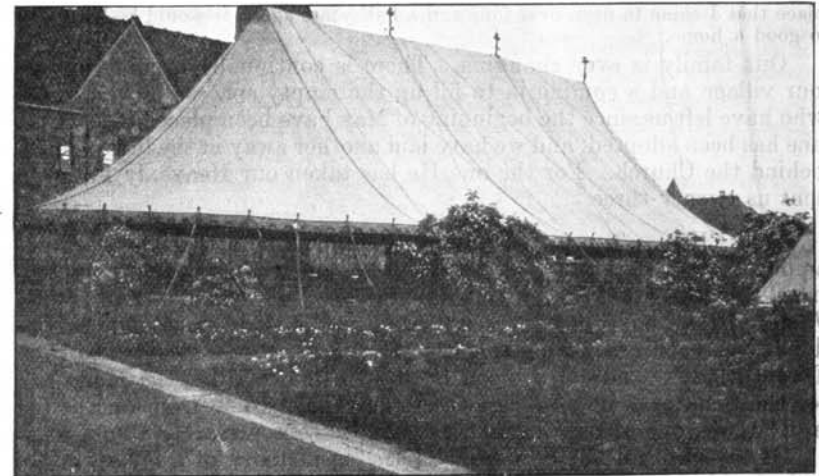
I suppose you will have heard that my brother had been called home and was glad to go. He told me not to be sad for he was going to be with Jesus which was far better. He had Mr. — seeing him and was so glad to see him. He thought it so kind of him. Dear Miss Quarrier, I am sending you this little money that my brother gave me when he was dying and asked me to send it on to you to do as you wish. I don't think I have any more to say. I thought of coming down some day to see you all.

It was with great joy that we accepted perhaps the most suggestive gift of the month, and the first of its kind which has added £500 to the funds of the Consumption Sanatoria. This amount has been given by a

brother and sister to provide a bed "in loving remembrance" of their father, who for a long time took a very kindly interest in the children under our care.

By this time the whole of our boys will have got settled down in their new homes across the sea, but only some have found time amid their new surroundings and occupations to write. One of these says:—

I am now settled in the above address. It is not a very large farm, but there is plenty of work to do. I will not go into the details of the place, for you will perhaps be tired of hearing how many cattle, etc. My master and mistress are good folks. They have three little girls and one baby boy. I get four dollars per month, but I intend to work hard, very hard, and get more money and make something of the life which God has given me. I live next to the farm, and am in the same Sabbath School as an old boy who came out four years ago. The lady who is my S.S. teacher has one of our girls. She also is a very good lady and a kind mistress. The Canadians are rare folks, kind and hospitable. I know a good many farmers already, and all are

willing to give a helping hand. Every one you pass gives a cheery "good day," and it all helps to cheer you. I think this will do for my first letter, so I close expecting a letter from you in return soon. It will cheer me greatly. Thanks very much for the good outfit.

Two Christian Endeavour Societies and nine Bible Classes have subscribed towards the maintenance of the bairns. Two donations have arrived from New South Wales; £5 4s. from Natal; £1 from Queensland; £5 from St. Helens; and £6 13s. has been collected by a lady from friends in Largs and Manchester.

A gift of £5 is "in memory of little Aliak," and of the larger donations £20 is from Greenock "for emigration of two boys;" £50 from two brothers; a similar amount from "R. D. M.;" £10 from another friend for emigration; and £25 from an old business friend in the city.

Articles of clothing have been sent from a branch of the Y.W.C.A. in Kirkwall, and another in Moffat, but without doubt the most unusual addition to our stock are two scarves, "a man's first attempts at knitting."

A mother has forwarded £1 left with her by her son for the Homes, and two of our old girls have sent 5s. each. Another writes from Canada as follows :—

It is some time since I have written to you. I wrote to Mr. Findlay after getting the New Year Letter. He sent me an almanac with his and Mrs. Findlay's picture in it. Last night Mrs. H. and myself went to church, or rather we started to go, but we got into a very nasty water hole. Then we turned around and came home again. It was as well we did as about the time church came out it commenced to rain and was so dark one could not see a yard ahead. The creek is overflowed now, and we expect to have some skating. . . . I had to stop writing last night to do some sewing, and to-night I got an almanac and a little booklet out of the post office. W. is sitting opposite me studying British history, and as she happens to be at the Battle of Bannockburn, she of course reads it aloud to me. I have stopped her exactly seven times. M. and W. and I read together in the evenings. We have had "Pickwick Papers" and "Ivanhoe," and I had one by J. M. Barrie, "A Window in Thrums." I have wanted to read it for some time. It is written about the place where I was born, and I used to see the window in Thrums every day I went to school, and of course that made it a good deal more interesting. I am working in the same place that I came to first, over four and a half years ago. It would be hard to find so good a home.

Our family is ever changing. There is continually a going out from our village and a coming in to fill up the empty spaces. Seven of those who have left us since the beginning of May have been placed in situations, one has been adopted, and we have laid another away in the little cemetery behind the Church. For the one He has taken our Heavenly Father has sent us twenty-three.

JUNE, 1910.—To meet the daily needs this month we have received amongst other donations 7s. 6d. from a Boys' Brigade Company; £10 from the Glasgow Charity Cup Committee; £1 from one of our old *James Arthur* boys now at sea; £25 from a lady in London; three donations, each amounting to £20; 10 dollars from Ontario; £5 from a Toronto lady; and £20 from a business firm. £50 for the Homes, £50 for the Sanatoria, and £20 for the Colony have come from another firm in Glasgow, one of whose partners has also sent privately a sum of £30.

Of the gifts for the Sanatoria £1 is "in memory of a loving father," and an old patient writes :—

Please accept the small gift of 10s. for use of orphans which I have sent by P.O.O. Two years ago I was a patient in the Sanatoria, and am thankful to say that through the Lord's goodness I have been keeping very well since I came home. With all good wishes.

It is essential that patients, after leaving the Sanatoria, carry on as far as possible the treatment begun there. In many cases it is very difficult to do so, and in some it is practically impossible. It is therefore always gratifying to hear that the health of patients is good after returning to surroundings not so favourable as those at Bridge-of-Weir. Much more could still be done to battle with this terrible scourge, but we regret that sufferers themselves, as well as the public in general, are slow to realise the tremendous importance of attacking the disease in its initial stages.

On the 9th inst. the delegates of the World's Women's Christian Temperance Union visited the Children's City, and before leaving a very interested member of the company had collected £6 19s. 8d., which she handed over for the work in name of her fellow delegates, one of whom sent us an additional guinea shortly afterwards. The need of the Orphan Homes is due in a considerable measure to the ravages that alcohol

has made upon our land, and so it was a great pleasure indeed for us to have a visit from such a representative gathering of enthusiasts in a cause which must ever have our greatest sympathy and aid.

Our daily fare has been varied this month by a much-appreciated gift of a hundred boxes of kippers from our old friend "Fellowship," who has taken a loving and prayerful interest in our great family for a very long time. By way of stimulating the *esprit de corps* of our older girls another friend has sent them 200 copies of the April issue of the *Girls' Guildry Gazette*, in which there is a short notice of the closing meeting of their own branch.

Two legacies amounting to £535 have been paid to the Homes, and one of £100 to the Sanatoria. £150 has also come for six months' upkeep of "Oswald" Home, and the secretary of the Scottish National Sabbath School Union has sent £24 16s. which he has received for the Orphan Homes during the past year. This sum will be added to money already on hand from the same source, and will make a total up to date of £372 10s. 5½d. towards the £2,000 necessary to erect a Girls' Home as a companion to the existing "Sabbath School" Home for boys. Should any Sabbath Schools desire to have a share in building the proposed cottage we would be glad if they would mark their donations as "For the S.S. Home," which will ensure them not being used for maintenance.

The excitement caused by the departure of our Spring emigrant band has only died down in time for the girls to be looking forward to their going West, and during the whole month we have been busy with the preparations for their outgoing. Seven guineas have come to help with the outfit of one of them, and £10 to cover the expenses of another, whilst £200 has been sent by the generous friend who wished to pay one fourth of the outfit and passage of the 1910 emigrants.

The grandmother of a boy who went to Canada in April, sending a donation says, "I have had two letters from —, and he seems to be getting on very well. He says he has got a good home and likes his place."

The school closed for the summer vacation on the afternoon of the 24th inst., and in the evening the farewell meeting for the Girls' Canadian Party was held in the large tent in which we have been worshipping since our Church was laid bare to the weather. We had arranged for the girls to travel by the s.s. *Grampian* on the 25th inst., and all our preparations had been made for that date. Consequently, when the chosen steamer had come by an accident in the St. Lawrence, we were compelled to send the party by a chartered vessel, the s.s. *Southwark*. At Greenock we bade good-bye to Pastor and Mrs. Findlay and Mrs. Roberts and their precious charge of ninety-two girls, commending each of them to Him who rules the raging of the sea.

On the very day of sailing a letter reached us from one of our old boys now in Canada, asking how many were going out at this time and enclosing twenty dollars for the work. Since the beginning of the present financial year he has already sent over eleven pounds.

The admissions for June have numbered twenty-four, thirteen of whom are girls, and in addition to those sent to Canada, four have been placed in situations and two have been adopted.

JULY, 1910.—Every month of the year is marked by some special event. The interest during July circles around the annual holiday of the

City Home and older Bridge-of-Weir lads. Each year our camping arrangements have been improving, and, although the weather on this occasion was far from ideal, the change is always beneficial and acceptable to the boys. The company numbered over eighty, and had the nights not been intensely cold sixteen or seventeen in a fourteen feet bell tent would have been unbearable. The journey to Ballantrae (especially the thirteen miles traversed by motor charabanc), and the free gipsy life by the sea shore, are greatly appreciated by our boys.

Several gifts in money (including one from friends where we used to camp), and several most useful donations in kind, have been received for the boys' holiday. To these donors, as well as to the kind tenant and all on the farm, we extend the hearty thanks of the lads and ourselves for all they have done to make their outing a real treat.

For our children's annual day at the coast two friends have sent £1 each, and another 5s. An anonymous donor, sending £150, says, "The holiday season is upon us again, and I have much pleasure in enclosing cheque to be used for the children's holiday fund or in whichever way you consider best in the interests of the children." With perfect truth we can say, "He daily *loadeth* us with benefits." He ceases not at supplying our every need, but goes beyond to give us such luxuries as this annual outing.

From America we have received 10s. from the mother of two of our bairns, and several of our old girls have also added to our exchequer. A girl who went to Canada in 1908, and whose brother followed in April of this year, writes :—

I received your welcome letter some time ago. I am always glad to hear about the good work that is going on in the Homes. The school children will have their summer holidays now, and now is the time for the house cleaning. I am thankful to say I am done with it all now. I house-cleaned my bedroom and it is just lovely. The girls will be sailing for Canada soon. I was sailing for Canada two years ago last Monday. How the time flies! My little brother that came out this year has got a lovely home, but he has not yet got used to the work. J. has got on well since he came out. He did a lot of hard work this spring. The people are very fond of him and he likes his place. The woman that J— is with is a sister to the woman that T— is with, so they are not very far from each other. We are having such hot weather here just now, I wonder how the boys will stand it for their first year. Everything is lovely now, the flowers are growing so beautiful. I always look back to see the lovely beds of flowers in the Homes, and how they are taken care of. I thank you ever so much for the nice card of Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier.

Two memorial gifts, of which one is "in memory of my husband," have come to hand, as well as a number of donations from England, including 5s. from Leeds; 10s. from Suffolk; £5 from Kensington; and a guinea from Northumberland. The smallest contribution of the month is one of sixpence in postage stamps, and the largest from two ladies amounts to £180 for the Homes and £10 for the Sanatoria. "Z.Q.M." has sent £40, and another £40 has come from two friends, who write: "We have just been celebrating our golden wedding. Praise the Lord for His long-sparing mercy." The following letter has come "from an isolated farm-house in Selkirkshire":—

I have much pleasure in sending you an order for 14s. from my Sunday class. I have a small number of pupils now, but all are much pleased to give what they can to your boys and girls. They have little to give, but it is given cheerfully, and we often talk of you and pray that your Homes may be blessed. We read all we see mentioning your doings, and we never cease praying for you and your large family.

The work of the Orphan Homes had its birth in prayer, and without the support of the prayers of God's children, old and young, we could never have come so far. The growth of the work and every burden new and old make us feel our own helplessness and the great need there is for the sustaining power of God's grace. We cannot express our deep gratitude for all the prayers that have risen to the Throne of Grace on our behalf, but would crave the increasing continuance of this blessed service.

Eighteen new children have come under our care since the month began. May our dear Father in Heaven grant that each of these may be led to trust in Him ere their sojourn with us has ended, and that grace may be given to us to bring them up for Him. Not the least of all our blessings was the good news of the safe arrival of the Girls' Canadian Party at Brockville after an unexpectedly rapid passage. Another of those who went forth this year writes as follows :—

I am one of the boys that was so lucky as to get out here this year, for which I now thank you. I had to thank Mr. Grierson for sending me so near to my brother as I am just two houses away from him and I can get over to see him at any time. Some people think Canada is just a wide stretch of waste territory, but the place I am in is just house after house as far as you can see, so I can say it is not just so waste after all. The village is not so far from here as from the Homes to Bridge-of-Weir, and there are two churches. I am a member of the Wesleyan Church Sunday School. There is a boy in the same home as myself who came out from the Homes five years ago, and a girl in the next one who came out two years ago, and in the next a girl who has been out for quite a long time. We all send you and the rest of the workers warmest love.

An old friend who is also engaged in children's work has sent us £4, the proceeds of a display on the sands at an East Coast watering place. A foreign missionary has contributed £5 to our funds, and another missionary friend £20. The month's gifts in kind have included a gross of toilet soap; a ton of oatmeal from Brechin; five bags of meal from a lady; and 18 articles of clothing from the girls in a boarding school who have often helped us in the past.

AUGUST, 1910.—Five of those, at one time numbered in our family, have sent tokens of their gratitude this month, and one whose name appears on the school roll of dux boys, and who with his younger brother went out to Canada last year, frequently writes a most interesting letter of which the following is a sample :—

I sit down to write you a few lines to-day. I am getting on well and I like my work fine. I have been hearing of the additions to the church and other buildings which are being erected, and am glad that the work is going on so rapidly. I suppose that the girls' party will be over by this time, and the children will be looking forward to the trip. I was away to the annual camp of the N— B— militia at Sussex for twelve days. The chaplain to whose church I go asked me to go with him as his orderly, and I jumped at the offer. I had a uniform—red jacket, etc.—and enjoyed myself very well. My brother J— is getting on well. His master is going to move further West next spring, and J— expects to go with him. My sister is getting on well now in her new home. I had a letter from her yesterday, and she says that she is going to write to the Homes. I hope that everything is going on well in the Homes, and trust that God is sending "showers of blessing." I think that this is all at present and so I will close.

We give another letter from one of this year's emigrants. She is one of a family of six, five of whom are now settled in Canada. It will be interesting for our friends to know that the oldest brother who went out

three years ago is employed by one of our old boys who rents the farm of 275 acres to which he went first on his arrival in Canada a long time ago :—

We all landed safely in Canada. We had a lovely time in Brockville. The friends in Fairknowe Home were very kind to us, and I am very thankful to Mr. and Mrs. Grierson for putting me in such a lovely and Christian home. I am living with a minister and his wife and children. I went to my home on Friday, and on Monday afternoon S— came to see me. He has not changed a bit, but his speech is changed. S— saw M— too, for she was staying in the same home with me till Mr. W— found a home for her near me. So just as S— was in to see us a lady came for her and she is living just in the very next house to M— and J—. I left Mr. and Mrs. Findlay at the station. I was so sorry to leave them after being so kind to us all the way. I remember Mrs. Findlay's last words, "Keep looking to Jesus," and I have been trying to look to Him ever since. I cannot thank you enough for all your kindness to us all. We do not realise all the kindness that was shown us until we are far away from our kind friends, and then we realise it all.

The first, and to the children, the most important event of the month was their annual day at the seaside. The place chosen for this year's outing was Millport, whither the girls journeyed on the 2nd inst., and the boys on the 4th. The town hall had been taken in case of necessity, and to it we had to run for shelter from the rain, which kept us inside for a good part of the day. However, the sun did sometimes peep through, and the girls were able to make a tour of the shops before returning home. The state of the tide on both days spoiled the success of motor-boating, and whilst the second day was no better than the first, the boys' spirits were in no way damped by the inclemency of the weather. A special treat of sweets and ice cream all round was provided for the boys by a kind friend, and it was with a great deal of thanksgiving for our Heavenly Father's protecting care which had kept us free from accident of any kind, that we returned home on the evening of the second day's outing. The anticipation of the pleasures of these two days has been with the bairns for a long time, and they will think and talk of all their exploits for many a day to come.

Seven and sixpence has come for your "big sma' faimly" for the trips if needed, and another friend living in Kilmacolm has sent the following request, along with his donation :—

I should like very much if you would take 5s. from it for prizes, for boys not over eight years, at your annual trip for races, etc. Might I mention the fact that a great many of us like very much to see the children pass through the village once a year instead of going the less frequented road.

To have the goodwill of our neighbours means a lot, and the drive through the village on the morning of both trips gave our boys and girls a more than usual opportunity for cheering and waving to our neighbours.

From the donation list we note the following :—£20 for the Colony of Mercy, paid through the National Bank by an "anonymous friend;" 2s. 6d. from one who wishes to be known as "Thankful;" 5s., being the surplus from a Sabbath School pic-nic; £1 of "First Fruits;" half-a-sovereign sent by a young people's club in Glasgow; £22 16s. collected by a lady from Largs friends; 15 dollars from British Columbia; and a box of home-made jams and jellies from the editor of a Glasgow weekly. One legacy of £50 has also been paid in addition to a half-yearly amount of over £90 for the upkeep of "Glenfarg" Home.

On the night of the 20th inst. we experienced the most disastrous flood that has ever been known in this neighbourhood. For some time the rainfall had been greater than usual, but up till nine o'clock no special danger was anticipated. Shortly after that hour the water in burn and river began to rise with alarming rapidity, and in less than half an hour it had risen to a mark at least six inches above the highest previous record. Most of the damage was done by the Cattie Burn which flows through our grounds. In these few minutes, the apparently harmless little stream was transformed into a roaring cataract which, breaking through a march dyke and carrying it fifty yards away, swept through our kitchen garden, flooded the poultry farm (to a depth of nearly five feet), the fire station and the stables and, rushing headlong through the main gateway and clearing the cellar of Homelea as it went, regained its proper course, along which it poured, tearing up the walls along its banks, until its force united with the river Gryffe at "Rozelle," which stood out like some lonely lighthouse surrounded by water. In addition to the damage done to roads and walls, we lost more than half our stock of poultry, and we estimate that to repair our losses will cost several hundred pounds. At the time of this catastrophe we were looking forward to Thanksgiving Day, and were busy getting things into shape for it. As we looked next day on the havoc wrought in one short hour or two by such an insignificant instrument, we learned a fresh lesson of God's wondrous power, and in the preservation of life and no injury to any member of our large family in the midst of such danger, we also realised in a new way that—

"Certainly
His mercies 'dure,
Most firm and sure,
Eternally."

Our family this month has undergone as many changes as before, but is no larger than at the 1st of August, for we have admitted twenty new cases, and discharged in various ways exactly the same number. A death rate of three this month is unusually large.

SEPTEMBER, 1910.—A friend from the East of Scotland having seen the half empty poultry farm left two guineas "to help supply loss of hens." £5 have come from India; £10 from Keswick; 5 dollars from Kingston, Ontario; and 10s. from York. From friends in Largs and Fairlie we have received £12 0s. 6d., and £2 17s. has been subscribed by a bowling and tennis club.

Eight of our grown up bairns have also helped to supply the month's needs. Three of them are in Canada, and the gifts of two of them have come as memorials. The largest, amounting to £13, is from one of our old sailor boys who has just taken a mate's certificate, and although he does not say so, has doubtless sent us this generous donation as a thankoffering. An old worker has added 10s. to the funds, and the following letter is a voluntary appreciation of the services of one of our girls lately placed in a situation :—

Before C— leaves me to-morrow I would like to tell you how well satisfied I have been with her in every way. She has been a great source of comfort and help to me all through the season. I am pleased she is going to ——. I am sure she will do well there too. She is a credit to all who have had the training of her.

From one of our girls who went over from Canada to the United States recently, we have the following letter:—

I take great pleasure in letting you know of my welfare. I am getting on splendidly. I have you to thank that I am in a lovely home where they just treat me as their own. I am getting eighteen dollars a month for a start, but I am to get a rise. We had Mr. and Mrs. Findlay with us for dinner two weeks ago. I need not stop to tell you anything for I know they will tell you all, only we were delighted to see them. I was overjoyed at the very sight of them. We were at Mr. Moody's church hearing Mr. Findlay preach. I am always glad to get a letter from you. It helps me so much. I am praying for you and your work. I had a letter from Miss M'Naught last week. We went across the river right into Michigan City last week. We had a very nice time at the beach. I know all my little brothers and sisters are looking forward to their treat just as I do. With love to all.

Two legacies amounting to £356 have come to hand this month, and of the larger donations £25 is from Edinburgh; £20 from a titled lady; and £100 from a London gentleman who asks that his gift may be divided equally between the Consumption Sanatoria and the Emigration Fund. Two Bible classes, after visiting the village, have each sent half-a-sovereign, and half-a-crown's worth of stamps from another donor will be very useful in the office.

The month of September will always be a notable one in the Orphan Homes, for in it we celebrate two anniversaries. Thirty-two years ago on the 17th inst. the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir were first opened to receive orphaned children, and eighty-one years ago on the 29th inst. their beloved Founder was born. The weeks and months have sped quickly past, and the time has again come round for our biennial Thanksgiving Day. The date chosen this year was the Founder's birthday, when a large number of interested friends were present with us in the village to see what the Lord had done for us in the last two years, and to unite with us in praise for all His bounteous mercy and goodness. The usual dedication and thanksgiving service was held in the newly-enlarged Church, which was crowded in every part, the new transept being packed with as many of our bairns as could be got into the space. There were dedicated no fewer than seven new buildings, comprising the church addition, Homes Nos. 40 and 41, and the Superintendent's house at the Orphan Homes; the Medical Superintendent's residence at the Sanatoria; and the Men's Workshop and the Children's Block at the Colony of Mercy. The school children were on holiday for the day, and the school itself was open for visitors to inspect specimens of the children's work which adorned the walls of the various class-rooms, and were also on exhibition in the hall. Displays of drill and the rocket life-saving apparatus were given during the afternoon, and after a special tea an entertainment was rendered in the church.

A number of memorial gifts were received on Mr. Quarrier's birthday, and many have come from friends who have written to express their regret at not being able to be present. Others again in the same position have sent the amount of their collection towards the day's expenses, and amongst these the largest is a sum of £25. But perhaps the greatest surprise of the day was to find an envelope containing £75 in bank notes in one of the collection trays at the church door. On the envelope was written, "a thankoffering for the children." Eight shillings also came as the travelling expenses of one who could not be present.

The following press notice from the *Glasgow Herald* of 30th inst. will give a short account of the afternoon meeting to those who were unable to attend and may not have seen any mention of the day's proceedings:—

The biennial thanksgiving and memorial day in connection with the Orphan Homes of Scotland at Bridge-of-Weir was celebrated yesterday. Fine weather favoured the occasion, and there was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen, to whom the various homes, workshops, sanatoria, and other buildings were thrown open for inspection. The usual thanksgiving service was held in the church, which has recently been enlarged, and was presided over by Sir Thomas Glen-Coats, Bart., who was accompanied on the platform by Sir Samuel Chisholm, Bart.; Mr. A. Cameron Corbett, M.P.; Mr. J. P. Maclay, Mr. A. P. Forrester Paton, Alloa; Mr. J. W. Arthur, the Rev. Professor Orr, Mr. James Pattison, the Rev. D. M. McIntyre, the Rev. Gordon B. Watt, Pastor D. J. Findlay, the Rev. J. T. Forbes, Miss Quarrier, and Mrs. A. Quarrier Burges.

The Chairman said their thanksgiving service that day marked not only the thirty-second anniversary of the homes, but also the eighty-first anniversary of the birthday of Mr. William Quarrier, by whom they were founded. When they were instituted 32 years ago there was only one home, capable of accommodating about 40 children, but since that time he work had grown and prospered until there were now 41 homes. A special feature of the work was the sending of a number of the children every year to a new life in the great Colony of Canada. This year 100 boys and 92 girls emigrated, and reports still reached them that young Scottish people—especially those who received their training at Quarrier's Homes—were in great demand in the Dominion. The chairman further referred to the remarkable manner in which the daily financial requirements of the homes were supplied, and to the energy and enthusiasm of those who were actively engaged in carrying them on.

An interesting statement regarding the present position of the Homes was made by Pastor Findlay. That day, he said, they were met to dedicate for the service of the children no fewer than seven new buildings. Since their last thanksgiving day there had been received for building purposes the sum of about £17,000. They now dedicated in the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics a new house costing about £4,000, which was nearing completion, and which would accommodate thirty epileptic boys and girls. There were now three houses in the colony, one each for men, women, and children. In addition they had erected houses for the use of the doctor, the superintendent physician, the village superintendent, and two new cottages for the children. They were also there to dedicate an important addition to their splendid church, the cost of which—£5,000—had been defrayed by the generous gift of a friend. By the erection of the transept, the accommodation of the church had been increased to 2,060. That day there were 1,350 children in the Homes, 122 consumptive patients, and 54 inmates of the epileptic colony, who, with the staff, brought the total population of the village up to 1,700. The income for the past eleven months amounted to £25,169 for the Orphan Homes, £7,222 for the Sanatoria, £3,147 for the Epileptic Colony, and £1,200 for the Home and Foreign Mission Fund. Altogether they had received in thirty-two years the sum of £839,000.

Mr. A. Cameron Corbett referred to the great work which Mr. Quarrier had carried on during his lifetime. It was sometimes asked what proportion of attention the churches should give to philanthropic objects on the one hand and to spiritual effort on the other. That, however, was a question which never occurred to Mr. Quarrier. In his mind there was no possibility of a separation between spiritual forces and philanthropic energy, and in these Homes he had raised for himself a monument which not only endured, but which continually grew. How it had expanded with the years was shown by the fact that about 15,000 children had passed through the Homes.

Sir Samuel Chisholm, who also spoke, remarked that the thanksgiving was due that day, not so much for those who had been and were still conducting the Homes, or for the generous support they had received in the past, but for the young lives which had been rescued, redeemed, and saved through the influence of the Homes.

OCTOBER, 1910.—The gifts and letters from many friends who visited the village on the 29th of last month, have brought great joy to our hearts. One has written to say, "I could not find the plate yesterday, so I enclose

my collection. Really it was a day of heaven upon earth at the Orphan Homes." A lady has expressed herself as follows:—

What a happy day we had at Bridge-of-Weir! We did enjoy it so much. The service in the church was inspiring. To be in the village, walking the streets and breathing the air, is to me an inspiration.

Such has been our own experience, and we rejoice in being privileged to carry on the work begun so long ago by our dear father. We do praise God for His loving provision for the children in the days that are past, but we have to render thanks also for the ever-present testimony to a promise-keeping God with which we are surrounded. May He grant that, day by day, as every building and every foot of ground becomes more familiar, they may never grow common, but go on increasing as a power of inspiration, urging us to further work and deeper trust.

The month of October has always been a memorable one in the annals of the work as being the closing month of our financial year, but seven years ago it was made doubly so by the home-going of our dear father. Very often, but specially at this time, do our thoughts go back to the days of long ago, so full of blessed and hallowed memories, and as our minds have been dwelling fondly on the loved ones gone before, so many of our friends have been remembering their dear ones from whom the hand of death has parted them for a little. Of these, a mother has sent 10s. in memory of her little girl's birthday; a like amount has come to recall the birthday of little Willie; and yet another "In memory of our little girl." Two memorial gifts, each amounting to £5, have also been received, and a mother and her children have sent £3 "in loving memory of Mr. Quarrier." The largest gift of this kind is one of £100 from a gentleman in memory of his mother.

An Arabian missionary, one in Zomba and two in different provinces of China have contributed towards our support, and of other foreign remittances, £1 is from Sydney; another £1 from a Victorian doctor who asks for twelve copies of the illustrated booklet for his Bible class; 10s. from British East Africa; three dollars from Maine, U.S.A.; and £4 from Oregon, U.S.A., with the following note:—

I am glad again as the dark days of winter approach to remember the work being done in my native land for the poor and fatherless, and send you herewith a small contribution to "keep the pot boiling." Put it to the general expense account of the Homes. And may you ever have our Father's blessing and wisdom.

Eight Bible classes and twice as many Sabbath Schools have helped, as our friend has said, to "keep the pot boiling," and two of our own old girls have also sent tokens of gratitude for what they received. From another in Canada comes the following:—

I received your welcome letter a few months ago. I am not very fond of writing letters, but I am always glad to receive them. I am always glad to hear from the Homes and to know how God is helping on with the work. When I was in the Homes I did not see things as I see them now. I feel I owe all my comfort and happiness to the training I received there. I think to-day that no person in the world has more right to praise God and to thank the people of the Homes than I have. Truly God has been good to me since I left you. I suppose you would like to know how I am getting along. I have been in this place for a year and a half, and I have no desire to leave it. The people have been very good and kind to me. I have plenty to eat and plenty to wear, and all I need to make life happy. When I left the Homes I thought I was saved, but now I know I am saved. I feel as safe to-day as if I were in

heaven. There is heaven in my soul. Jesus always makes the rough places smooth and keeps the fire burning in my soul. I have not time to say much more at present. One thing I want to say is this. I thank you for your kindness to us. If I cannot repay you in any other way I will live a life that will be a credit to the place I came from.

The limit of space at our disposal forbids us giving any more of our children's letters, but we hope that such as have been given may bring as much pleasure to those who read them in this printed form as their originals brought to us.

With the approach of winter donations of articles of clothing have begun to increase. Eighteen articles have been received from Thurso, and as many from Islay. A cheese and a boll of oatmeal have come from Ayrshire; two cases of Christmas novelties, which will be very handy in a few weeks, from beyond the Forth; 30 pairs of canvas shoes from Arbroath for the boys in "Craigbet" Home; four boxes of fish from Newhaven; and 100 boxes of kippers from our old friend "Fellowship," who sent us a similar gift a few months ago. A gold watch has come from an English friend who helps us very regularly, and has written to say, "I have just been reading this morning how the Irsaelites gave to God, and it says they *all* offered gold." Other English gifts have been 5s. from Blackburn; £2 from one in Tunbridge Wells, who calls himself "only a poor tradesman;" £1 1s. from Plymouth; and £1 for the Homes with 10s. for the Colony from a Nurses' Home in Northumberland.

Forty-five pounds out of two gifts of £50 each are for emigration purposes, and £10 for the Colony. A lady who has long been interested in the work, and whose dear mother was one of our earliest helpers, sends £34 collected from a few friends, and an old friend in the East of Scotland has sent her annual donation of £25. Several other large sums have come to hand, and a second allotment for outfits, amounting to £150, has been made by the Thomas Porter Equipment Fund.

For the children, the most interesting days of the month have been Saturday the 29th and Monday the 31st. The evening of the former day was given up to Hallowe'en parties, with all the attendant pleasures of ducking for apples, nut cracking, potato-eating and masquerading. Monday was an off day from school, and the evening had been fixed for the usual procession, which, however, had to be postponed on account of unfavourable weather, but the disappointment was made up for by a cinematograph entertainment which is always acceptable, and has many a time helped us out of a difficulty.

Since the month began seventeen boys and sixteen girls have been added to our family. Of the three boys who have left us, one has gone to sea, whilst four of the ten girls who bade farewell to the old Home this month have been placed in situations.

Once more the financial year has closed leaving our hearts full of thanksgiving, not only for need supplied, but for the privilege of having the fellowship of so many friends of the children whose gifts have come with such regularity that there has been no lack and no feeling of anxiety during the whole twelve months. To God be all the praise.

IN MEMORIAM.

This year again we have had many breaks in the ranks of our helpers, and while feeling our own personal loss, our hearts go out in loving sympathy to those whose dear ones have been taken from them. We thank God for memories of happy fellowship in giving and working that come to us as we scan the list of those who have finished their earthly course, and we pray that grace may ever be given us to serve our generation even as they, and to hear at last the "well done, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

It seems but yesterday since last year's record went forth to thank the kind donors and tell out to the world the wonderful goodness and faithfulness of our covenant-keeping God, and yet full twelve months of continuous and active service have gone—gone with all their shortcomings and human weaknesses—never to be recalled until that day when the Book of Life shall be opened. Of the year that has just closed, it can truthfully be said, as of each of its thirty-eight predecessors, "not one thing hath failed of all the good things which the Lord your God spake concerning you." The very sameness of the work year by year makes it most difficult to put on record anything fresh. From north, south, east and west, the cry of the needy has reached us all through the year, and although at times rather pressed for room no destitute one whose circumstances made him eligible has been refused. In fact, the conditions of admission seem so well understood that an amazingly small proportion have had to be denied the benefit of the Homes from any cause whatever. The Children's Act was hailed with delight by all lovers of poor children, but in some ways it has not proved so helpful as was anticipated. The question of "Who's to pay?" has prevented many eligible cases from being placed in State-aided institutions, and the result has been that rather more of that class than formerly have reached the door above which might be written "admission free, no monetary qualification necessary." An increasing number of Parish Councils in various parts of the country, having difficulty in finding suitable guardians with whom to board certain classes of children, and being unwilling in this age of progress to keep them in the Poorhouse, have asked our aid. These and other causes have made our admissions about the average of the last few years, although we had hoped that with the increasing interest in the welfare of children the need might decrease. While the number of children without either parent seems pretty stationary, the number of those who need help for their own sakes, in defiance of the moral responsibility of legal guardians, seems on the increase in spite of all that is being done by so many agencies. It may be, however, that the increased zeal with which the work of these agencies is being done brings more to the portal of succour than was formerly the case. The histories of some received have revealed real tragedies in the drama of life, and some have shown a depth of depravity and wretchedness both on the part of relatives and children that descends below anything of which we could imagine humanity capable.

These facts add considerably to the difficult task of training these children in order and cleanliness, and still more in truthfulness and other moral virtues. To the uninitiated, and even to many of the kind helpers of the work, there is a good deal of well-meant but erroneous sentiment about "how grateful they must be and how glad to be obedient and helpful." They are human, doubly human, through heredity and early training, or lack of it, many of them, and it requires great grace with much patient sympathy and hard toil on the part of those who have the more immediate care of them. No doubt there are many gems of rare value and beauty, but they require, by God's grace and much careful

common-sense, an immense amount of cutting and polishing. If done as it ought to be from pure love to Jesus Christ and for love to those for whom He died, it is often a very difficult, trying, and disappointing task. Like other hard pieces of service, it has its compensations even at the time, and in after days not infrequently a rich harvest which speaks to open ears the divine encouragement, "Be not weary in well-doing, for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not." From one cause and another, which need not here be discussed, the difficulty of finding and retaining suitable labourers in such a field seems greater than when the work was of much smaller dimensions. We mention these things in order that we may solicit more definite prayer on the part of our Christian friends who "hold the ropes." The work in its financial aspect has been a most pronounced proof of the efficacy of believing prayer, and it may be that, while we are conscious of unspeakable help by the prayers of those who give of their means, the real need has not been felt to the full of definite persevering prayer for the workers in their work, and that their number may be increased as occasion arises.

During the year the health of the community has been good, and the death-rate low, everything considered. While there has been nothing like an epidemic of any infantile or other infectious disease, there have been several isolated cases of scarlet fever and diphtheria, but in every case very mild in type. Conditions of living in every grade of society have changed since the work was commenced, and among the working classes greatly for the better, if we speak of increased expenditure on the necessities as well as the luxuries of life, and in keeping with this the ordinary household expenditure in the Homes has been added to considerably. Besides this, during the past year there has been considerable extraordinary work and expenditure in adding to the comfort of doing work about the houses, and more particularly in making it possible to participate oftener and more easily in various forms of recreation. Some four acres has been added to the play-field, and much labour and expense put out in making it more pleasant and useful. In addition to the manual and household work in the School, which is partially recreative, the School time-table includes outdoor games under the supervision of the teachers, and for the proper carrying out of this the improved field has been found very useful. The School summer holidays are largely given up to play, and the day's outing to the coast is a great boon, but we are of opinion that if sufficient housing accommodation were supplied by some kind friend or friends, and the individual families with "father and mother," could have even a few days' change at the coast, it would be a much greater and more lasting benefit to all. The lads over fifteen have during the last two years been able to accompany the City Home Working Lads for a week at the coast, and while, like all good things, it may have slight drawbacks, we are confident that it is not only greatly appreciated, but in the round of life will prove a real and lasting benefit.

This report is a vague survey of the work in general, but as there does not appear elsewhere in the Annual Narrative any details of the work carried on in our City Home, some reference to it may not be out of place here.

All children are admitted and discharged there, and all matters requiring a personal interview with relatives and others seen to. All applicants to the Sanatoria and Colony are reminded by the doctor there, and twice

a week the free dispensary for advice and medicine to phthisical persons is open. Add to this the caring for 40 to 50 working lads and 20 to 30 young women resident in the City Home, and also the carrying on of Gospel Mission work, and it is easily seen that there, as well as at Bridge-of-Weir, is a centre of great activity and usefulness. Night Refuge work in sheltering for a short period wayward or ill-used and neglected children has almost become a thing of the past, although in the early days of the work both necessary and useful.

During the year, owing to the closing of a Home in another part of the city which sought to help the wild street youths, and from other causes, over 40 lads were received, but the greater part of them left after a longer or shorter residence. Their lack of former discipline and training so unfitted them for hard work and regular habits that they drifted back to their old ways. This has always been our experience with lads who had become real street waifs. It may be that they would brook a discipline so mild as to be little removed from giving them their own sweet will with the additional comforts of a cheap residence, but more than that cannot be expected until compulsory detention and discipline is enforced upon all youths who have no regular occupation and no proper place of residence. The lads who have remained are satisfactorily employed in view of their future, and a good many of them seek to add to their knowledge and future usefulness to themselves and the community by attending continuation and technical evening classes.

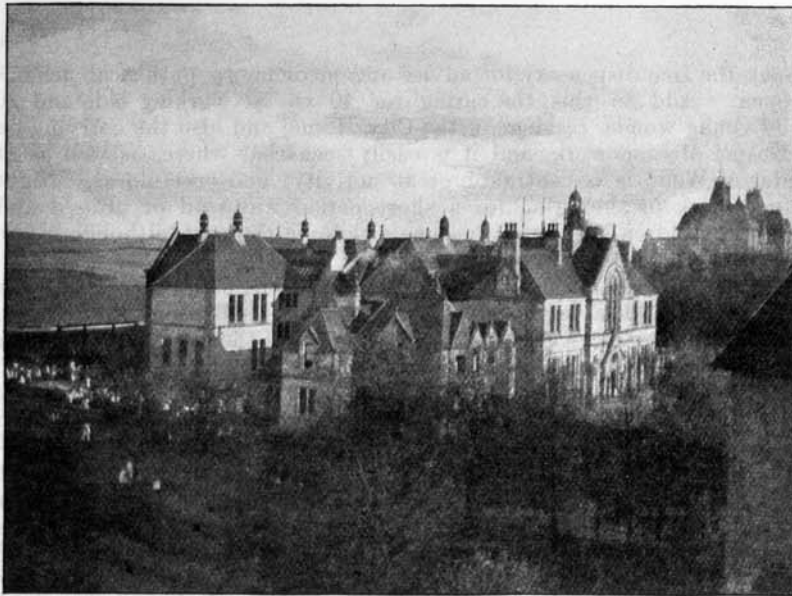
From among the young women in training for domestic service 13 have been placed out and given a very good outfit of clothing and should be fully self-supporting henceforth, while five have gone to friends and can also make their own way in the world.

The work of the Mission has gone on continuously and perseveringly. The Young People's Service is very hopeful as to its usefulness in directing into proper channels the energies of youth, and instilling into their minds principles which shall enable them to fulfil the Divine purposes in after life. The work among the women of the district specially carried on by our Biblewoman is very helpful. On the roll of the "Women's Own" are 176 names, and the weekly meeting on Monday afternoons has an average attendance of 120. Lately a branch of the British Women's Temperance Association has been formed and already has a membership of 50. This in view of the deplorable fact that drinking is on the increase among women in certain localities should prove a step in the right direction.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

REPORT ON THE ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND SCHOOL.

THE Managers of the School have pleasure in reporting that good and steady progress has been made during the year in the work of education in all the branches carried on at this school. The large new addition, with its spacious hall and commodious class rooms, has proved of great value for educational purposes, and enables the work going on to be more efficiently supervised than formerly.

During the year ending 31st October last, the average number on roll in the Primary School was 1,082, with an average attendance of 1,015.6, giving a percentage of 93.8. At present 592 boys and 457 girls, a total of 1,049, are on the roll. The staff consists of the headmaster, 20 certificated teachers, 1 assistant, a drill and singing master, a teacher of cookery, laundry, and housewifery, and a teacher of manual instruction in wood-work and clay-modelling.

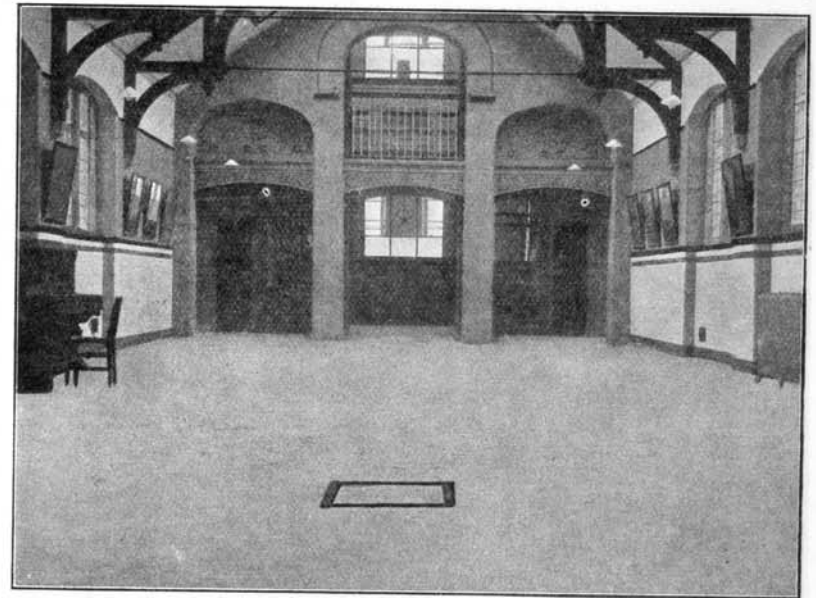
H.M. Inspector's latest report on the school states:—

“The school is in good working order.

“The Infant Department is extremely well taught. In a school of this kind, the difficulties of classification are of no ordinary character, and there is naturally considerable variety of attainment in the Junior and Senior Classes. There is at the same time evidence of earnest and successful work. A word of praise is due to the alertness and intelligence displayed by the boys in Class Senior II. . . . The selection of suitable objects for each class and the more or less complete representation of these objects according to the ability of the pupils are mentioned in this connection. Something has still to be done to secure the teaching of Arithmetic (including Practical Geometry) on the lines of the Department's Memorandum.

“The Supplementary Classes have made a satisfactory start with the

prescribed work in English and related subjects. The training given to the girls in Cookery and Laundry Work is thoroughly practical. At the same time the Managers are to be congratulated on having been able, with the resources at their disposal, to make provision for giving a course of instruction in Woodwork to the boys. This new departure is calculated to have far-reaching results of a most beneficial character. The work already done both in Drawing in plan and elevation, and in the reproduction of the various exercises, reflects much credit on the instruction. More pupils could be instructed at one time if the accommodation could be increased.”



THE NEW SCHOOL HALL.

A series of Continuation Classes has been held as formerly for scholars over 14. Those under Division I., for the completion of general elementary education, meet in a Class Room at the Church. The average number on roll has been 63.2, with an average attendance of 58.8. In Division II., which includes practical subjects, the average number on roll for the past session was 63.2, with an average attendance of 55.7. There are at present 40 girls studying Cookery and Housewifery, and 11 boys learning Navigation and Seamanship on the *James Arthur* ship on land. At the new Woodwork Class for senior boys there are 42 enrolled.

Clay-modelling, according to a well-graded scheme, has been transferred to the Instructor in Woodwork, an arrangement which has proved successful.

Suitable out-door games have been linked on to the physical training in the school to the mutual advantage of both.

The school Prize-giving was held on the evening of 21st March, when music, physical exercises, and recitations were rendered by the children. The prizes were presented to the successful scholars by Mrs. J. P. MacLay. On the afternoon of that date, visitors had an opportunity of seeing the school at work in all its departments.

Towards the expenditure of the Continuation Classes for session ending 31st July, 1910, which amounted to £155 18s. 8d., the Managers had on hand 13s. 8d., and received from the Department a grant of £114 8s. 10d. The balance of £40 16s. 2d. was defrayed by subscriptions.

The expenditure of the Managers on the work of education in connection with the Primary School for year ending 31st January last, amounted to £3,065 18s. 3d. Against this they have received from the Department:—Grant in Relief of School Fees, £597 8s.; Aid Grant, £140 17s.; General Aid Grant, £170 5s. 6d.; Parliamentary Grant, £1,170 10s.; and Bank Interest, £8 16s. 9d. The balance was defrayed by subscriptions to the funds of the school amounting to £978 1s.



THE JUNIOR COOKERY CLASS.

The 2nd Bridge-of-Weir Company of the Boys' Brigade, with 82 members and 4 officers, in addition to their Drill and Physical Exercises, have attended Classes for "First Aid," Vocal and Instrumental Music, and a Bible Class.

The Girls' Guildry, with 15 guardians and a membership of 124 girls over 14, has now been formed into the No. 1 Bridge-of-Weir Company. Needlework, which forms a special feature, is carried on to a more advanced stage than in the Primary School. Classes are also held for Nursing, First Aid, Vocal Music, Drill, and Physical Exercises, and the girls attend a Senior Bible Class on Sunday afternoons.

The Managers believe that all these various classes and agencies fulfil their main object, viz.:—To fit the lads and girls for their life work, whether in Canada or in this country, and the success attending many former pupils, of whom tidings have been borne back from time to time, proves that the education has to a great extent been real and enduring.

The thanks of the Managers are due to the headmaster and the staff for the faithful services rendered.



EMIGRATION WORK.

CANADA presents an ever wide open door for all the boys and girls that it is possible for us to send across the sea; the demands always far exceed the supply, and while this year our young emigrants numbered not quite two hundred there were one thousand homes eager to receive them. One hundred boys were despatched in the spring in charge of Mr. Anderson and Mr. William Douglas, and ninety-two girls followed in June, conducted by Mrs. Findlay, Mrs. Roberts, and myself.

The work of visiting the children in their Canadian homes is one of absorbing interest. Nearly all our boys and girls go in the first instance to farmers, and as these are scattered over an enormous tract of country much time is taken up in getting from one farm to another. We have frequently driven in one day from sixty to one hundred miles, and counted ourselves fortunate if we were able to see ten or twelve of the children. Our visits this summer, which were more numerous than in any of our previous journeys, tended to corroborate and deepen the impressions of the past. The great majority of our children are doing well and are being well done by. If many of them never rise above being farm workers they are at least living in more healthy conditions for body and mind than they would be likely to occupy at home, and those who have it in them to rise have every opportunity for doing so in our great dependency of the west.

Here are a few of those we saw or heard of:—One of our 1882 boys now at the head of the principal bakery business of one of the largest cities in Ontario; two old boys headmasters of secondary schools; seven either in or in preparation for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church; one a Baptist minister; one had just been ordained to the ministry of the Methodist Church; an old boy and girl, married, living on their own farm, with a family of seven children, and one of our boys of a younger generation in their employ; one of our girls matron of a hospital; several nurses; and one "old girl" we accidentally met, who has been thirty-three years in the same situation.

It is not by any means all sunshine; there are trials and experiences that we cannot write about, and our excellent superintendents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Grierson, have their hands as full of hard and trying work as any servants of the Lord could wish for. But with all it is very happy and always intensely interesting work. Here are some extracts from Mr. Grierson's report for the past twelve months:—

"The daily routine of the Home never ceases, though it is ever varied—the table spread by a loving Father's hand; daily worship with our large family when all the great Bridge-of-Weir household, on both sides of the ocean, are remembered at the throne of grace; getting children off to school; household duties; mails, receiving and despatching; receiving visitors, and children coming and going all the time; arranging new places for spring and summer parties, and for children changing their places; visiting, seeing after special cases; settling about wages; looking after the Home, the garden, and the grounds. These things take all our day and often half our night."

"We hope to do more and more visiting as time and strength will permit. We find it most profitable. The friends who have the children entertain us right royally. Some of our friends here who best understand the situation have been urging the need of an automobile for the special purpose of facilitating the arduous work of visiting! A wheel has done good service in the past, but it is terribly hard work! And often the "visitor" arrives at the farm jaded in mind and body when he should be fresh and able to communicate of his best to the friends who have looked forward to his visit for a whole year, and to the boy or girl to whom it is the great event of the season. Let's pray about it."

"The responsibility of the position here presses upon us with more insistency every day. May we ask our praying friends to remember us sometimes—better still—often before God, that our ministry may be used of God in helping our children to make the best of their lives, and to the salvation of many souls."

"We appreciated your thought for the work and for ourselves in sending Miss Annie and Miss Winifred Burges, and Mr. John Anderson and Mr. Wm. Douglas, along with the boys' party. We count it a rare privilege to be fellow-helpers with such a band of willing, skilful, consecrated workers. We enjoyed every minute of the holiday they enabled us to take in the quaint old French-British town of Quebec."

"The arrival of Pastor and Mrs. Findlay with Mrs. Roberts was the red-letter event of the year. Words fail us to tell of all this annual visit means to Fairknowe and to Ontario. The visit was all too short, but every hour of it was full of blessing, of mental and spiritual stimulus and strength. Like the details of the turning points in our life, the journeys together over "town lines" and "concession" and "forced" roads on our visiting trips, the conferences together regarding the work, the prayers together and with the children and the farmers, these all make a sun-lit page in our memory."

"Everybody concerned says this year's boy's party—100 sturdy lads—was the best ever came to Canada. Appreciation is surely a good criterion to go by, and the high praise won by our boys is very cheering. We have

gone over our history book and here are some testimonies. First from the boys themselves:—

I am in a good place—getting along first rate—splendid training.
Delighted with my place and surroundings.
Next door to my brother. I've a lot to thank you for.
Will try by God's grace to do my work well—to please God and my master.
Nice place—kind people. Lots of work here for willing hands.

Hear what the farmers say:—

Thank you for choosing such a good boy for us.
Doing well: we like him splendid.
Like G., could not have picked a better. G. thinks this a fine country.
Suits well: grown a lot in four months.
He seems a bright little fellow. Well pleased; quite ready and willing.

The party of 92 rosy-cheeked girls—60 of them under 12 years of age—will now tell us what they think of Canada. Listen!

I would rather die than leave.
Thankful for being in such a splendid Christian home.
I am with lovely Christian people.
This is one of the best homes in the whole district.
Got a warm welcome; I like my place very much.
They read God's word night and morning.
I like Mrs. S. though we don't always agree. I am fighting for Christ; I know He will not fail me.
So pleased with my beautiful Christian home. Get on first-rate.
I am converted: I pray and read the Word daily.

The marriage bells have rung out for our girls a dozen and two times all through the year. One of these was celebrated in Brockville; both bride and bridegroom were from "the children's city," Bridge-of-Weir. This is the only "Quarrier" boy who has reported his wedding to us this year. We learn from various sources that these "old girls" have all, without exception, married well—mostly to industrious, well-to-do farmers.

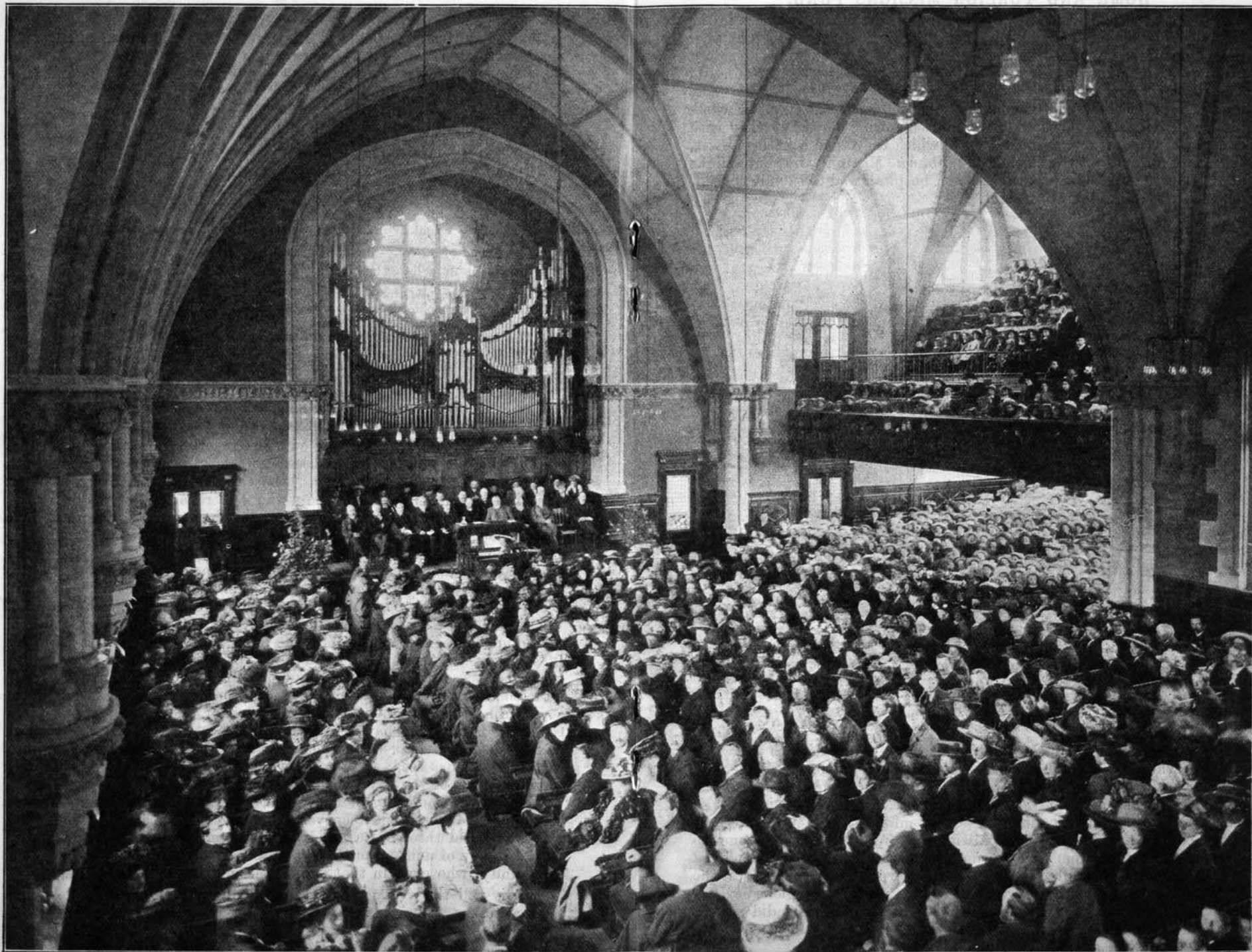
Many of our boys, fired with the ambition of the new country, are making steadily all the time for the vacant lands of Canada. From all I can learn the life there is harder and more strenuous than in Ontario. To those with the needful robustness this kind of life has its special attractions and allurements. With the right stamp of boys it is a worthy life—laying the foundations of the great country of the future. Let us remember these hardy pioneers much in our prayers. They need prayer more than most, as they are cut off more from the usual means of grace.

Reading over the now familiar names of the seven of our large Canadian family who have been called to the 'home eternal, beautiful and bright,' we think of the character and the history of those whose earthly 'sun has set,' and anew we thank God for the bright, earnest, Christian lives of the five personally known to us.

These seven had been, on an average, seven and a half years in Canada. The oldest had been nineteen years in the country, and the youngest, who was killed through an accident, had been out but one short year. He was a boy of unusual promise, and was deeply mourned by the whole community, who even in that short time had learned his worth."

£10 is still the average cost of outfitting a boy or girl and giving them a fresh start in Canada.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FUND.

ALL the church door collections received at the Sabbath Services in the church at Bridge-of-Weir are given to this fund, and in the past year these amounted to £261 13s. 4d., while in donations we received £1,005 12s., making a total, with £9 0s. 9d. of interest, of £1,276 6s. 1d., almost the same amount as for the previous year. One of the most interesting meetings is the annual Missionary Business Meeting, at which the year's gifts are allocated, the children voting on what they wish done with their money, an operation in which they take a keen interest. Their gifts are not sent exclusively to Foreign Mission work, but include donations to our excellent infirmaries and hospitals and to such beneficent schemes as the Fresh-Air Fortnight.

We seek to impregnate the children's hearts and minds with the wider interests which lie beyond the walls of their own wonderful village, and to train them to recognise the Lord's claim upon their tithes, and the privilege of using all that they have and are for the extension of His Kingdom in every way possible. Frequent missionary meetings are held in the course of each year, and missionaries from many fields come to speak in the church from time to time, so that it is not to be wondered at that some of the children grow up with a purpose in their hearts, if the Lord will, to spend their lives as heralds of the Cross in the regions beyond. Some of our old boys and girls have already years of splendid service for the heathen behind them, and many more, we hope, will yet go forth to this grandest of all callings.

We have daily thanked God for the privilege of ministering this fund during another year, and the help that has been brought through it to a number of scattered workers in the dark places has been out of all proportion to the amount ministered. We are now responsible for the complete support of six missionaries, besides contributing special help from time to time as we are enabled, to a large number of others.

Miss Agnes MacFarlane went out last May to Pernambuco (Brazil), where she was married to Mr. James A. Lyle, and now they are both at work seeking, as opportunity and strength permit, to spread the true light of the Gospel in that terribly priest-ridden city and country.

On the other side of the "neglected continent," at Lima (Peru), Mr. and Mrs. John Ritchie have done excellent work during the year, and have been much encouraged by the blessing that rested upon their labours and those of their fellow-workers. Doors are open all around, but the eager spirits of the workers are chafed because of the restraints constantly imposed upon them by the exceedingly narrow limits of the funds at their disposal.

Our missionary in China, Miss Agnes G. Leith (Kwei-ki), has much to encourage her. In fellowship with Miss Marchbank and several other lady missionaries, a large work is carried on in the city and surrounding district. Miss Leith's special department is the girls' boarding school, where the children of the members are received and trained. This is a very fruitful field, and our sister's heart is often gladdened by the knowledge that the girls under her charge are opening their hearts to the reception of the Gospel.

In Marrakesh (Morocco), the work has been carried on with unflagging earnestness. Mr. Nairn has helped some 30,000 patients through the dispensary, and every one of these thousands has heard something of the Gospel, and many have carried away with them to their distant homes the printed word. A little circle of men come regularly to Mr. Nairn for the reading and study of the Bible, and he has good hope that some of these have truly received the Saviour and are now living changed lives. The way has not yet opened for Mrs. Nairn to rejoin her husband in Morocco.

In addition to the workers named, and a number of other individual missionaries, we have regular fellowship in gift with two missions in South America, one in North America, seven in Africa, one in Arabia, six in India, three in China, one in the Pacific Ocean, and several earnest Home Missions. All this we esteem a great privilege and joy, and are quite prepared to extend the usefulness of the ministry as funds are placed at our disposal for this purpose; but be it carefully remembered that all monies intended for Home and Foreign Missions Fund must be plainly so designated.

THE apparently never-ending stream of sufferers from consumption applying for admission shows little sign of abatement notwithstanding the increased number of Sanatoria throughout the country. It may be and probably is the case that medical men are realising more and more the necessity for early Sanatorium treatment if betterness is to be hoped for, but it is much to be regretted that more is not being done in Glasgow and other large centres to remove the slums and dens, many of which are unfit for human habitation, in which large numbers of poor people live, and which are such deadly breeding places for the disease. In Glasgow in recent years improvement seems to be at a standstill, and slums are being created more rapidly than removed. The cry at present with the authorities seems to be to keep down taxation, but it is being done to a greater or less extent at the expense of the health of the community, and almost every charitable institution is being taxed to the utmost to receive the constant crowds of applicants. It is true Glasgow has at last commenced its long-deferred efforts under compulsory notification, and if carried out effectively the benefit to the community will be great. Not only will consumptives themselves receive attention, but those who live in the same homes liable to infection, are advised how to care for themselves and thereby avoid the disease. It is extremely sad to find so often member after member of individual families carried off by consumption because of lack of knowledge how to avoid infection, inattention, and carelessness. We hope the time is not far distant when consumption will be treated like other infectious diseases and the public rate supply the necessary funds for treatment. Meantime we are doing what we can to help suffering victims.

Our Sanatoria are the largest in Scotland, and the accommodation at present amounts to 140 beds. 80 beds are reserved for women, 40 for men, and 20 for children.

During the past year 423 patients have been resident for longer or shorter periods. The cost of treatment is necessarily heavy, and an income of about £8,000 per year is required to keep the Sanatoria going. Many patients are treated free, and others pay sums varying from 5s. to 20s. per week.

At the Dispensary in James Morrison Street a large and important work is carried on. Men, women, and children are treated free, and during the past year the attendances numbered 3,696. Medicines are given without charge, and literature distributed advising sufferers how to care for themselves.

The Report of the Medical Officer following hereon affords valuable information to those interested. The Medical Advisory Board met at regular intervals during the year, and personal visits were made monthly by individual members of the Board.

There is need for suitable workshops for men able to do a little work, and the Trustees will welcome any gifts for maintenance or further development.

Religious services are held each Sunday and one week day, also morning and evening prayers, and it has been a satisfaction to hear from time to time of spiritual benefit received, and in after days blessing carried by old patients after leaving the Sanatoria to others in their own homes.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL OFFICER.

GENTLEMEN,—I have pleasure in submitting the annual report for the year ending 31st October, 1910.

During the year there have been admitted 326 patients—112 men, 180 women, and 34 children. There have been discharged 310 patients—115 men, 160 women, and 35 children. There are in residence at the end of the year, 113—30 men, 72 women, and 11 children. Including those still under treatment, the total number of patients dealt with has been 423. On examining into the 310 cases treated and discharged, the following facts were noted.

Age distribution—under 10, 15; 20, 58; 30, 93; 40, 92; 50, 30; 60, 7; non-tubercular, 15—Total, 310.

Classification on Admission (Turban's)—Early, 111; Intermediate, 134; Advanced, 50; Non-Tubercular, 15—Total, 310.

History of Tuberculosis—A history of tuberculosis in the family was obtained in 107, or approximately 36 per cent. of the cases.

History of Haemoptysis—This was obtained in 149 of the patients, and in 24 of that number it was the first symptom of the disease.

History of Pleurisy—In 98 cases there was a history of pleurisy, and in 59 of that number it preceded the cough.

The following particulars show the gains or losses. Weight—gained, 250; lost, 37; unchanged, 8; non-tubercular, 15—Total, 310.

Fitness for work on discharge—Fit, 111; light work, 86; not fit, 93; dead, 5; non-tubercular, 15—Total, 310.

Duration of Stay—The average duration of stay was 120 days.

A scheme of work has been put into force so that each patient has a certain amount to perform, suited to his or her capacity—the greater part of the work in the grounds having been done by the patients, male and female.

During the year, at stated intervals, I have submitted to you special reports dealing with certain forms of treatment, such as “continuous inhalation of volatile antiseptics,” and “tuberculin in the treatment of phthisis.” This latter work is being carried on with exactness and discretion, and at a later date further facts will be placed before you.

I have to tender my thanks to the members of the Advisory Board for valuable advice and help during the year. The general conduct and discipline of the Sanatoria have been maintained in an efficient condition.

My best thanks are due to the Matron, the two Resident Medical Officers, and the other members of the Staff for their loyal help and co-operation, without which this efficiency could not have been secured:

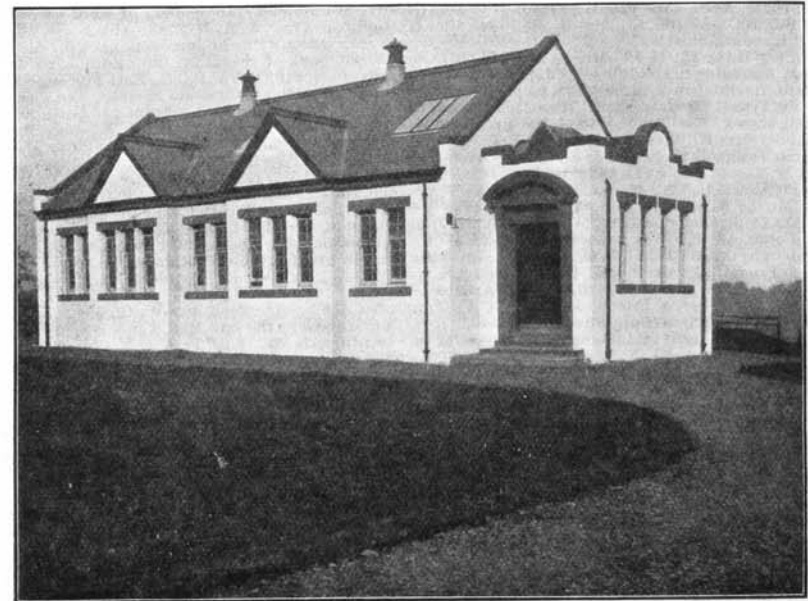

£4,000 required for each Additional Home.

THOSE who remember the early appeals made by Mr. Quarrier for help for poor epileptics will recollect that it was not from any desire to associate such work with the Orphan Homes of Scotland, but because he found in his labours among the poor the great need for something to be done for those suffering from this dreadful disease. It was customary to send such cases to asylums and poor-houses, where from the nature of the disease they were almost certain to become confirmed lunatics. All Mr. Quarrier could do was done to arouse interest in the matter, but as no movement was made by others he felt impelled when the monies were offered him to start the present Colony to do so just as he had started the Consumption Sanatoria, and it has already proved itself not only a

blessing to the Colonists who have come within its influence, but if possible a greater blessing to the homes from which they come, where too often the poor epileptic was a burden almost beyond bearing. Now that the movement has proved itself a success, a number of the authorities throughout Scotland are rousing themselves and endeavouring to provide special accommodation for epileptics under their care, and it is to be hoped that the time may soon come when they will be entirely removed from asylums and poor-houses.

During the past year the work of the Colony has gone on as in previous years. The Home for 30 men has been constantly filled and numbers waiting for admission. The men are principally employed in outdoor work, which is most advantageous to their condition of health, but a few are engaged in shoe-making, painting, joinery, etc. Outdoor games,

including football and cricket, are encouraged, and the men are very enthusiastic players.

The Home for Women has accommodation for 30, but there has not been so much pressure for admission. The women are kept employed in laundry and other suitable work.

From time to time concerts and entertainments are given during the winter months, which are much enjoyed by the Colonists.

The third Home, which is intended for Children, is being rapidly proceeded with, and is expected to be occupied during the coming summer.

About £4,000 is required for each additional Home, and the Trustees will welcome gifts, large and small, for further development. It is estimated there are about 6,000 epileptics in Scotland.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1909, there were resident in the Homes 1,388 boys and girls. During the year 343 new cases have been admitted, making a total of 1,731 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows :—Outfitted and sent to domestic service, trades, and situations, 50 ; outfitted and sent to sea, 4 ; outfitted and sent to Canada, 188 ; deaths, 11 ; children under 5 years adopted, 11 ; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 66 ; left to go to relatives, 25 ; sent to other institutions, 6 ; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1909, 1,370, of whom 747 are boys and 623 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 253 boys and girls have been given a start in life and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, sent to sea or to Canada. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and, where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND. — 423 patients were treated during the year, and there were 3,696 attendances at the Dispensary, showing a large increase over previous years.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.—The year began with 40 men and women in residence ; 12 men and 17 women have been admitted ; 15 have been discharged, leaving in residence 54.

THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year is as follows :—For the General Fund, which includes the keep of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home Refuge and Mission, including £580 8s. 2d. earned by working boys, also £5,000 for Church extension, and sundry amounts, as per Cash Statement, £27,284 3s. 3½d. ; for Consumption Sanatoria maintenance and Building Fund, £7,678 13s. 11d. ; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £3,216 16s. 6d. ; for Home and Foreign Missions, £1,276 6s. 1d., making the total amount for all purposes, £39,455 19s. 9½d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

In connection with the City Home work, regular Sunday and Week-day Gospel Meetings have been held in our own Hall, and thousands of tracts have been distributed ; nights' lodgings were given to homeless wanderers, and many visits were paid to the homes of the poor by our workers. Sick and ailing ones have been provided with lines for Infirmarys and Convalescent Homes, and many others have received help and advice in their time of need.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to fellow-labourers, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country ; to ministers, evangelists, and others who have aided in the Gospel work ; to Sabbath school superintendents, teachers, and scholars ; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones ; to the Press which has given notices of the work, and to the accountants, Messrs, M'Farlane, Hutton, and Patrick, who very kindly act as Honorary Auditors.

CONCLUSION.

All the actual needs of the past year have been met, and met with an overflowing hand, for it has been God's hand. All those who seek honestly to live according to Matthew vi. 33 will ever find the great promise of that passage, and of Philippians iv. 19, made good to them. It has been so in 1909-10 as it was in all the years since the first stone was laid at Bridge-of-Weir.

So far as we can forecast these are the principal needs of 1910-11 :—

£20,000 for maintenance of Orphan Children in Glasgow and at Bridge-of-Weir.

£8,000 for maintenance of Consumption Sanatoria.

£1,500 for maintenance of Colony of Mercy.

£2,000 for Emigration.

£4,000 for a Gymnasium, Recreation Hall, and Swimming Bath for older boys and girls. (N.B.—£1,000 is in hand for this object.)

£4,000 each for additional houses in the Colony of Mercy.

A Seaside Home of Rest for workers and children.

£2,000 each for additional Cottages for the Orphans.

£2,000 for Home and Foreign Missions Fund.

Consecrated men and women to act as "fathers and mothers" in the cottages.

Thousands of garments of all kinds will be required to clothe the 1,400 boys and girls, also boots and shoes and blankets and flannels. Groceries, vegetables, fruit, and all gifts of provisions are specially welcome. We could also make use of some pianos or small organs, and if any friend has a strong horse to spare it would be very acceptable, as the conveyance of people and goods the two miles between the Homes and the Station is an increasing problem. A motor lorry and motor car might solve the difficulty.

We desire again to impress upon all our helpers our need of earnest constant prayer that the work may ever be to the glory of God.

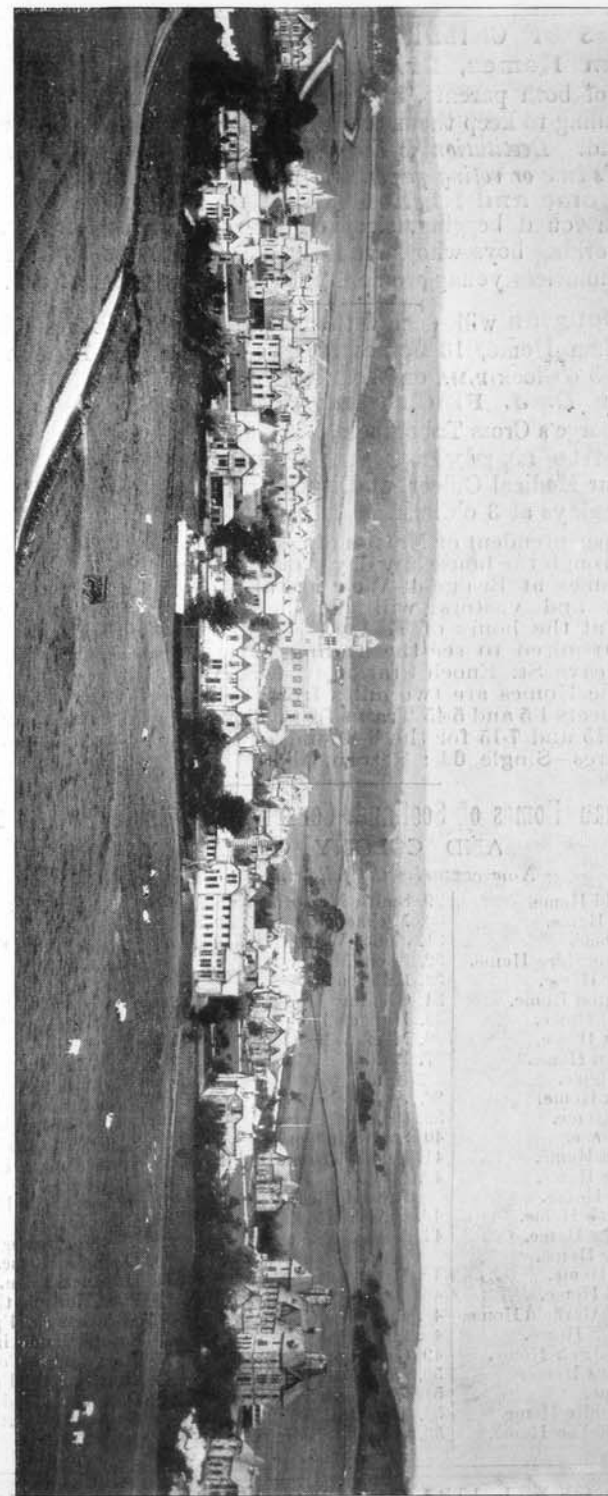

There are 76 Buildings already connected with the work. Additional Homes are still required, to cost £2,000 each; and more houses for Epileptics in the Colony of Mercy to cost about £4,000.

CLASS OF CHILDREN ELIGIBLE FOR ADMISSION.

Orphan Homes, Bridge-of-Weir.—Orphan boys and girls deprived of both parents, and children of widows, with no relative able or willing to keep them, from 1 to 14 years of age, from any part of Scotland. *Destitution is the title for admission, and there is no subscriber's line or voting paper required.*

City Home and Night Refuge, James Morrison St., Glasgow.—Children found begging, sleeping out, or destitute, from 2 to 13 years; working boys who have no home, from 14 to 18 years; and virtuous homeless young women, from 14 to 30 years of age.

Mr. Douglas will deal with all cases applying for admission at City Orphan Home, 13 James Morrison Street, off London Street, from 3 to 5 o'clock P.M., on Wednesdays and Fridays.

Pastor D. J. Findlay may be seen by appointment at the St. George's Cross Tabernacle, 284 New City Road.

Patients applying for admission to Sanatoria can see our Medical Officer, at Dispensary, 25 James Morrison Street, on Wednesdays at 3 o'clock.

The Superintendent or Matron of the City Home will be glad to show friends through the house any day (Sabbath excepted).

The Homes at Bridge-of-Weir are also open for inspection every week-day, and visitors will be shewn round from the Central Building, at the hours of 11 A.M., 1 and 3 P.M. From one to two hours is required to see the leading parts of interest.

Trains leave St. Enoch Station (G. & S.-W. Railway) almost every hour. The Homes are two miles from Bridge-of-Weir Station.

A Bus meets 1-5 and 5-45 Trains from Glasgow, and leaves the Homes Gate at 3-15 and 7-15 for the 3-40 and 7-40 Trains from Bridge-of-Weir daily. Fares—Single, 6d.; Return, 9d.
