

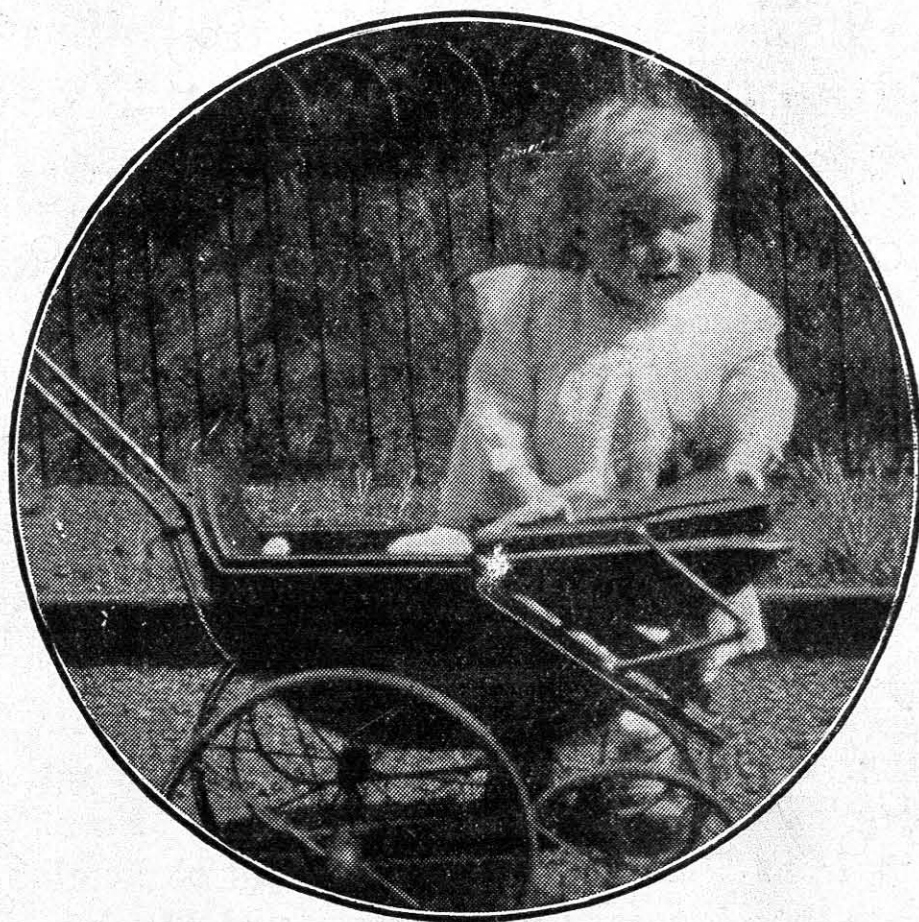

NARRATIVE OF FACTS.
1922.

"IT is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto Thy name, O Most High; to shew forth Thy loving-kindness in the morning, and Thy faithfulness every night." If the psalmist was constrained to send out this testimony thousands of years ago, the duty and privilege are as much if not more laid upon us to-day. The plan of building the Orphan Homes was conceived and carried out—beyond all else—to bear witness to the faithfulness of God; and the fifty-first year of their history has done nothing to alter this testimony. The sermons which sound out from our pulpits are of varying quality and value, and many of them, alas! in these days bear a very uncertain testimony regarding the Living God and His unchanging Word; but here in the midst of the land is a "sermon in stone," with a living, pulsating heart which has only increased in value and volume with the passing years, and which continues to witness to the unfailing loving-kindness of the Heavenly Father. The Homes have nothing between them and bankruptcy but the promises of God, and these have never failed and never can fail.

We cannot remember any year in the past half-century when times were more difficult, when we have had to minister to so many needy ones outside our own boundaries; but inside we can only repeat the oft-spoken testimony that every need has been supplied, that every claim has been met, that we have known nothing of debt or want, and that He who taught us to pray, "Give us day by day our daily bread" has never failed to answer that prayer.

And yet we would not have our friends and partners suppose that we are left without trial and that our pathway has always been in sunshine. God loves us far too much to treat us in such a way. Mr. Quarrier used frequently to say, "God always gives us enough trials to keep us humble," and certainly this has been true in the year just past. There has been a full share of the experiences which go to develop true and robust Christian life in the individual and in the community. Some of the trials which have been special burdens we are not permitted to write of here, but others must find a place in this record.

One of the heaviest trials of the year was the death of Sir Thomas Glen-Coats of Paisley. Like his father before him, Sir Thomas was deeply

interested in the work of the Homes from the very commencement. For many years he was chairman of the Board of Trustees. He was also a generous and regular supporter of the work, and several buildings in our village will keep his memory green as long as they stand and continue to carry forward their beneficent purpose. Well does the present writer remember walking around the grounds with Sir Thomas one Saturday afternoon, when he expressed his desire to erect a house in memory of his

wife, who had recently passed away. At first a cottage to cost £2,000 was in his thought; but as our conversation proceeded a cottage hospital gradually evolved, and the evolution of the generous donor's thought is now to be seen in the beautiful "Elise Hospital," which cost £11,500, and in which hundreds of sick children have found healing and health in the most delightful conditions. We already greatly miss Sir Thomas

Glen-Coats, and will miss him more as the days go by. His kindly and gentle spirit was constantly shown on his frequent visits to the village.

Dr. Ebenezer Duncan is another greatly valued friend of the work whose loss we have had to mourn. Dr. Duncan was personal medical attendant to Mr. Quarrier in his later years, and when the Medical Advisory Board was formed he was one of its first members, as he continued to be till his death. He took a keen and highly intelligent interest in the work of the Consumption Sanatoria, and gave valuable advice and help from time to time in that department especially.

In last year's report we referred to the retiral of our friend Mr. David Douglas, from the post of Superintendent of the Village Homes. We then thought Mr. Douglas might be spared to go quietly in and out amongst us for years to come, but this was not in the plan of God; and just as our year closed and the new one was dawning, the Father took His wearied child home to Himself, so fulfilling his own longing and prayer. The funeral was on Saturday afternoon, and was attended by a great company of mourners, from our own village, the city, and far beyond. We laid the wearied body to rest in our little cemetery beside the church, in which he had so often worshipped and helpfully ministered. His grave is just alongside that of his beloved friends Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier, and there they lie, quietly waiting for the voice, at the sound of which they first shall be raised, and then "we who are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air." Mr. Douglas' position in the village is now excellently filled by his only son Mr. William Douglas.

One of our greatly appreciated preachers in the church was Rev. C. J. T. Merrylees of the South U.F. Church, Paisley. Mr. Merrylees was present at the funeral that Saturday afternoon, apparently in good health. He preached most acceptably the following day and conducted the monthly communion service. Little did we think that he was preaching to us then for the last time and that we should see his face no more. Nine days later this prince of preachers to young people was suddenly called from service on earth to service in heaven.

Another beloved fellow-worker who recently "fell on sleep" was Mrs. John M'Murray, who for more than a generation was "mother" in one of the Homes, where she passed hundreds of girls through her hands, leaving a gracious mark upon many of them which will outlast their earthly lifetimes. Mrs. M'Murray was the last of a family of that name, five members of which have done faithful work on behalf of the children of the Orphan Homes.

These are a few of the bigger and more evident trials of the year; there have been many others which cannot be written of, but which we seek grace to take as from the hand of our loving and all-wise Heavenly Father, who never needlessly wounds and never errs; and so we would "Show forth His loving kindness in the morning and His faithfulness every night."

Our family at the beginning of the year numbered 1,325—in addition to workers—comprised of 1,074 orphan children, 148 consumption patients, and 103 epileptics. During the year we have received 203 children, 269 patients, and 39 colonists; leaving us with a family of 1,350 on 31st October. For the feeding, clothing, nursing, and caring for all of these we have received the following amounts, including payments:—

For the sake of friends who have not seen previous Reports of the Orphan Homes, the following states the basis upon which the work is carried on:—

In the year 1864 Mr. Quarrier began his public work among the street boys of Glasgow by the organisation of shoeblack and newsboys' brigades. Out of these developed the Orphan Homes, which to-day provide a home and Christian training for 1,500 fatherless and orphan boys and girls of all ages. In the years between 1871, when the first Home was opened, and now, 17,575 children have passed through the Homes, 6,558 of whom were sent to Canada. Something like £1,531,151 has been received; £310,000 of that sum has been expended on buildings, land, etc., and £1,221,151 on the maintenance of the Homes and Sanatoria and Colony, and Home and Foreign Missions. The work of the Orphan Homes is carried on in dependence upon God for daily supplies. No one is called on personally, nor do we send out collectors. The needs are committed to God in prayer, and we look to Him to move the hearts of His people to send all that is required.

NOVEMBER, 1921.—The record of the first half-century of work in connection with the Orphan Homes of Scotland closed with a triumphant note of praise to God for all His never-failing mercies. HITHERTO He has led us by ways devious and often-times mysterious, but ever with unchanging faithfulness. So, beginning to pen the story of the first year in the other half of the century, we take courage from a backward look, and believe that HENCEFORTH He will guide us. With the Psalmist we can truly say, "The Lord hath been mindful of us, He will bless."

Among the first gifts to hand are £1 from one of our own grown-up girls in service in this country; 10s. from an Orkney manse; 5s. for the Colony of Mercy "as a thankoffering"; £2, "in honour of the jubilee of the Homes" from a lady in Arbroath; £10 from another in Keswick; £1 from a Paisley Bible class; 3s. 8d. from H. T.; and 10s. from another of our girls who says in her letter, "You will be thinking I am forgetting all about the Homes. I could never forget them and all the kind friends I had there. I have always been wanting to go down and see you again. I am to get a week-end and I will be either on Friday or Saturday. When I came here I had to tell them all about the Homes, which I was very pleased to do. When I see some of the boys and girls here going about the streets, I often say to myself, if they only had the chance we had in the Homes, learning all about Jesus and His wonderful work. I always thank God for ever bringing me to such a wonderful place as the Homes, and tell the people here I could have lived in the Homes always."

The sender of £3 10s., a family gift from Durban, Natal, was cheered "the other Sunday morning when the minister in his short word to the boys and girls spoke of your beloved and honoured father and his early days. It was another case of 'that she hath done shall be told for a memorial to all the world.'" £1 has come from another friend in South Africa, after his recent visit to the Homes; ten dollars with other ten

dollars from her son, from a lady in Vancouver, B.C.; £15 from a helper in Baltimore, Ind.; £3 from Chefoo, China; and "we the S.S. children of —, New Zealand, enclose to you British P.O. for £1. We would like you to spend it at Christmas for your orphan children."

Five pounds of a cheque for £25 is "to help the expenses of the New Year treat"; £10 from Peterhead, "a thankoffering for mercies many and continued received"; £2 5s. from a church work party in Fife; 10s. from an anonymous helper; £5 from one of the teaching staff; five postal orders, value £3, from "Quidam"; £2 from a young women's Guild Bible class; £1 from an Aberdeen Sunday school; £10, "just for the children (babies preferred)" from a friend of theirs in Dunning; other £10 from Thurso; £5, with other £5 for Christmas gifts from London; 7s. 6d. from Durham, with 2s. 6d. from a friend of the sender; a 6s. postal order from Birmingham; £1, "a mite in memory of a brave soldier"; £1 from a Queen's nurse, "wishing you God-speed"; 5s., "in memory of our only and well-beloved daughter"; £100, "in memory 15th October"; £6 from the grateful grandmother of children helped and some of her friends; 10s. from the aunt of one of our present family; and 30s. from three grateful girls, with £5, a thankoffering from their mistress.

A Moffat donor writes as a postscript to her letter, "I still hear from one of the first Isle of Man boys who went out (to Canada) with your boys from Cessnock many years ago." The grateful mother of a boy and girl recently sent to her in New York State, where she has set up a new home for them, says:—

Just a few lines to let you know that the children arrived safe. They certainly look fine and many thanks to you. They said they were a little sick on board, but they were all right when they arrived in New York. The stewardess was very nice and she is to call and see me next time the boat comes to New York. I am to send A—— to school on Monday. A—— says she would like to learn dressmaking. I think that is very useful, and am going to try and get her in a good place to learn it. My husband thinks they are just wonderful children. I was very much surprised to see how well they were clothed and what they brought with them. I certainly owe you a very large account, which I hope some day I can pay you for the years the children have been under your care. I will always make them write you and let you know what they are doing.

Large sums to hand during November include £150, the usual half-yearly donation towards the upkeep of the home for invalid girls; £187 0s. 1d., the residue of a legacy; £500, legacy of an Edinburgh lady; £50 of another in Stirling; other £50 of a Glasgow gentleman; and £100 of another. Still another fifty pounds has come in to mark the completion of fifty years' service with the firm of which the donor is now senior partner. The sender of this gift says, "We are sure you will appreciate the spirit with which it is sent, and we hope that it will prove an example which may be fitly followed by many other successful business men in our city."

A widow in Carlisle sending £5 from her daughter with her own donation of two guineas, says, "We feel we would like to continue the interest my late husband had in the Orphan Homes and pray that God may bless your noble efforts for the children." Two other friends in Clydebank "are praying for the children and for the workers among them, that they may trust in the Saviour in their early years." Such is our constant prayer. May our faith be strong enough to claim them all

for Him. Enclosing a memorial gift of 10s. under date 28th November, another friend writes, "I hope you will have an encouraging meeting to-day, and through all the days to come be able to sing, 'The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad.'" Nor was this hope in vain, as those who were privileged to share with us the inspiration of the annual meeting in the city will remember. For the sake of those less fortunate we publish the following from the columns of *The Glasgow Herald* of 29th November:—

The report for the past year of the Orphan Homes of Scotland, founded fifty years ago by William Quarrier, was characterised by Sir Joseph P. Maclay, Bart., yesterday, as a romance of faith. Sir Joseph, who is honorary treasurer, and a member of the executive council of the Homes, was chairman at the fiftieth annual meeting, which was held in the Christian Institute. There was a large attendance of those interested, and a choir of the children were present and rendered several hymns. Among those on the platform with Sir Joseph Maclay were Sir Samuel Chisholm, Bart.; Pastor D. J. Findlay; the Rev. D. M. McIntyre, Principal of the Bible Training Institute; the Rev. James Muir, the Rev. Peter Rose (London), the Rev. John Bisset, the Rev. J. Fairley Daly, Mr. W. M. Oatts, and Mr. David Perry.

Sir Joseph Maclay submitted the report, which, he said, recorded the fiftieth year's work of the Orphan Homes. The story of the Homes had not changed in the fifty years. They continued to flourish as in the past. The past fifty years to the world at large had been probably more wonderful than any previous period of years. In any way they turned they found progress. There had been progress in science, art, industry, and commerce, and in knowledge of every kind, and in the development of civilisation in nearly all parts of the earth. That afternoon they were specially interested in the development of what might be called human sympathy. Fifty years ago very little was done in this so-called civilised land for suffering humanity. The conception of life seemed to be the survival of the fittest and very little regard for one's neighbour. During those fifty years how great was the change. Nearly all their great institutions that benefited humanity had been brought into being—infirmaries, hospitals, and homes for almost every class of disease, and homes for incurables and the poor and needy. It is well to remind ourselves of those things. Was it not the spirit of Christ which had been permeating this country during those fifty years? There were things in their national and home life they would desire to be without, but he thought it was true that it was not the Devil who reigned. It was God who reigned, and the world was safe in His keeping. To-day, as never before, they realised that they could not live for themselves, and in recent years they had been legislating not only for the sick and suffering and the poor; the country had taken a larger view of life, and legislation had recently been enacted to care for the able-bodied who through no fault of their own were unable to provide for themselves. That was a great step forward, and it was in that direction they wanted more and more to travel.

CANADA'S INDEBTEDNESS.—During the past year the number of children in the Home was 1,100. The accommodation was not wholly required for orphans, and it had been possible during the years of war and since to care for the children of soldiers whose wives were dead. During the past year something like eighty-six of these children had been returned to their fathers, who were now in a position to look after them. Fifty-one boys went to Canada during the year, and he thought the day had gone by when it was necessary to contest the issue as to whether Canada was the place for these boys or not. Canada owed the Orphan Homes of Scotland much; some of the children from the Homes were its best citizens. Referring to the report, he said it was a romance of faith. It told the wonderful story of the manner in which God provided for work which was His own. During the year the income from all sources amounted to £42,562, and the expenditure to £46,023. If, however, they took strictly the income for maintenance and against that the cost of upkeep there was a difference of £6,394, but that did not trouble them. In past years they had more than sufficient for the immediate needs of the Homes, and after making allowance for everything they were left with a balance of £19,570 for maintenance with which to begin the year. The numbers in the Sanatorium during the past year had been greater than ever before. The average number had been 152, and the largest number at any one time 186. The income was £21,838, and the expenditure £20,248. He did not think it was generally realised how beneficial the work of the Sanatorium was, not only directly in the treatment of patients, but also indirectly in the training it

provided for students and doctors. In the Colony for Epileptics they had 103 patients, and the income during the year was £5,660, while the expenditure was £4,867.

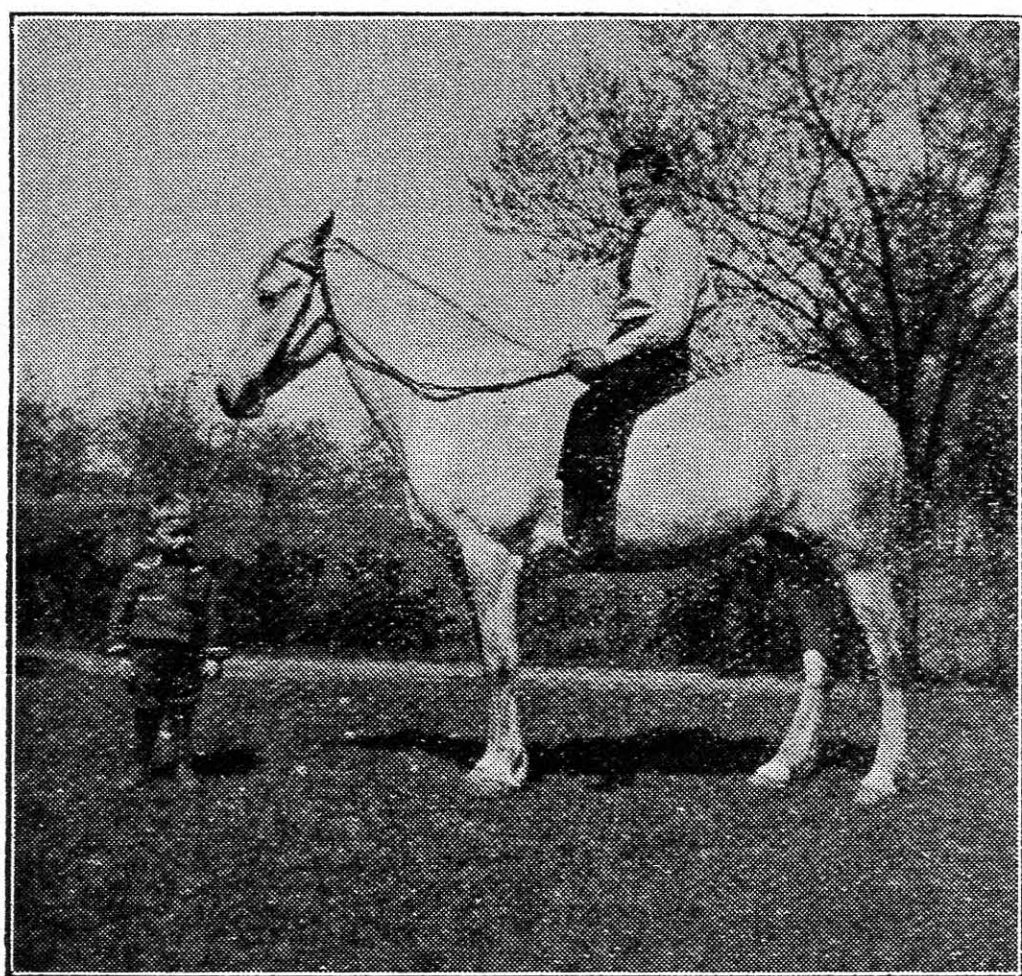
Pastor Findlay seconded the adoption of the report, which was supported by Mr. W. M. Oatts and the Rev. James Muir and approved.

DECEMBER, 1921.—A contributor of long standing "was glad to have the opportunity to be at the annual meeting for the first time and enjoyed very much to hear how the Lord is mindful of the Homes." Another old friend was "specially glad to read your last annual report," and goes on to say, "Surely the fiftieth chapter is as bright and fresh as any that have gone before, for the Lord Himself is writing the story." As God has so signally blessed the work, so may the story of it breathe His spirit and bear His mark upon it. We are very conscious of our inability to do the story justice and pray that nothing in the telling may detract from the miracle itself. A helper in Kilmaurs has "just been reading your annual report with tears falling," and tells that "two wee words in your opening words of the Narrative, 'never can,' have come as a most inspiring word to me at this time spoken in connection with God's promises never failing." Another thoughtful friend has found from the report the exact number of our family and sent a cheque for £26, "being sixpence each for 1,040 children for part of their Christmas treat." She says further, "I would like you to give each child a new sixpence in its hand to spend itself. If this will not be allowed for any reason, please return me the cheque. I do not want it to go into their money boxes. I used to love a silver piece in my childhood to spend myself, but I disliked my money box heartily always." This gift will be used according to the donor's wish and will afford untold delight to the youngsters.

Two sisters in Northumberland have sent £5 with other £5 for emigration expenses; one of our fellow workers, £1; another, 30s., "a thankoffering to help trim the Christmas tree"; a Glasgow firm, £10 from a Canadian donor; a firm from whom we buy regularly, £10; someone interested in Tewkesbury, 8s. 6d.; another in Yorkshire, 2s. 6d.; a friend in Kirkcaldy, £2 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria and £1 for the Colony of Mercy; a helper in Fochabers, 10s., "towards the fund for the children's Christmas dinner"; a regular donor in Mauchline, a cheque for £60; a former helper in the Colony of Mercy, 10s., with 10s. more to buy fruit for the Colonists; an old friend in Bearsden after reading the last report, £20; two others in Glasgow and Edinburgh respectively, £50 each; someone in Fraserburgh, £4, with 10s. for reports; a lady in Burntisland, £10 for the Sanatoria; a former Colonist, 5s.; someone in Stranraer, 20s. for the Christmas tree; another in Hampshire, £5 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; one in the Isle of Wight, 5s.; an Edinburgh friend, 30s., "with congratulations on your splendid work and in remembrance of my father who knew yours"; a lady in Dumbarton, who "can remember visiting the girls' home in Renfield Street in the early seventies," £2; "an old nurse" now over eighty years of age, £5; another dear friend in Ayrshire now eighty-six years old, £100; another Ayrshire friend, interested in a little Moroccan girl lately added to our family, £100; as a thankoffering for special blessing received recently; "one of your boys" in Ontario, ten dollars; and two aged friends in New Zealand, 50s., in celebration of their jubilee. The sender writes, "I am now into my seventy-fourth year and fifty-six years in Christ. My dear old com-

panion will be eighty-four next month and we are both living on borrowed time, redeeming the remainder of our time as best we can." Oh that we might all have grace to redeem our time to the full.

Two pounds has come from a Bristol helper, "for blessings received from the King"; 2s. 6d. from a widow in Perth; £1 for the Homes with 30s. for the Sanatoria from Cannes, France; £10 from Tientsin; £1 per one of the workers in the village; 20s. from a former co-worker; 30s., "a thankoffering for a good crop of carrots which turned out far better than we expected"; £5 from a farmer near Dundee; 2s. 6d. from a helper in Shetland; 10s. per one of the workers; £40 from New Zealand; 5s. from Birmingham; £60, a family gift from Glasgow side by side with 1s. from an Edinburgh friend; 30 dollars from one of our Canadian boys; £10 from another in this country and his wife; 5s. from a grateful boy at present in the village; 2s. 6d. from one of our girls in a situation not far from us; 4s. from another; and 10s. from a third in Glasgow who says, "My thoughts are always with you all at Bridge-of-Weir. One can always depend on an answered letter from you." Still another of

the grown-up family, an incurable invalid, who makes a little pocket money by doing crochet work, having received almost double what she expected for her largest piece of work, has sent out of a grateful heart far bigger than her purse, 10s., with the request that a shilling of this sum be added to our annual collection for mission work among the Jews.

An old Orkney friend sending 10s. writes, "I just think I see Mr. Quarrier in the Argyle Street shop when 50 years ago as a boy I was sent with a small sum to him";

and another in Irvine, "I well remember your father, Mr. Quarrier, beginning his work and what a great monument it has become." Two pounds is "part of the Lord's tenth" from a Belfast lady, who says, "It is so good of Him allowing us to help keep His work moving"; £4, Sunday fees from one who has a life-long association with the work; £1 from fellow-workers; 5s. from the grandmother of one of our girls; £1 from a former helper in the village; 20s. "In memory of my husband who passed away last Christmas night"; £10 from Hong-Kong; £2 from a company of Girl Guides; other £2 from Aberystwyth; £1 from the pupils of the qualifying class in a northern county school; 10s., "what I would have been using for his Christmas present," from a mother sorrowing over the recent loss of her dear little nine-year-old boy; and 10s. from the long-ago familiar "Alice, Willie, and Jessie" whose father writes, "The Narrative is delightful and uplifting—the best of all that's been."

Among the gifts ear-marked for Christmas treats we find, £13 6s., being the birthday offerings for 1921 of the children attending a Grange-mouth Sunday school; 8 dollars 80 cents from a friend in Ontario; 20s. from a lady in Troon; 3 dollars from Vancouver, B.C.; a guinea from Durham; £5 to be spent on a treat for the children in Elise Hospital; 20s. from a little friend in Greenock; £2 from a primary class in Musselburgh, to be used for the invalid children of the Oswald Home; and 10s. from a girls' club with a box of gifts for their little friend Carol on Christmas morning. Through many such gifts our boys and girls have not been disappointed in their eager anticipation of Christmastide, and it has been possible to buy and select the numerous gifts to which they are still looking forward on the trees on New Year's day. Well-filled stockings to greet them at break of day, special fare enough for both Saturday and Sunday, and parties to no end have made the Christmas season a right merry time indeed. Multiply the usual bustle of preparations and festivities of an ordinary household several hundred times, and you will better appreciate what a hive of industry our village is during these exciting days.

From the donors of one of the boys' homes has come their annual donation of £80 for the Homes and £20 for the Sanatoria; £100 more from two other friends; £2 from Pretoria; £5 each from two local women's guilds; £3, first-fruits from an old fellow-worker with 2s. from a friend in Ireland; 27s. 6d., the proceeds of toffee-making; £100 from a friend in Hampshire; £1 from one of the old girls, now a regular army nurse in England; and £2, "just a little to help along" on the closing night of the year from one of our oldest fellow-labourers in the work.

Our treasury has been swelled considerably this month by the payment of five legacies ranging in amount from twenty-two to five thousand pounds, the last-mentioned from the estate of a friend of the beloved Founder, who for a great many years was closely associated with him and us in the work of the Homes and Sanatoria and Colony. Accompanying the gift of a bright Christian lad who went to Canada as one of the first post-war party is the following letter, written on an up-to-date Ontario farm, where he has made a real home and found appreciative friends:—

Christmas time has come again with all its happy memories of bygone Christmases spent in the Homes, and I can picture the same old scenes at this season and wish I could be with you again. I have now been about two years on this farm and like it exceedingly well. I came out here with the 1920 party and was also a member of the Boys' Christian Association, and it is with extreme pleasure I look back on those days. We seldom have any meetings here except a church service every two weeks, but one has the Bible and God as a constant companion and help all along the way. I am sending a little gift with this letter to be used as you will, as a small thank-offering to God for all that was done for me while under your care. Wishing you all a right merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

So, released from the strain of these busy weeks, with another of time's milestones close at hand, we go with our fellow-workers to the church to spend the last hour of the old year in praise and prayer. Our hearts are indeed overflowing with gratitude to God for all His wondrous grace and providence throughout 1921. At the recollection of our own poor service and following of the Master, oft, alas! afar off, we humbly dedicate ourselves anew to the work of His Kingdom and His children, praying in the lines of Dr. Horatius Bonar,

Lord, give me light to do Thy work
 For only, Lord, from Thee
 Can come the light by which these eyes
 The way of work can see.
 The work is Thine, not mine, O Lord!
 It is Thy race we run;
 Give light, and then shall all I do
 Be well and truly done.

JANUARY, 1922.—The first day of the year being Sunday, there was opportunity to express our gratitude to God for all the good things He sends—not least of these, health of body and soundness of mind to enjoy His other gifts—by contributing to the church collections in aid of the Glasgow hospitals, for which we were able to gather the goodly sum of twenty pounds.

Two great pine trees stood in their places on the platform that day, but clothed only in Nature's leafy garb, so that the busy workers, who dressed them anew with gifts for the children, had to be very early at work on Monday morning to have everything in readiness for a thousand expectant youngsters (already astir and agog with excitement) when they would gather in the afternoon to receive each a present. Then the centre of attraction was the great doll, "Pollyanna," as she sat in her swing suspended between the trees, beaming on everyone—the symbol of gladness. She is beautifully attired in clothes that can be taken off, has flexible joints, and eyelids that close when she is laid down to sleep. She is much too grand to be given for her very own to any one child, so she will visit the girls' homes in turn, spending a month with each. After the trees had been stripped of their fruit only one boy out of that great multitude was without a parcel, and he was soon on his way home happy with an extra gift to offset his temporary disappointment.

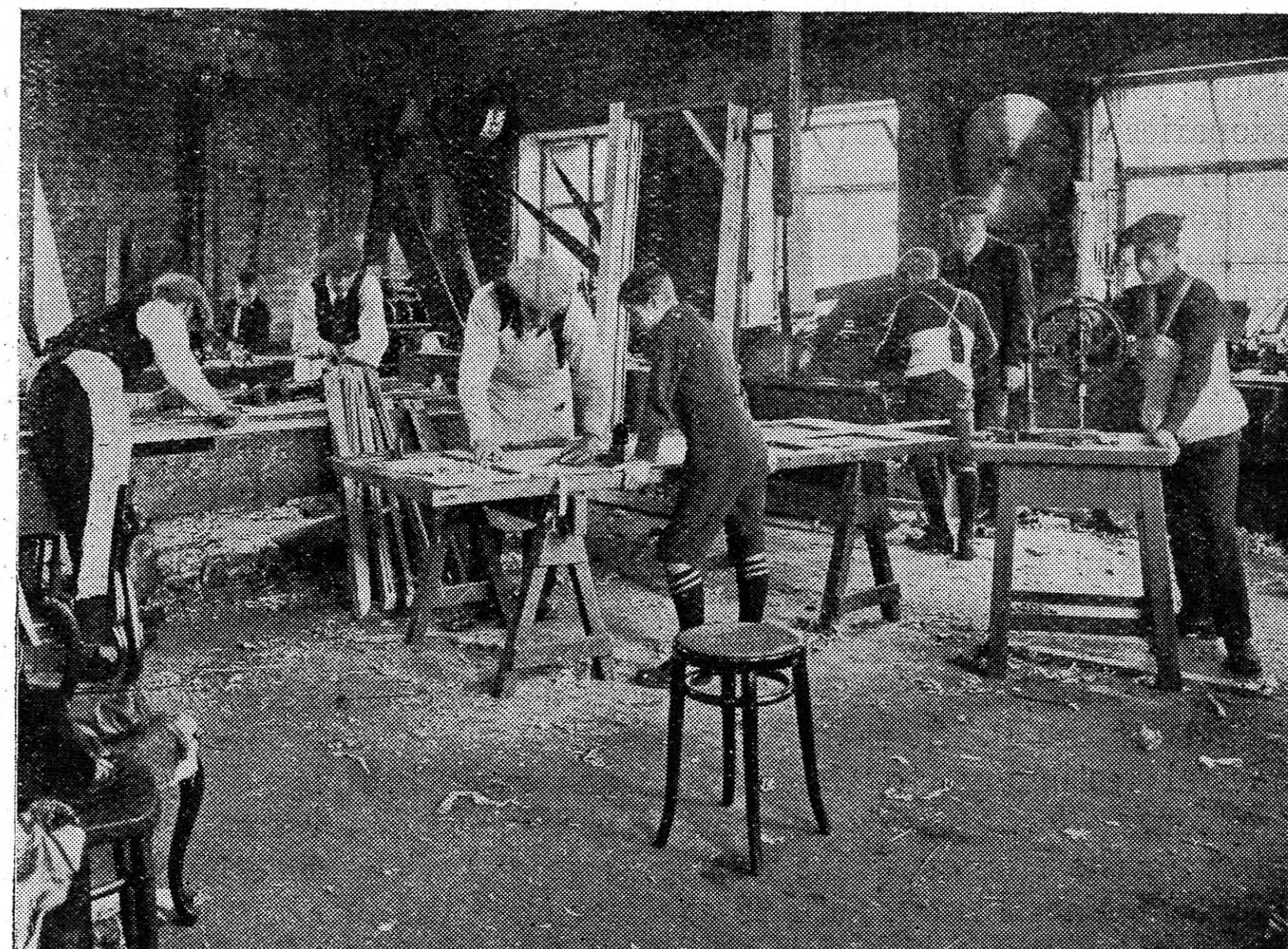

Interspersed between the reels of the film was a programme of choral pieces and recitations more excellent than ever. What a host, from North and South and East and West the wide world o'er, were with us in thought and spirit, as at the end of a very happy day, we gathered them around the family altar with those within our gates. May our Heavenly Father bless them everyone according to His perfect knowledge of their needs.

A girl, whom we sent to a situation in Edinburgh last summer, sending five shillings, writes,

I duly received your New Year Letter, also calendar, for which I thank you. The letter I have read and some of my girl friends are reading it, and they never cease to thank God for raising such a place, and I'm certain you understand my feelings about them. On 26th December I was at a social in connection with our meeting at —, and a Mr. G—— spoke about the Homes, and the Wednesday following, several of the brethren prayed for them. Then on 2nd January I was out to tea with a Mrs. —, and she handed me a 1921 report. She herself was busy knitting garments which she is going to send on when finished. I trust Mrs. Burges and you are in good health. I always remember you in prayer, also your noble work.

Six shillings have been received from another of our grown-up girls with the good news that she has joined the church. She says, "Thank you very much for your kind letter which I received a few days past. I

am enclosing a small present which I hope you will accept from me. I always like to remember the good old Homes where I was so well cared for all the time I was there. I am liking M—— very much and also my job. Write soon and give me all the news about the Homes." Two dollars have come from one of the last Canadian party to buy sweets for the boys in the Home where he used to live; and a five shilling postal order from another of the girls in this country. "I would like to help some other children," she writes, "after all the years of tender care taken over me. I am trying to live a life well-pleasing in the sight of my Master, and I have yielded my heart and soul over into His keeping, knowing that He does all things well. My friends are guiding me on the upward road and are helping me in every possible way, and I am preparing myself to sit at the Lord's table. I am getting on splendidly and in good health.

With kind regards to all at the Homes." The sender of a bank draft for £10 from himself and two other friends, tells us good news of the continued well-doing and progress of still two more of our scattered family, one of whom is now working in a bank, and the other at school.

Another boy, grateful for the shelter and care of the Homes, has sent half-a-crown; and three more of our girls, five, ten, and fifteen shillings respectively. Two pounds is "in memory of two birthdays"; 10s. from a former teacher in the school; 30s., the gift of children in a Stornoway Sunday school; 20s., enclosed in an envelope bearing the Stirling postmark; £2 5s. from a few friends at Lochgilphead; £1 from a helper on the Island of Islay; 10s. from a postman; £20, an annual gift from St. Boswells; 10s. from a little girl in Aberdeen; £2 for the Colony of Mercy from two sisters as a thankoffering; £5 from an old friend in Dundee who has passed her ninety-seventh birthday; £50 from another old friend;

£1 from Tobermory; 10s. 6d. "from the Lord's portion"; 25s. from a Glasgow company of the Girls' Life Brigade; £2 from a Lerwick Sunday school; and £25 from a lady in London, who had omitted to send her usual gift for the Christmas trees and wishes this sum used for a special treat.

During the latter part of December and the early days of January all the boys and girls over school age have had a grand day's shopping and sight-seeing in the city; but the school holidays will long be remembered because during these crisp winter days the village store literally swarmed with eager children who had come to spend, out of their own hands, the new sixpences referred to last month. The youngsters were simply intoxicated with the joy of such a rare experience. We can think of nothing which has afforded them more delight, and wish the kind donor, who hit upon this happy idea, could have seen the effect of her thoughtful generosity. The Lord reward her for it.

Sums to hand from beyond the United Kingdom include £3 from two missionaries in Nyasaland; 7 dollars 50 cents from British Columbia; £1 from a lady in Pittsburgh, Pa.; 750 dollars, equivalent to £100, being part proceeds of a Hong-Kong bazaar; £25 from a St. Andrew's Society in Japan; £4 from a helper in New Zealand; £2 from a Shanghai friend; 5 dollars from Hamilton, Ontario; £1 from Durban friends visiting; £36 10s. from a church working party in Hong-Kong; and £5 from another New Zealand friend, whose mother "took to the Home when first opened, the third boy to be admitted." Two legacies, amounting respectively to twenty-seven shillings and nine hundred pounds. £300 out of a cheque for £1,000 is towards the expenses of the Elise Hospital, and £1,000 for the Home and Foreign Missions Fund is accompanied by £300 for the general fund and £50 for the Sanatoria.

In a letter bringing £2 10s. from Northern Nigeria, the missionary writer tells that "the memory of a visit I paid to the Homes while I was a student at the B.T.I. in 1911-12 is still very precious to me, and the wonderful testimony to God's wondrous care has left an indelible impression." Two friends on the Canadian Pacific coast "are still bearing up the Homes at the throne of grace." The Glasgow donor of £10 for the general fund, with £2 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony, hopes "that showers of blessing will fall on all our land, and that your young folk may be led to decision for Christ." For this we continue fervently to pray. Some months ago a Christian friend in Chicago, while travelling on the train, was led to pray that before the year closed he might be privileged to make a contribution to the work here. He continued to make this request, and now we have from him twenty-five dollars, made possible because of a gift of one it was his privilege many years ago to assist. With three shillings from another friend have come the following familiar and suggestive lines,

FEBRUARY, 1922.—Towards supplying this month's needs a patient in the Sanatoria has contributed 5s. along with 5s. more from a friend visiting her; old friends of the work in a Dunfermline church, who sent a splendid box of useful garments recently, £9; George's sisters, £5 for their own orphan; a Sunday school in Kintyre, £1; a branch of the Glasgow Foundry Boys' Religious Society, £2 15s. 6d. for the Sanatoria; a Motherwell friend, £25, "in gratitude for another birthday"; two of our fellow-workers, £2; the children of a Sunday school, where some of our young folks worship while on holiday, 30s.; two missionaries in

China, £2; members of a choir who provided an entertainment for some of our community on a recent Saturday, 31s. 6d.; an Edinburgh helper, £2, "as a thankoffering to the Lord for answered prayer"; another in Galashiels, 10s. for the Sanatoria; and a dear old friend in Natal, 10s.

Forty-five years ago on the 10th of this month, with the laying of the first stone of the Broadfield Home, the beloved Founder's vision of a group of ten national orphan homes, with accommodation for 300 children, began to be materialised. The majority of folks in those days, sceptical as now, looked upon his plan as the ridiculous dream of an enthusiast which would never have any substance. Amazing as was his faith, it came far short of Divine power. What hath God wrought—eighty buildings with room for 1,500 children, besides patients and colonists. To Him be the glory. "I was exceedingly disappointed," writes an old friend,

"in not being present at the Jubilee celebration of the Orphan Homes of Scotland, the more so because I had the pleasure of taking part in the opening ceremony. I have been at the City Home and put in a few stitches for girls about to sail for Canada." A Kirkintilloch friend "has just been reading a report of the Homes and been greatly impressed and interested," and goes on to say, "It is the first report I have ever read about it. Please accept the enclosed postal order for 20s. I would like to do my little bit in this part of God's vineyard."

An old Killearn Home boy has written on a telegram form, "Carry on the good work," and enclosed therewith a gift of five pounds to help us do so. One of the girls in a situation only a few miles distant from her old home has sent 10s. and another 5s. in the following letter:—

I have at last settled down to write a few lines to you. I must first of all apologize for not writing sooner. I have always been thinking of you all although not writing. I am quite settled down and getting on very well. I often think of the dear Homes where I was brought up and cared for so well. I have been visiting a few of my relatives and they all say I am looking so well and strong, so it is the Homes I have to thank for it. When I came out at first I was pleased to see that I got a book of the life of Mr. Quarrier. I have read it and let my uncle and aunt read it too and my mistress also and many more. It is a beautiful book. I feel proud of being in the Homes and will never regret being put in them. I have joined Bible class with my brother and like it very well. Dear Miss Quarrier, please accept this small gift. It is not much, but it will always be a little help. I feel I will never be able to give you all I owe to the Homes and the kind friends who have protected me from what I might have been. I have lived ten happy years in the Homes and long for the old days again.

Two legacies, totalling £358, have been paid to the honorary treasurer. One of the workers has sent £1; a lady in Chesterfield, a war bond worth £100; a helper in Harrogate, a most acceptable present of 20 pairs of blankets; the mothers of a Glasgow Rent Savings Club, £5, towards the maintenance of a girl in the Glasgow Home whose support they have undertaken; a sorrowing father, £2 11s., "in memory of our wee girl just three-and-a-half months old, who had received the enclosed from friends"; an Ayrshire mother, 7s. as a thankoffering for full restoration to health of her little girl, who "lay all summer suffering from hip disease"; another mother, 10s. "in memory of our little boy Robert"; still another, £1 2s. 2d., "in loving memory of husband and daddy"; and one in New Jersey, £6, "for your little ones in memory of our baby girl who died eight years ago."

Other transatlantic gifts are £1 from a lady in Shrewsbury, Mass.; £2 from Alleghany, Pa.; 15 dollars from the poor folks attending a Montreal mission, with other 15 dollars later from the Sunday school in connection with it; 5 dollars from an old personal friend in Winnipeg; a cheque for £15 from someone in Washington, D.C.; £2 from Winnipeg; and the equivalent of 9 dollars from the same city, the sender of which says, "It may be as I was told since writing you last, you do not advertise your needs as I suggested you should, because your worthy founder was not inclined to thus seek the public's support, but depended on an Heavenly Father supplying the needs of the children. Mr. Quarrier told me when I was a fellow-passenger with him across the ocean over 30 years ago, he sometimes had not known where the meals for the children were to come from next day, but he said the supplies never failed. He certainly had great faith in God. 'Tis a pity we have not all such a trust in times like the present."

Some time ago we were able to secure splendid accommodation on the Anchor liner *Cameronia* for a party of children whom we had planned to send to Canada on a date somewhat earlier than usual. Accordingly the whole of the month has been devoted to preparations of every kind for this exodus of young emigrants. By the first train on the morning of 24th inst. we set off with them to embark at the Princes Dock, from which the vessel sailed a few minutes after our arrival. On the way down the river there was ample opportunity to inspect the comfortable self-contained sleeping quarters, the palatial dining saloon (where we saw them at their first meal), the decks well sheltered from the weather, and by no means of least importance the shower baths, which constitute a novelty for third-class passengers on Atlantic liners. At Greenock we said good-bye to the 43 boys and 5 girls who, under the tutelage of our superintendent, Mr.

William Douglas, go forth with high hopes to begin the adventure of life in a new land across the sea. "He will carry you through" was the message we wired them at Liverpool next day, where they called *en route* to Halifax. Many prayers will follow them on the long voyage and throughout the longer journey of life thereafter.

MARCH, 1922.—After a very stormy passage the Canadian party reached Halifax at noon on Monday, 6th inst., where, contrary to the known reputation of immigration officials, they had the pleasing experience of being complimented specially by the medical examiners upon their intelligent appearance and general fitness as immigrants. Two days later they arrived at their destination in Brockville, and were made heartily welcome not only by our own staff, but also by the townspeople in general, who are always glad to see our Scotch boys and girls coming to settle among

them. Right from the moment they stepped from the train there were happy reunions of brothers and sisters and chums who had been separated from each other for longer or shorter periods. By the end of the week the final good-byes were said and all of the party settled in their new Canadian homes, some being placed with prosperous young farmers, who themselves had been brought up in the Homes and begun successful careers in the same way. One of these told his new boy that he had purchased his farm from his first employer, and that he must do the same from him some day so as to keep up the honour and reputation of the O.H.S.

A regular donor in Ross-shire writes, "I am sending the usual £1 postal order for the children. I saw in the papers that you had sent some more off to Canada. I hope they will get on and that a blessing will follow them. It is a great thing to be instrumental in giving a chance to these children." Another friend near Fort-William hopes they will arrive safe and well. One of our grown-up girls, now in Edinburgh, says in a letter enclosing 5s. for the work,

You will be surprised to get a letter from me, but I think you like to hear from the girls who have been in the Orphan Homes. I am working for myself now and thought I would like to send you a little gift towards the Homes and to say how grateful I am for all you did for me while I was under your care. I used often to wish I was back after I left. Miss — writes to me sometimes, and it is nice to hear how the other girls are getting on. I always go up to Miss —'s house when I get my day off, and she often tells me about the Homes. I was interested to hear about the party going to Canada. It reminds me of the time when my brother went. He writes to me often and is getting on very well. I hope you are all well at Homelea.

A cheque for £673 15s. has come to hand to cover the cost of passages and outfits of members of the Canadian party eligible for grants under the Overseas Settlement Scheme. Other large items in this month's income are a legacy of £2,000; two others from Edinburgh, amounting respectively to £100 and £200; £2,500, being part payment of a fourth; a fifth of £30; and a sixth worth £132 10s.

A Glasgow Sunday school has contributed 14s. 5d. towards the funds of the Sanatoria; a lady in Dundee, £5 "in loving memory"; a helper in Hawick, £2; a Parkhead man and his wife, a ten guinea thankoffering; a mother, 10s., "a thankoffering to God for His kindness in helping my son to pass in his exams."; someone in Blairmore, 2s. 6d.; two missionaries in China, £2; a local friend, £20 for the Homes, with £5 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony; a friend in Milnathort, £7, another thankoffering; a Helensburgh helper, a deposit receipt for £20; one in London, 10s.; a grateful male patient in the Sanatoria, £5; a Melbourne doctor, £5; "O", ten guineas; and a distressed mother asking prayer that the Great Physician may cure her son entirely of his epilepsy, £2 for the Colony.

"On Christmas day, instead of our usual lesson, I told my girls' Bible class the wonderful story of the Homes," a friend in Edinburgh writes, "and suggested that if each of us did something we might be able to send you a parcel and so have a small share in your great work. The result has really surpassed my expectations, as my 16 girls are all very busy. It has been a joy to them to do the work, and it is a great pleasure to me to send the parcel. Enclosed is £1 1s. 9d., which was given in cash." Forty rupees has come from the young people attending a Sunday morning service in India; 10s. from Arbroath, being "part proceeds of work done";

£10 for the Homes with £2 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony from Wishaw; 10s. from an aged widow in Helensburgh; £1 from Brazil; a postal order for 5s. from Birmingham; £2 from Sussex; £1 "for children's food fund" from Detroit, Michigan; £12 from a regular helper in Washington, D.C.; 2s. from Walkerburn, with the eminently true remark, "every little helps"; 5s., a birthday gift; 3 guineas from a Coldstream friend; 10s. from a West Hartlepool man; and seven guineas from a lifelong friend in Muswell Hill.

In a letter enclosing a cheque for ten pounds a Glasgow business man says, "Two things always strike me in connection with your work—its wonderful success and the amount of ignorance regarding it, even in the West of Scotland." The circle of our friends is so wide that one may



sometimes be tempted to think that the work of the Orphan Homes is so well known as to guarantee its provision without the exercise of that faith so essential in its early days. But on the contrary, it is just as our good friend says. Many people within easy distance of our village, and in the great city, so many of whose children have had their homes here, do not know even of our existence. Does it not the more redound to the glory of our all-sufficient God, who has never broken His promise, that, though "the young lions do lack and suffer hunger; they that seek the Lord shall not want any good thing?" It has never been our way to advertise. More than ever to-day is the old faith that brought the work into being, necessary. Who will be our helpers in prayer to tell the Master of our needs?

31st March was a red-letter day in our village when we had the joy of welcoming home our Superintendent, Mr. William Douglas, and his

young bride from Canada, she having gone there from our midst twelve years ago. The children and workers gave them a right royal reception, flags waving and voices full of hearty cheering. In the evening we all gathered in our Mount Zion when the bride and bridegroom were specially welcomed and presented with a piano, the gift of the children workers, and friends. The function closed with a happy re-union of workers old and young in the Central Hall, which is so linked with memories of past days. We do praise our Heavenly Father for new joys given in these young lives, consecrated to His service for the children. The wedding group on page 17 will, we feel sure, be interesting to our friends.

APRIL, 1922.—Our old helper "Inasmuch," sending 50s., is rejoiced in heart "to know that notwithstanding the changes that have taken place during the later years, yours and kindred efforts have suffered so little." He continues, "Surely this points to the faith in that guiding hand which has carried that work through all the years. He who changes not is still the chief Director and cannot fail." Oh that we might lean less to our own understanding and submit our plans to the will of Him who alone can direct us aright. "We are living in a scene where everything is movable," says the Fraserburgh donor of £4; "what a mercy to have a grasp of something that is immovable." How often in these days of sudden changes has this been our refuge.

Among the month's gifts in kind we have 28 pounds of sausage from a Lanarkshire butcher; 9 cwts. of ling from our faithful friend "Fellowship"; and a copy of the motion-picture film showing the embarkation of the Canadian party on board the *Cameronia* at Glasgow in February last. "To help get ribbons for the girls' hats," a thoughtful friend has sent £2; an anonymous donor in Wellington, New Zealand, 20s.; the pupils of an Ayrshire school, 26s.; a very old friend and faithful helper of the work, £1, with £1 later on from the members of her Bible class; a Glasgow firm, 3 guineas; an old worker, £2; a regular donor in St. Andrews, £1; a branch of the B.W.T.A., £10; a friend per one of the workers, 5s., "in memory of a little one"; two friends in South Australia, £30; a servant in Lockerbie, £2, with a stamp to cover postage on the acknowledgment of her gift; other two servants, £2; I. B. K., £5 from Sydney, New South Wales; and the grateful aunt of a family helped, two of whom have been sent to Canada, £20.

One pound "in remembrance" was left by a recent visitor specially interesting to us, for his mother was emigrated to Canada as long ago as 1876. He is the second son in the family group which appears on page 19. Their home is in British Columbia, but the ship on which he is chief wireless operator happening to be in Glasgow, he came to see his mother's old Home, of which he had heard so much. It was a Wednesday, so he had the privilege of worshipping in the church with the children and was able to join with them in singing their vesper hymn, "Jesus, tender Shepherd," which his mother had learned in the Home, and he, with the rest of the family, had been taught at her knee as a child.

Ten shillings has been received from one of our girls in a situation in a near-by town; and six pounds from the household of an establishment where three others are employed as maids. This was an Easter offering to which their mistress tells us "your girls joyfully responded and each gave ten shillings." We have been greatly cheered by news of another

of our girls who has recently been placed out. In the course of her letter her mistress says,

We are already finding M—— of great help to us, and in so many little ways, as she goes about her work, we see with what thoroughness she must have been trained at your Homes. All her work is done carefully and quietly, and occasionally we hear her singing softly to herself, which makes us feel she must be happy. She was very nervous at first, and it was with difficulty we could draw forth a smile from her face, but now that she feels more at home with us and knows how we wish to be her friends she looks a different girl. She eats and sleeps well and her cheeks are filling out. Her outings are rather limited yet, but we do not wish to push her out too suddenly into the world, and prefer to take her with us when we do our shopping. We are sorry that the Y.W.C.A. Bible class finished last Sabbath, but we shall see to it that M—— comes with us to church at night. She must always keep up her church-going habit. I shall write from time to time regarding M——.



A family in Elgin have sent a cheque for twenty pounds "for the upkeep of our little girl." The writer of the note in which it was enclosed says, "I was very glad to hear that she was a 'winsome' lassie, and I trust she may grow in grace and in winsomeness too." He also enquires after the two girls whom they formerly supported, one of whom was married some time ago and is comfortably settled in her own Canadian home. A member of an Edinburgh congregation whose minister preached with great acceptance in our church for the first time on a recent Sunday, says, "We had a very fine lecture last Sunday night on the work and life of the late Mr. Quarrier. The minister also described the Homes you have the oversight of and your labour on behalf of the children. I wish you all success in your work and enclose a small donation of one pound."

Some time ago we sent some lantern slides of the village to a friend in Dunedin, New Zealand, who had visited us last summer. Now he has remitted five pounds to pay for his three pounds' worth of pictures. Another friend across the sea has forwarded £4 8s. "collected from all my Scotch girl friends in Morristown, New Jersey." Three legacies, amounting to £2,250 2s. 10d., have helped considerably to supply the needs of the big family during this month. The largest of them, approaching £2,000, came to us by the will of an Aberdeen friend.

MAY, 1922.—Enclosing £2, "just an old nurse" writes, "Please accept as a thankoffering for being brought through a severe illness. I thought the call had come. It has pleased our Heavenly Father to spare me, although I am nearly 82 years of age. To His name be all the praise." A friend in Cullen, whose mother was in the habit of sending something for the work every Christmas time, says, "Last two years she asked me to send it for her, but somehow or other I omitted to do so. Just a month ago she passed over to the other side at the age of 75 and now I hasten to comply with her wish. I send you £1 from her and £1 from myself, and as long as I am able I will try and send you something every year." So He who "moves in a mysterious way" has not allowed the good purpose of His aged servant to miscarry. Twelve dollars from a widow in Pennsylvania has come with the explanation, "It is the last money my husband worked for before he passed away to be with the Lord. He was so much interested in the Homes, my daughter and I thought we would like to send the little that was due him by his employers."

Two pounds is the gift of children attending a Sunday school in Wick; a guinea of members of another in Stranraer; £10 of two sisters in Edinburgh; £2 for the Homes with £1 for the Sanatoria of a lady in Edinburgh; 10s. of a visitor to one of the staff; £3 of the Girls' Auxiliary of a city church; £2 10s. of the teachers and scholars of another Sunday school in Brisbane, Australia; £3 of a helper also resident in Queensland; £6 of three sisters in London; 10s. of the members of a Cumberland branch of the Y.W.C.A.; £1 for the Sanatoria of a Glasgow Bible class; £50 of a frequent worshipper in the church; £10 for the Homes with £5 for the Sanatoria of a Milngavie friend; and 5s. of one who usually sends her contribution through the Council of Social Service, but this time does so direct as she wishes to thank us for "that wonderful report." She tells that "it is always an inspiration to me to read it and to keep each one from year to year to have it ready to show to any one who does not know the uplifting story."

Six legacies, none of which is over £150, have been paid this month, and an old friend has sent £1 intimating that he has made arrangements for the children here to benefit by an investment he has, after he has no further need for it himself. The Thomas Porter Equipment Fund have made a grant of £146 5s. 0d. towards outfits of boys and girls placed in situations during the half-year; and the honorary treasurer has also received two separate gifts of £100, besides the annual contribution of the Scottish National Sabbath School Union, amounting this year to £15 17s. 6d. With unfailing regularity the half-yearly donation of £150 towards the expenses of the Oswald Home has again come to hand, as also £20 with £1 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony from "sympathisers" in Largs.

A Glamorgan friend has forwarded £5 "Hoping God will keep you strong so that you may continue in the good work"; one in Albany, New York, £2 10s., collected from friends in that city; Tweedside, £1, "to help some little one to a holiday," with the wish, "May it be a happy time for all of them"; and a frequent donor, £2, "to make up as I missed sending my usual subscription last month." The postscript of a letter from a generous friend who sends us large quantities of necessaries "in kind," reads, "I enclose a cheque for £10 for the emigration fund and £10 to help to defray the summer holidays for the girls and boys and staff. I am afraid we will want good homes for many of our people overseas as we seem to have more just now than we can carry."

Seventeen shillings and sixpence has been "collected in threepennies" by a Whiteinch helper. £1 is "just a little mite towards the holiday fund" from a former "mother" of the village; 20s., a birthday thank-offering; and £3 7s., money collected by a party of very interested visitors. Another visitor writes, "The memory of that inspiring visit on Wednesday is still vivid with me. May I thank you again for the privilege of joining in that impressive and touching service with your big family at the Homes. It was a real experience. I enclose a small offering for the funds and intend in future to give an annual subscription to the Homes." A lady who brought a number of young girls to a recent Sunday service says, "We did enjoy the Sunday morning service with you all. It was a treat looking down on all the bright little faces, and what struck us was the happy look of all your young folks." Many of our helpers have never yet been within our gates. We wish it were possible for them all to come, and can assure them of a hearty welcome. No amount of reading or of hearing about the work seems to convey an adequate idea of what great things the Lord hath done for this village of His own creating and sustaining, for often have the Queen of Sheba's words—"the half was not told me"—been repeated by friends on their first visit to the Homes. Nor is any sight in the village comparable with looking upon the great family assembled in the church at the Wednesday or Sunday services, which are always open to visitors.

Last visiting day for the children's friends, their sister came to see two girls lately admitted to the Homes. Because "they seem to be in the best of health and spirits and have taken very kindly to the change," she has felt impelled to send a donation of £1 to the funds. Enclosing £40, a local friend writes, "My husband and I are sending this cheque as a special thankoffering at this time."

JUNE, 1922.—"You will be thinking I have forgotten you, but not at all. I could never do that," writes one of our girls in Aberfeldy; "I am sure the children will be looking forward to the holidays at the coast. I am sending a 10s. note, a little gift, for what has been done for me. I feel quite at home now. I know all the girls here." Another of our grateful grown-up girls has given 5s. 6d.; two sisters, 10s. 6d.; another 5s.; and still another 15s., enclosed in the following letter:—

Your welcome letter arrived some weeks ago and glad you were all well. The wee folks will soon be on their way to the coast and you will all be as busy as the bees, and may you all be blessed with happy hours and safe journeys. How well off the wee folks are! So many the world over never know the joy of holidays. I was over in C— for two days last week and found J— and J— quite well, only busy "spring cleaning," but will likely be finished now. I've had no word from Canada

since I last wrote you, but still all your bairnies engaged on farms will be busy. It may be rough work but it's healthy, and when blessed with good health we should consider it a great blessing to have plenty to do, and do so willingly. My aunt is lying seriously ill in a Glasgow infirmary. A—— is now sole caretaker of the house, making the meals for the others and doing the housework. They have no daughters. How grateful many of Quarrier's Home boys must feel when they look back and remember how well trained they have all been to household necessities, so that in the hour of need they can take up the duty required and do it as well as any maid, if not better. Please accept the enclosed towards the wee folks once again. I feel it a duty to remember past help. Perhaps others are thinking of having you in their will, but I like to give it as it comes. I keep no account of what I give. I can't tell what I have given you and don't want to. I've an earthly bank, but there is a grander one needs some too.

To help meet the ordinary needs of our big family during the month, the children and teachers of a Sunday school, formerly attended by one of the patients in Elise Hospital, have contributed £2 6s. 9d.; the aunt of a lad sent to Canada two years ago, £1; a sympathiser, 13s.; a lady engaged in similar work in New Zealand, £1; a friend in Cheshire, £10; someone in Strathaven, 10s. for the Colony of Mercy; two visitors from Natal, £25; a friend in Ross-shire, 10s., "a small token of thanksgiving to God for giving me health for my work"; a friend of the work from its early days, £16; readers of the *Life of Faith*, £17 10s.; two Glasgow ladies, £80 for the Homes and £20 for the Sanatoria, their half-yearly gift; and a man in Adelaide, Australia, £1.

One pound is "in memory of a most interesting and enjoyable afternoon" at the Homes; £50 from an old friend now resident in Crieff; £300, the only legacy paid this month; £10, part proceeds of a concert given by a Band of Hope; 5s., a gift left by a visitor at the Smith Home; 10s., money handed to one of our fellow-workers by another visitor; 30s. from a party of Masonic brethren who recently visited the village; £1 "from a grateful widow"; £8 from Worcestershire; £40 from a well-known Glasgow physician; 10s. "for your dear little ones in memory of my dear wife who wished me always to remember you at the Homes"; £2 11s. from friends in Natal; £25 from our frequent helper in Washington, D.C.; 10s. "in memory of my mother's birthday"; £10 from an anonymous donor under post-mark of Lerwick; and £100, with request that a fourth of this sum be used "for sailors and soldiers, or if these are fewer and provided for, then to sick children or emigration as most required." The letter accompanying this last-mentioned gift closes, "wishing you the 'understanding heart' to guide your big family in these difficult days." This friend also desires to be anonymous and quotes 1 Chronicles xxix. 14, "Of Thine own have we given Thee."

All things are Thine; no gifts have we,
Lord of all gifts! to offer Thee;
And hence with grateful hearts to-day,
Thine own before Thy feet we lay.

In weakness and in want we call
On Thee for whom the heavens are small;
Thy glory is Thy children's good,
Thy joy Thy tender Fatherhood.

The school has closed for the long eight weeks' summer vacation; the last day of June, so eagerly anticipated for many weeks, has come around; and over two hundred of our boys, with their fathers and mothers, have been transported by motor, train, and steamer to the seaside homes

safely, in spite of their joy so hilarious as to leave them quite unconscious of dangers by the way.

JULY, 1922.—Two pounds, a memorial birthday gift, is from one of the workers; £5, "in memory of our much-loved daughter and at her request," from a Stranraer couple; £1 from a widow in Mount Vernon in memory of her husband; £5 in memory of another husband whose widow bears testimony that "through all the years of loneliness not one thing has failed of all the promises of Him who is the Father of the Fatherless and the Husband of the widow"; 3s. "from a friend for the children"; £40 from the ladies of a church working party in Hong-Kong; £1 from an old helper at the Colony; £5 from a regular and generous donor in Darlington; £1 from Blairgowrie, accompanied by the expression, "What joy is ours to help in your Homes"; four guineas gathered among girls in a Border hosiery warehouse; and 10s. from one of our own splendid Christian girls near whom her sister has just gone to a situation. She closes a short note regarding the arrangements for meeting her sister with the sentence, "I only wish it was more for all you have done for us."

One of the 1920 Canadian party, who has saved a thousand dollars in that short time, came in to Fairknowe to discuss with our superintendent, during his recent short visit, ways and means for taking up studies at the High School with a view to proceeding to college in preparation for the Christian ministry, which after mature consideration, he has decided is to be his work. In his last letter he passes on this message, "Tell them I am 'playing the game' in life, sportsmanlike. Excelsior!" Another of the same party is already doing well at High School and has in mind medical work on the mission field; whilst a third of our Canadian boys is now at college in training for "Holy orders." Is it not worth while giving such boys a chance to make their own way? We have no doubt about it. This is not ordinary charity. It is a high privilege to be permitted to help.

The following are extracts from letters of boys who went to Canada in 1921 and with the last party respectively:—

I was certainly glad to get a letter from you to-day and I always appreciate a letter from Scotland more than any other. Mr. and Mrs. B—— have often told me about you visiting this part of the country when J—— M—— used to be with them. I go to church every Sunday and I have not missed one service since I came, and I always go to the week-night services. We have a new minister now as the previous one is away up North to be a missionary. I have seen P—— twice and J—— once

since I came, but will try and give them your kind greetings as soon as I can see them. I am so glad that I have two boys so near me now who came out this year. They are D—— and J——. I was at church with J—— on Sunday and I often see D——. I have stopped school since I came here as they want me to work on the farm. My sister keeps me informed of all that happens in the Homes. She is always saying in her letters she just wishes to be out here beside me and I wish the same. There has been a bank put up since you were here last, and I don't suppose you would know the place if you came up here again as it is going to grow right ahead now. I had a visitor the other day, and do you know it was the Government inspector that was with you at Brockville this year, and he told me he was with you for two days.

This is just a lovely spot where I am. I mean to get on in this country and bring good credit and honour to the Orphan Homes as well as myself. I can milk four cows, which is more than I was expected to do for two months yet. Sometimes when I am feeding the cattle I look round and I can remember ever so much about the years past in the Orphan Homes. I am thankful I was able to help out a little by being a monitor. Then I can remember Thursday night meetings with great joy that I was a member of that association which is showing out more plainly in my life than ever. Every Sunday night Mr. W—— and I have great chats about Christian life and what it means.

One of our girls in this country, sending £1 as a token of gratitude, says, "I had made up my mind wherever I went I would do my best to please Miss Quarrier and Mrs. Burges and the others who knew me." One of the boys of the very early days, and his wife, both earnest Christians, have given £10; two sisters visiting the old home, £1; and another girl in a situation in the neighbourhood, 10s.

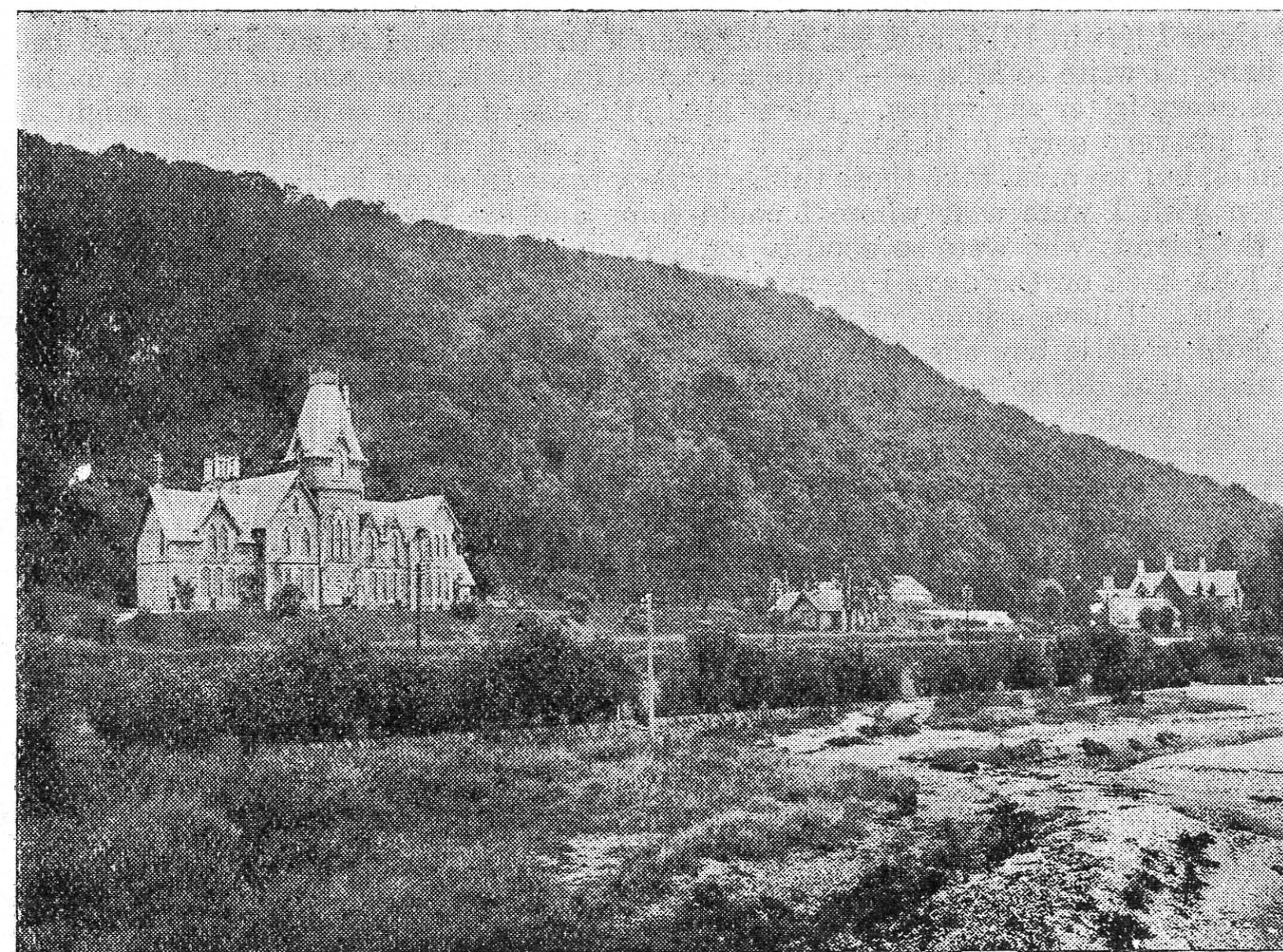
Ten pounds has come to hand from Blackheath; £2 from a Kirkwall man; 2s. from another in the same place; £2 from Bournemouth; £1 from a minister in Torquay; £1 for the Colony of Mercy from two sisters in Newton-Stewart; £5 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria from a city firm with whom we deal; £2 from a party of recent visitors in Clydebank; 10s. 6d. from another in Johnstone; £2 from Hertford; £1 8s. from the country Sunday schools connected with a Thurso church; 10s. for the Homes with 5s. each for the Sanatoria and the Colony from Blackburn; £1 from collections at a Sabbath service in Egypt; £22 14s. from Campbeltown friends; £12 16s. 6d., collected from others in Largs, Fairlie and Manchester; £20 from Leith friends towards the support of the girl whose brother has been referred to as studying for the Anglican church in Canada; £1 from Winnipeg; £3 from Alnwick; and £5 from two friends in Sydney, Australia.

A Paisley donor has sent a cheque for five hundred pounds, "being ten years' subscription"; and five legacies have been paid in during the month, the largest amounting to £500 and the smallest to £20. The last-mentioned is from the estate of an honoured old Christian worker in Glasgow, not wealthy in worldly goods, but rich indeed in Heavenly treasure.

Thirty shillings from Bournemouth is accompanied by the explanation, "In the Providence of our Father we are about to have a bit of a change. He has opened the way for it and it is our desire that we should give back to Him a little He has given to us." Ten shillings is from friends who "are on holiday just now and wish to remember your little ones amidst our own joy"; £1, also for the holiday expenses "from our two daughters who take the greatest delight in laying aside, week by week, a part of their savings for your little ones"; and 16s., "a gift towards the orphans' holiday fund from eight shop assistants." On Friday, the fourteenth of

the month, the first holiday party exchanged places with the remainder of the boys, and a fortnight later these, in turn, gave place to make room for the first contingent of girl holiday-makers at the seaside homes, where the weather has, on the whole, been very favourable most of the time. For the period of the Glasgow Fair the lads from the City Home enjoyed a happy, health-giving sojourn under canvas at Lochranza.

AUGUST, 1922.—One of our former boys in Saskatchewan writes, "Just a few lines to say that we are all well. A little baby girl has come to us. She was born on 18th July, so we now have a boy and a girl to bless our home. Crops are looking good in this district. I have seventy acres of land under water. We had a small cloud-burst last year which filled the hay slough with water, but they are going to drain it and I won't be sorry

when they do. I am sending you thirty dollars for the work. Mrs. A—— and the children are well." Other transatlantic donations include £1 from a friend in Massachusetts; 10 dollars from Saskatoon; 5 dollars from Vancouver; and 15 dollars more from the same city with the encouraging message, "We pray continually for the work of the Homes, that God will continually use them for His glory."

Eight dollars, collected by three children on board a City Line steamer, has been forwarded from Port Said by the purser; and £12 1s., collected on a mail steamer during her last cruise through the Western Highlands, by the company's marine manager at Liverpool. Large sums received during August are £100 "in memory of my mother and elder son"; £25 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; £100 handed in at the City Home; and legacies amounting to £259 10s. 8d., £22 10s., and £73 14s. 6d.

A London donor has sent £2 "to be used, if possible, in connection

with the children's annual holiday"; a lady in Blomfontein, £1; friends in Largs, £10; two others, 10s., for emigration expenses; a distant relative of two little girls recently admitted to the Homes, £1; members of a Bible class in a Lanarkshire town, 20s., a thankoffering for their safe return from a pic-nic; a frequent helper in Arbroath, £1; one in Sussex, 2s. 6d.; two more in London, £1 each; an army general, £5; a Lanarkshire friend, £3 for the Homes, along with £2 for the Colony of Mercy; a lady in London, her contribution in arrears since 1918, "with a little added," amounting to £2 7s.; and two of our own grown-up girls, £1 each.

The following encouraging letter came with a recent Canadian mail from one of the oldest of the last girls' party who left the Homes eight years ago:—

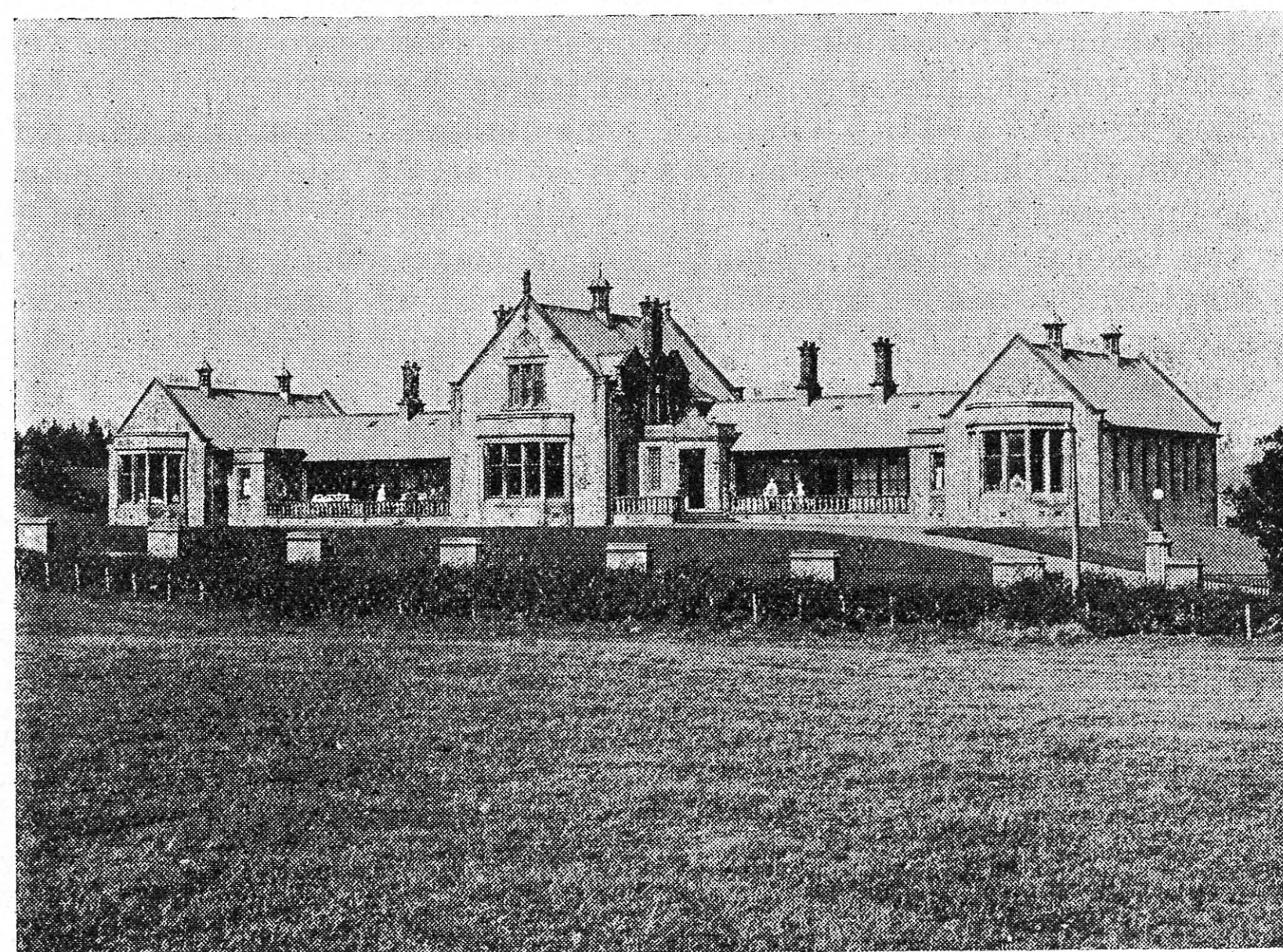
Just a line or two to hope you are all well. I have often thought of you all since I left and have often thought of writing you. I have kept in touch with the Home ever since I left in 1914, and feel it has been a great blessing to me since I have been out here. I write to Miss — quite a lot and feel she is more and more like a mother to me every letter she writes. I hear Mrs. M'Fadzean is not so well as she might be, and I am very sorry to think that a woman as good as she would be laid aside by sickness, but we must take these things as they come from our Father, who knows best. I often wish I were near where I could come and see the Home at Bridge-of-Weir and the friends who were so good to me. I am sure there are a lot of changes now. As I look back on the days I spent at Bridge-of-Weir, I feel they were the best days of my life. I have a home of my own now, having been married five years. I have one child, a little boy aged three years, and how I would love him some day to see the place that did so much for his mother. My husband is a Canadian, having been born and brought up in Kingston. He is a good, steady, hard-working man, and we are very happy. I often meet boys and girls I knew when at the Home, and have met some who were with me in No. —. I have never seen any one from the Home since I came to Kingston, but I saw Mr. Findlay once while I was in O—. I was glad to see him. It made me feel that though I had not done what was right while with you, I was not forgotten. I often think of the good home I had and how kind you all were to me.

On the afternoon of Friday, 25th inst., the last of our big family returned from the coast to be ready for the re-opening of school on the following Monday. What delightful days they have all spent by the sea-side; on their shopping excursions to Innellan or Dunoon; building castles on the shore; or sailing upon the beautiful Firth of Clyde in a big, safe, motor-boat. In later years their memories will still linger fondly over these unforgettable holidays of their childhood. Besides all this, there were the remaining six weeks of the vacation, when most of every day was spent at home in the big play-field, improved with extra tennis courts, or upon the new putting greens laid out in various corners of the village for the older children and the staff. There will be a special reward we feel sure, for the kind friends whose gifts have brought these extra joys into the lives of His little ones. We are deeply indebted to the good friend who, without remuneration of any sort, took charge of the kitchen and cooked such excellent meals for the hungry multitude.

SEPTEMBER, 1922.—Not with any idea of appraising their values, for that can only be done by Him who "looketh upon the heart," but simply because they seem most likely to prove interesting and profitable to our readers, do we make these selections from the donation list month by month. "George's sisters" have again sent £5 towards the support of their own orphan; two friends in Greenock, other £5 "towards your work amongst those who need a parent's care"; "In Christ," a frequent

donor, 7s. 10d.; members of a society who visited the Homes during the month, £2 10s.; some Christian Endeavourers at a holiday home, 21s. 3d.; boys and girls of an Edinburgh church Bible class, 20s.; a helper in Belfast, £2; one in British Columbia, 15 dollars; another in Saskatchewan, a guinea; a very frequent and generous contributor in Washington, D.C., £20; an old friend in Fife, 6s., saying, "I am, at my advanced age, not so able to knit as in former days, but I don't wish to forget you"; and another aged friend with a long-standing interest in the work here, which he has never been privileged to see, though delighted to tell us his daughter and son-in-law have just paid us a visit, 3s.

"Teach us, Lord, how much we owe," who has been a good friend in gift and prayer since the very commencement of the work, writes, "Through the loving-kindness of our Father in Heaven I am able as one of His stewards to forward the enclosed cheque for £150." With six

shillings has come the closing words of the seventy-eighth Psalm, "So He fed them according to the integrity of His heart; and guided them by the skilfulness of His hands." One of our grown-up girls has added 5s. to the treasury, and two others, £2 10s. each, whilst the following letter has come from one of the boys who went to Canada with the party in February:—

I was just saying to Mrs. — on Sunday what a long time it seemed since I had a letter from you and here on Monday was one for me. I was glad to hear you had all had your holidays again. My, on these hot days in August, when I was in the harvest field, I used to wish I was at Torr Aluinn just to have another dive in the water. It is far hotter here than in Scotland. I have worked all summer with only a shirt and overalls on and I come in every day wringing with sweat. I tell you it is no joke following a big six-foot-cut binder. The boss and I have handled sixty acres of oats ourselves, cut it, stooked it, and drew it in. E——'s place is just across a field from

here. He was over helping us to pitch sheaves one day, and he is a capital little worker now. About a week ago the boss was in bed and I had to run things alone, and my, he did think I did well. Next came the threshing. We are now harvesting our Indian corn. Mr. and Mrs. — have bought a lovely big organ for me to play, just because they are fond of music, and the boss and I sit on Sunday nights and sing the old hymns. One night some of the neighbours heard what we were singing and all came over and heard, "When the Roll is called up Yonder," which is our favourite, and all the old choruses we used to sing in No. —. I attend the Methodist Church and play the organ for Sunday school. They wanted me to teach a class, but I did not feel able for it this year. You see there is plenty of opportunity to "let your light shine before men." Oh! if I was just sitting in the play-room for one night again, how many things I would have to ask. However, I will try to follow the motto, "Play the Game," and if I manage that, all will be well.

In commemoration of their jubilee, a local co-operative establishment has contributed £5 to the Homes along with £2 2s. to the Sanatoria. £1 has come from an Edinburgh man and his wife "as a slight indication of our continued interest in the great work you are carrying on—an interest we have always felt since that evening, thirty-two years ago, when we heard from the lips of your revered father the moving history of the Orphan Homes"; £1, "birthday remembrance" from Helensburgh; £2 "from the children's sea-shore services" at a Clyde watering place; £2, to buy roses for the garden at the seaside home; £5, "In Memoriam" for the Colony of Mercy; 20s., "part of some money received from income tax, the rest being sent to another charity"; and £1 10s. "as a thankoffering to the Lord for all His goodness through these trying times, as there has been always something in the barrel, though many are feeling the pinch." Five shillings of this last gift, her father says, is from his little girl, "from money saved instead of being spent on herself."

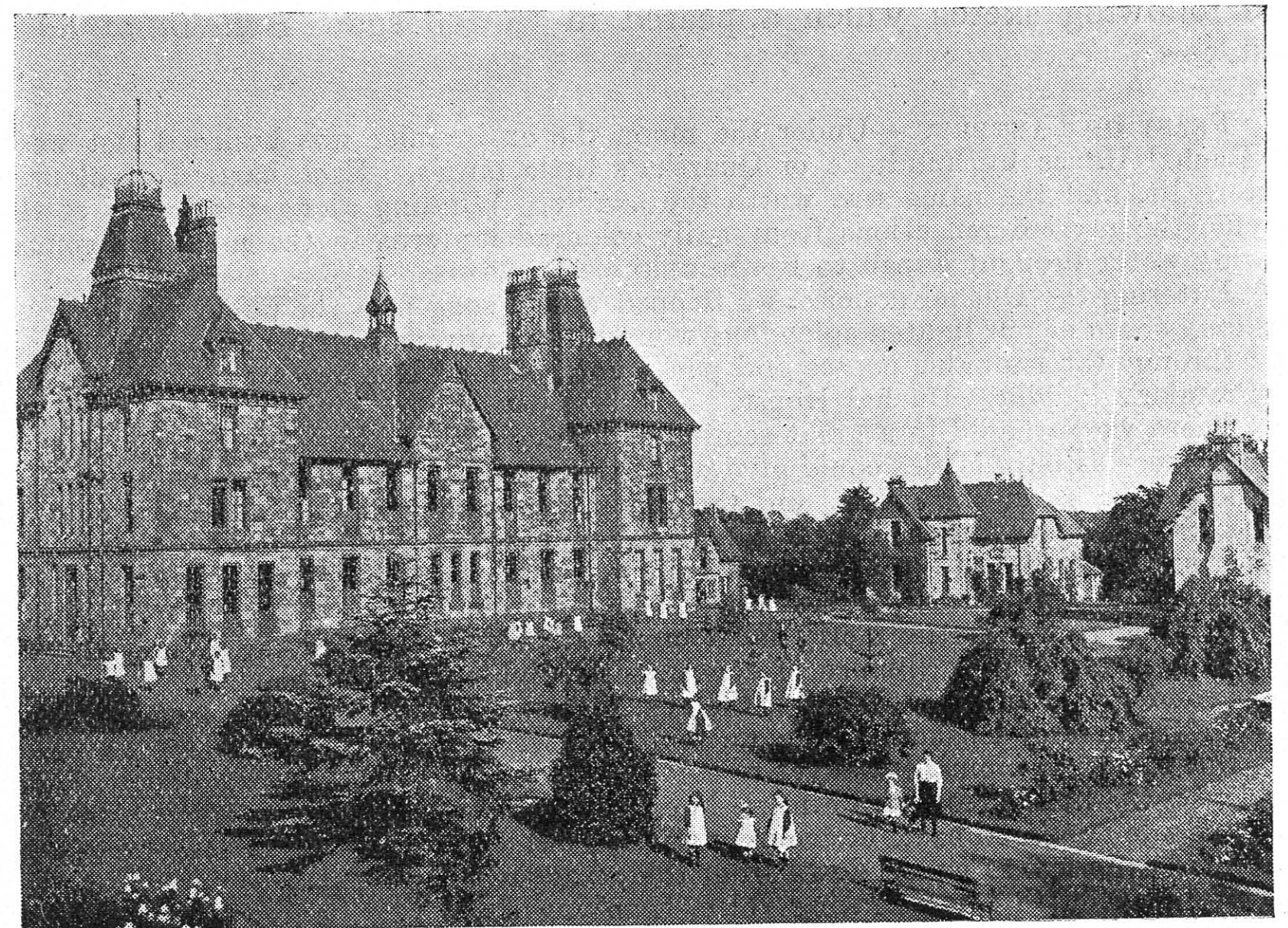
This month's income from legacies, six in number, has amounted to £764 15s. 5d. A cheque from "Two inmates of Kilmacolm Hydropathic," brings the explanation that another institution had "sent an entertainer and collector to Kilmacolm Hydro, and I was asked with another gentleman to subscribe £7 10s. to complete the £100. I do not consider it fair of them to poach in your backyard, so I said to the gentleman that if he gave me his £7 10s. I would give a like sum and forward it to you."

The month of September holds two red-letter days for us. The seventeenth is the forty-fourth anniversary of the opening of the first three buildings in the Orphan Homes of Scotland; and the twenty-ninth is the ninety-third anniversary of the beloved Founder's birth. To mark this day there have come quite a number of "gifts of remembrance," chiefly from members of the staff, to whom the dear father and mother of the Orphan Homes were known personally, and whose privilege it was to be their co-workers. Next year at this time we hope (D.V.) again to hold our usual biennial Thanksgiving Day, to which celebration we heartily invite all our friends old and new, but especially those who have never yet been able for themselves to see this miracle of the Lord's Providence for the orphan children of Scotland.

OCTOBER, 1922.—"Our visit to Bridge-of-Weir has been a most inspiring memory, and we feel so thankful to have had the privilege of seeing that great monument to the Lord's goodness and mercy," is the testimony of friends, lately gone to New Zealand, who further encourage us by saying, "Your noble work at the Homes has been much on our hearts and we do not forget to remember it and you in prayer." A

Morayshire Sunday school teacher writes, "I pray for you every night," and another friend in Somerset is "praying daily for God's blessing on your work." So these and many others "helping together by prayer for us" are bringing it to pass, as a Maybole donor reminds us, that our "labour is not in vain in the Lord."

Whereof one of the proofs is to be found in the numerous members of our scattered family, who are not unmindful to return and give thanks for the care bestowed upon them here. Among this month's gifts are 5s. 6d. from one of the girls; 10s. from another; 5s. from a third; 10s. from a fourth; £1 from a missionary in India; £6 8s. 7d., the contents of a box in a Glasgow warehouse; £5 from an aged and valued worker; £2 13s., "God's tenth," from Lockerbie; £60, a grant from trustees of a bequest fund; 15s. from a lady in Penrith; £6 and £4 16s. 2d., collections

at Harvest Thanksgiving services at Gartcosh and Lockerbie respectively; £10, "in aid of the branch of the Homes which sends out boys and girls to Canada and starts them in a career there"; and 10s. from the preacher on a recent Sunday.

"This will be the last of our united efforts as my dear work has come to an end" writes an old helper in Errol; and another in Orkney enclosing £5, "I was thinking to leave it to be sent to you after my death, but God has told me to send it now and trust Him for the future." Another old friend in Arbroath who does not "expect to be here very many years now as I am eighty-two years old" has felt "constrained to send enclosed £1 as a thankoffering to our Almighty Father for great mercies received." A lady in Ardrossan has made request that her donation of five pounds be used for behoof of the Jehovah-Jireh Home,

and has been informed that the money will be used to pay for the slippers shortly being issued to the boys of that cottage in common with the rest of the children in the village.

Funds have permitted of the purchase of a case of apples for each household, and a city firm of grocers have forwarded three large sacks of Barcelona nuts to help the Hallowe'en festivities, which, however, owing to the unexpected turn in political affairs, took an unusual form. Parties were held and "guisers" abroad as originally planned on Saturday, but instead of the procession through our own grounds, timed for Monday evening, some six hundred of the older children, with most of the staff, made a pilgrimage with their lighted Japanese lanterns along the private path between the Homes and Duchal House to bid welcome to our honorary treasurer's guest, the ex-Premier, Mr. Lloyd George. It was an occasion those present are not likely to forget, as may be gathered from the following sketch which appeared in the *Glasgow Bulletin* of 30th inst. :—

FEAST OF LANTERNS.—Under the moon the ex-Premier was besieged last week at Duchal House by hundreds of Quarrier's little fairies. Each carried a coloured lantern lit, and the game was worth the candle. Winding along the banks of the Gryffe, the myriad reflections from gaily coloured lanterns in the mirror of gentle-flowing water brought Japan to Renfrewshire.

Entering the Duchal policies, we tripped with a song past the noble beeches, and the long chain of our lighted splendour wound its wondrous way over wooden bridges and through interminable copses and parks until at long last we saw the light of the ex-Premier's lodging—Duchal House.

There we gathered in a great semi-circle, three and four lanterns deep, and gave such a cheer as only fairies could give with good lungs. The entrance to the house is at the top of ascending stairs, and the remarkable concentration of multi-coloured lights, including the moon's pale contribution, gave the ladies there gathered the proper setting to preside in Fairy-land. To our dazzled eyes they all seemed to have golden hair and golden slippers, good to behold.

Looking round at the merry faces of my little fellow-fairies, with their shining eyes, the surrounding brilliance of concentrated lights, the tall black trees shooting up beyond the moon, the shadows, the rustling leaves tinkling to our feet, the keen air—is it a dream, I asked, or are we really fairies?

But the great moment was yet to come. There was a bustle at the door. Then, suddenly, the little great man himself burst upon the scene. With a small black felt hat and a big collared coat, he looked no fairy, but with one voice we sent up a shout that made the leaves tinkle down from the great trees.

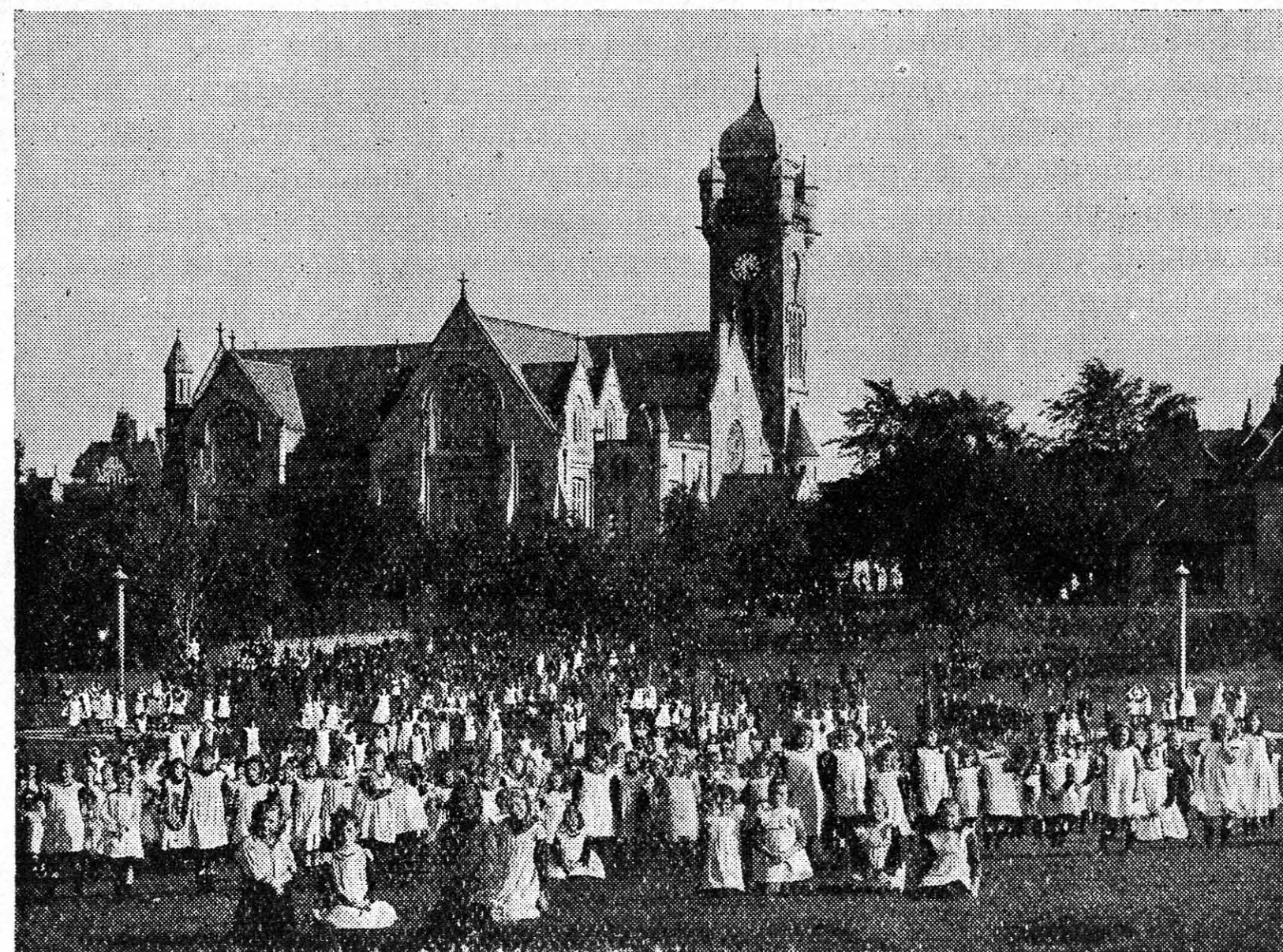
He spoke with a penetrating voice, thanking those who had so kindly thought out such a pretty scene, and us for our children's voices, which would cheer him for the fight. Bowing and lifting his hat, he was gone.

Golden slippers then came tripping down the stairs, and all of us got something good that human fairies like; and so back to the Homes again, richer by a golden memory.

Our copy of the above was sent by the author, a near neighbour, with a beautiful note which deserves to be printed in letters of gold and reads thus, "My conscience smote me that I, an uninvited guest, should go a pilgrimage with your children, but I was on the King's highway at the time and was *compelled* to come in. The joy of that journey gave me a hint of that great day when we shall go forward towards our dear Father's home—happy as little children."

Shortly after noon on Saturday, on their way to the great meeting in the city, Mr. Lloyd George and his host drove through our village between rows of cheering youngsters, all eager to catch another glimpse of him and do him honour by waving their flags. On Monday evening

we were also highly favoured by hearing Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell of Labrador tell his thrilling story of missionary adventure, which he illustrated with lantern slides and motion pictures. Without his making any appeal for help, our community has since sent him a cheque for twenty-eight pounds three shillings to further his Christ-like work, which stirred all our hearts so deeply.

EMIGRATION WORK.

I BEG to submit a report on our work at Fairknowe for the past year.

The longer we are engaged in this work for "His little ones," the more we are impressed with the fact that ours is a glorious privilege, pregnant with opportunities to magnify God and help others. I do not mean to say that our life is such as would keep us continually in the "mountain top" experience, for it is only as we keep our eye on Him and above the grind of our daily routine that we get the right perspective. Our day's work is too much concerned with "things" to be conducive, in itself, to spiritual ecstasy. Daily we are involved in the adjustment of wages, the settlement of accounts, the hearing and meeting of complaints concerning the human frailties of employed and employer, the reading and writing of letters, the jolting over concession roads, and the care of house and grounds—the very things with which our neighbours are engrossed. But our life, which otherwise would be often very grey and unattractive, really is most satisfying because it is brightened by the thought of "service for others."

Moreover, we have been long enough (in our fourteenth year) in this work to have results coming constantly before us which are most encouraging. Frequently we have calling at our office old boys and girls, with whom as children we dealt, who are now filling positions of trust and responsibility in our Canadian life. It is not an uncommon occurrence to find them farmers on their own farms or wives of prosperous farmers. In fact, two boys of our 1922 party went to farmers who a few years previously passed through our doors. It is but recently that I was entertained in the home of one of our preacher boys who is stationed in one of our smaller cities, and a month ago one of our 1916 lads, who has but two more years of study in a divinity college, spent a day with us. A girl who came to Canada in 1910 has been teaching school for a few years and is now taking her B.A. course, and several girls are graduate nurses or nurses in training. Such cases, together with the greater number who have made successes of their lives in the humbler walks of life, are the causes of satisfaction and joy in this service that come to us when we lift our eyes above the "things" of the daily round of duty.

The party of boys which came to us last spring was gladly received. Many were disappointed that they could not be given a boy. It is also a disappointment to many that we cannot supply them with girls. With very few exceptions our girls have come to an age when they are free to arrange for themselves. Both boys and girls are likely to be increasingly in demand in the future.

It has been our privilege to do the "visiting" of our children, to inspect the conditions under which they are living. I may say it has been a real joy to find so many in such comfortable and suitable homes, and particularly to find such mutual satisfaction. We have often visited a whole day when not a complaint on either side would be recorded. The type of home now available for our children is of a high order; every home comfort is assured and due consideration of the child is characteristic.

In conclusion, Mrs. Winters and I are indebted to an efficient and faithful staff which has helped to make our work a happy one; to Dr. E. Harding, who has given of his time and services, and to many other friends of the work who have shown a practical and sympathetic interest.

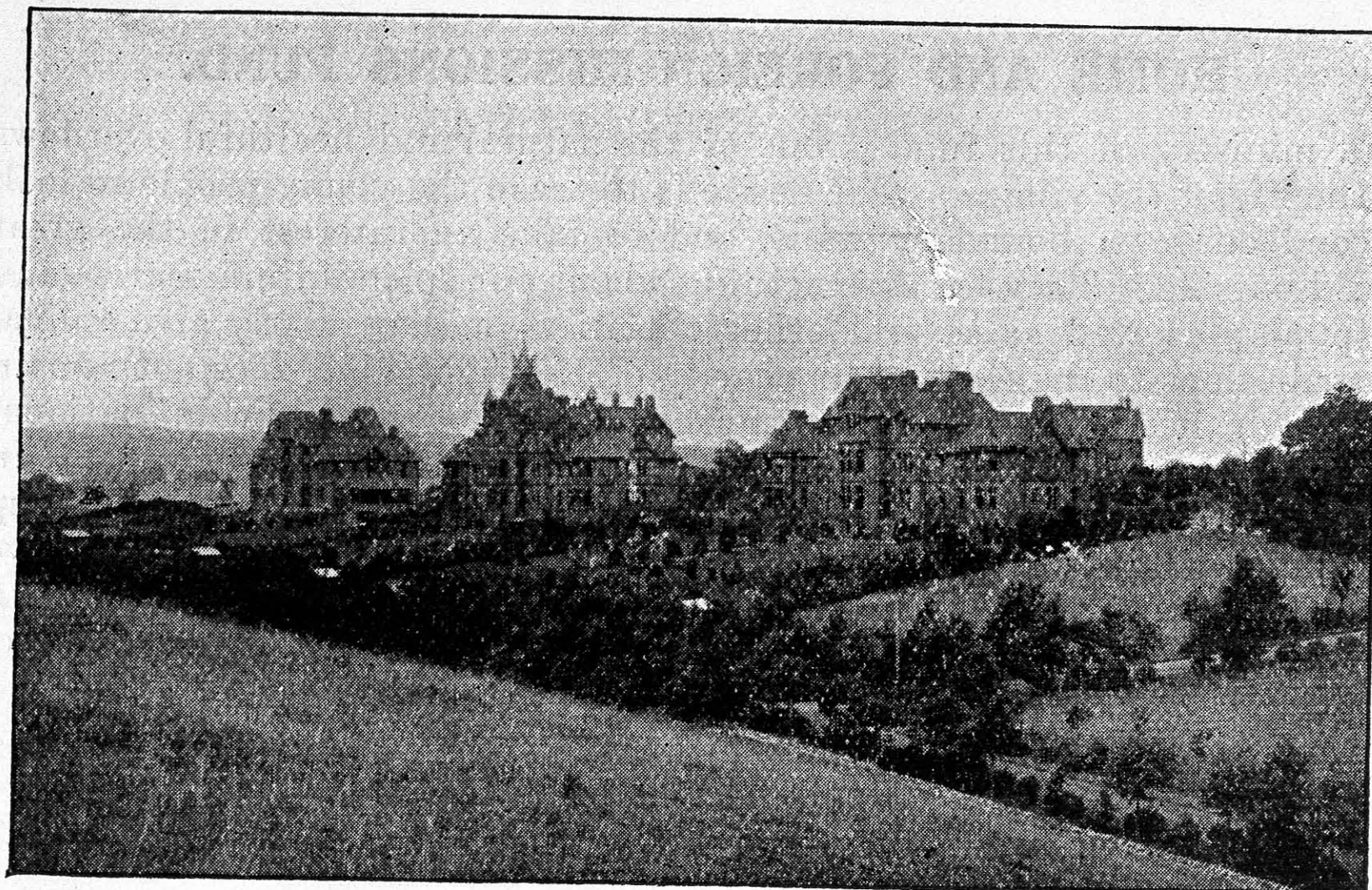

The income has been practically stationary for some years—amounting to just over £1,400. If we were to be entrusted with much larger funds these could be used wisely and well for the extension of the Kingdom, and for the hastening of the Coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, whom we delight to make known.

At present, "Our Own Missionaries" are Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert Nairn, Marraksh, Mr. and Mrs. James H. Haldane, Pernambuco, and Mr. and Mrs. John Ritchie, Lima. All these have been kept in good health throughout the past year, and have had considerable encouragement in their faithful labours for the spiritual welfare of the people amongst whom they live. Mr. Haldane's latest letter tells of an interesting journey into the heart of Brazil, when he saw many fruits from the sowing of the Word of God amongst the people. Mr. Ritchie, who is specially gifted as author and editor, as well as teacher and preacher, makes extensive use of the free carriage of the printed page, to scatter gospel literature widely in the priest-ridden republics of South America; and this with excellent and cheering results. Mr. Nairn—whose Medical Mission usually brings him an audience of over a hundred each morning—has also fine opportunities, of which he and his co-workers take full advantage.

IN the Consumption Sanatoria during the past year, we have dealt with fewer patients than in previous years. The reason for this has not been a lessened demand for beds or a reduction in the accommodation. At no time has there been a greater number desirous of admission, and so far from the number of beds being reduced, new outdoor shelters have been erected, enabling us to deal with more men than previously. We have now accommodation for 72 men, 67 women, and 22 girls. 194 patients were discharged during the year—99 males and 95 females. The reason for this comparatively small number was the relatively long periods of residence, the average being 277.3 days. Tuberculosis is a peculiar disease in many ways. The type most commonly met with by us has a long incubation period. Many months, frequently several years, elapse between the implantation of the causative organism and the development of signs and symptoms calling for radical remedial measures. In the absence of a specific remedy with miraculous qualities, long periods of treatment are required if satisfactory and lasting results are to accrue. Arrest or cure is produced usually, not merely by the tubercle bacillus being destroyed, but by nature building a strong wall around the diseased area, shutting it off from the healthy part. The building up of such a wall, to be effective, takes time, and the permanence of a cure depends

largely on its stability and thickness. It is much better and more economical to deal with a few patients thoroughly than to treat a large number unsatisfactorily.

The type of case admitted to the Sanatoria during the year has, as previously, been chiefly the pulmonary form of the disease. 177 out of the 194 patients suffered from phthisis. There were nine cases of bone and joint tuberculosis, and seven cases of abdominal tuberculosis. These, on the whole, did well. Conservative measures alone were practised, and fourteen of that number left the institution restored. Two cases were sent into the Sanatoria in error. They did not suffer from tuberculosis. One had a neoplasm of the lung, and the other suffered from pernicious anaemia.

Regarding the 177 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis which were treated and discharged, many interesting facts were recorded. The lack of space makes it impossible to note more than a few.

Our patients were chiefly adults. Only 17, or 9.6 per cent. were below the age of 16. The majority, 102, or 57.5 per cent., were from 16 to 30 years of age.

These figures are characteristic of the disease from the earliest historical times. Records given by numerous workers since the day of Hippocrates all show that adolescence and early manhood or womanhood are the periods when this condition chiefly manifests itself and makes its greatest claims. 61 out of the 158 adults were married. Our patients were drawn from every class. Iron workers predominated amongst the males as may be expected in a Sanatorium in the Clyde area, and house workers have predominated amongst the females. Farmers, commercial travellers, chemists, evangelists, teachers, nurses, secretarial workers, were also represented. So varied were the occupations that it is impossible from the list compiled to draw any conclusion other than that the disease can affect any worker—outdoor or indoor. Occupation may be of etiological significance. Dusty and sedentary work certainly predisposes to, outdoor and active labour does not protect against, tuberculosis.

On admission to the Sanatoria, only 13 per cent. of the cases had the disease in an early stage. In 47.4 per cent. the disease was advanced, and in 39.5 per cent. the disease was in an intermediate stage.

The purpose of the institution is to deal with early or curable cases of the disease. These terms, of course, are not synonymous. No case ever is so early that one can without equivocation say that it will certainly be cured. Many factors influence the ultimate results. One has little

hesitation, however, in affirming the fact that there is greater hope for the early patient, and much greater good would be done if the majority of cases were sent in at an early stage of the disease. Unfortunately, phthisis is often not suspected until the condition is advanced. It cannot be too strongly emphasised that the first indications of tuberculosis of the lungs are usually not local and pulmonary in character, but general and referable to no one system. Lethargia, loss of weight, want of appetite, indigestion, anaemia, laryngitis, were the most common indications complained of at the beginning by patients admitted. Every individual suffering from such symptoms, and that in spite of remedial measures, should be examined in order to exclude this disease. To wait for tubercle bacilli to appear in the sputum, to wait until physical signs are obvious, frequently means that one waits until it is too late, until the disease is irremediably advanced. A family history of tuberculosis was elicited in 46.8 per cent. of the patients.

In only 20 per cent. of the cases was it present in the parents. Heredity therefore obviously plays but a small part in the production of the disease at the present day. Even in that 20 per cent. referred to, there is little doubt that if anything, the opportunity for repeated massive infection was the most important factor in the causation of the condition.

As a result of treatment, 70.5 per cent. of the patients were definitely benefited. 35.5 per cent. had the disease apparently arrested. 35 per cent. were improved, and 25.9 per cent. were either no better or were worse. Six patients died while in residence. The figures relative to this stage of the disease on admission are interesting and instructive.

If all the cases had been in an early or even an intermediate stage on admission, there is no doubt the results would have been very excellent indeed. Only eight out of 93 such patients were not improved. 56.9 per cent. had the disease arrested. Sanatorium treatment is undoubtedly the best thing for tuberculosis in the present state of our knowledge. It does benefit the great majority of those who receive it. It can cure a large percentage of those who are not too far gone.

The therapeutic measures adopted during the year have not varied greatly from recent years. We have relied largely on graduated rest and exercise, with hyperaeration and hyperalimentation. If anything, more stress has been laid on prolonged rest, particularly at the beginning of treatment. By it the toxæmia is controlled, and excessive auto-inoculations are prevented. If there be a sufficiently prolonged preliminary period of rest, progress is generally more definite, more rapid, and less interrupted later.

Tuberculin has been used on a large number of patients. This has been given locally, hypodermically, and by mouth. While itself, it could not be said to cure, it definitely benefited 83 per cent. of those who received it.

Artificial pneumothorax was attempted on a large number of patients. In several instances, as in previous years, the results were strikingly good.

Many new drugs have been tried. None has proved such a specific for tuberculosis as quinine is for malaria, or antitoxin for diphtheria. Several have proved of real value, and helped definitely in combating troublesome symptoms, and those have been added to our armamentarium.

During the year three courses of lectures on tuberculosis were given to final year University students. The teaching given is obviously being appreciated. Although not a compulsory course, men and women students have attended in greater numbers even than in previous years. The practical insight obtained into the subject cannot fail to do good indirectly in leading to the disease being diagnosed at an earlier stage, and more rational methods being adopted for its eradication when discovered. One post-graduate course was held in the late summer and attended by several doctors. A series of lectures is given at the University in connection with the course of teaching, each session, and practical experience in diagnosis is obtained at the Dispensary in connection with the institution at 13 James Morrison Street, Glasgow, as well as at the Sanatoria.

At the close of the year we have 159 patients in residence—71 males and 88 females. These patients all belong to Scotland. 59 per cent. of them come from Glasgow. The remainder are drawn from other parts of the country, and come from as far north as Shetland, and as far south as Kirkcudbright.

The work is encouraging and has been exceedingly interesting and enjoyable to all who have part in it. It has been a pleasure to note the increasing co-operation on the part of the patients. The majority have taken an intelligent interest in every phase of the work, and have done not a little to make it easy.

A loyal and consistently faithful staff of workers, matron, doctors, sisters, nurses, and maids have carried on without a hitch throughout the year. They are deserving of thanks and praise. To them the credit of any success achieved is due.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

THE work at the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics during the past year has proceeded smoothly. There has been no deviation from the normal course, and no increase in any way to the accommodation, although the demand has been insistent as usual.

When the year opened, there were 103 patients in residence—50 men, 27 women, 18 boys, and 8 girls. 47 patients were admitted and 45 were discharged, and 3 patients died from epilepsy. At the end of the year there were 102 patients in residence—48 men, 25 women, 21 boys, and 8 girls.

An impression of the character of the work may be gained by extracts from the reports of the medical members of the Board of Control, who visited the institution officially during the year :—

17th December, 1921.—“All patients were seen. They were in good general health, clean, neatly dressed, and appeared to be bright and happy. All the patients are suitably and usefully occupied, those too old for school doing either housework or garden work. The medical and general care, which has been so frequently favourably commented on, continues to be admirable.”—KATE FRASER, M.D.

5th May, 1922.—“The patients were found in good health, and no unusual incident has occurred.

An excellent dinner was seen being partaken of, and the material welfare of the patients receives all the attention that could be desired.

The patients live under conditions which resemble ideal home conditions, and their contentment and happiness—which were very noticeable—are the consequence of such surroundings.

The medical care of the patients is of an excellent description.”—H. C. MARR, M.D.

24th October, 1922.—“The general health of the inmates is good; the provision made for their welfare is in every respect admirable, and their treatment is of the most skilful and enlightened description.”—JAMES C. STURROCK, M.D.

Epilepsy is a difficult disease to handle. The patients are frequently on the borderline of insanity. During the year a few patients required to be certified and removed to mental hospitals. It does not yield readily to any method, although we are occasionally encouraged by seeing remedies used proving effectual. A few patients have been discharged as cured, their fits having been arrested for periods of at least three years. Much credit is due to the matrons, nurses, and attendants for patient and tactful care in the carrying on of the work. Although the good results may appear few, and there is but little encouragement, the benefit that is being conferred is more widespread than is apparent. The strain and worry of the presence of an epileptic member in a family makes life often trying and impossible to other members. When homeless the position is worse. Unable to work or to obtain work, there is little else open than the wards of a mental hospital or a poorhouse. This is still the only Colony for Epileptics in Scotland, and in sheltering patients as it does, it confers benefits on a wide circle.

Opportunities afforded to investigate the cause, and of ascertaining the value of remedies of this condition are taken. Each patient is prescribed for individually, and the results recorded. It is interesting to note different effects of certain remedies on different patients. With one recently investigated, some by it have had the disease arrested apparently. Others by it have been made worse and rendered temporarily insane. Others, on the other hand, have been uninfluenced, although large doses have been given.

Increasing experience of epilepsy points to it not being a definite disease, but, like asthma, a symptom—a symptom probably produced by various toxins or by irritation, traumatic or pathological.

Much could be achieved if a careful and thorough investigation were made with a large series of cases. Such research work would involve much expense, both of time and of money. As an investment in the interest of the nation, it could however be expected in time to yield rich returns. This Colony could be used as a basis or centre for such work.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1921, there were resident in the Homes 1,074 boys and girls. During the year 203 new cases were admitted, making a total of 1,277 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows:—Outfitted and sent to Canada, 46; domestic service, trades, and situations 40; deaths, 4; children under 5 years of age adopted, 9; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 75; left to go to relatives, etc., 12; sent to other institutions, 4; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1922, 1,087; of whom 601 are boys and 486 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 95 boys and girls were provided with outfits, given a start in life, and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, or sent to farms. Most of those returned to relatives were the children of soldiers, who, on being demobilised, were able to take charge of their families again. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND.—The year began with 159 patients in residence. 194 were admitted, 186 discharged, and 8 died, leaving 159 in residence on 31st October, 1922.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.—The year began with 103 colonists in residence; 47 were admitted and 45 were discharged; 3 patients died during the year, leaving 102 in residence on 31st October, 1922.

THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year is as follows:—For the General Fund, which includes the maintenance of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home, including £1,329 12s. 3d. earned by working boys, and sundry amounts as per Cash Statement, £43,826 10s. 11½d.; for Consumption Sanatoria, £22,092 0s. 3d.; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £6,077 6s. 6d.; for Home and Foreign Missions Fund, £1,424 1s. 8d.; making the total amount for all purposes, £73,419 19s. 4½d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to our devoted fellow-helpers in the various Homes, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country; to ministers, evangelists, and all who have aided in the Church services and other gatherings; to Sabbath School superintendents, teachers, and scholars; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones; to the Press which has given notices of the work; to the members of the Medical Advisory Board, and the Doctors who have freely given their time and skill for the benefit of the sufferers in the Sanatoria and Hospitals; and to the accountants, Messrs. M'Farlane, Hutton & Patrick, who very kindly act as Honorary Auditors.

IN CONCLUSION.

THE conclusion of the whole matter is simply this, that the God of Elijah is the same to-day—indeed “the same yesterday, and to-day, and for ever.” His promises are absolutely reliable—ininitely better than any bank account or human promises. He never fails those who humbly trust Him and seek His Kingdom first. He never sends anyone a warfare at his own charges. He always provides for the commissariat of those who are doing His work in His way. “Them that honour Me I will honour,” and our conviction is that the founders of the work at Bridge-of-Weir so honoured God that He continues to honour their faith by supplying all the needs of the great family of dependent ones who have been brought together here. We refer our readers to the Cash Statements to see how wonderfully in a year of bad trade, worklessness, and intense poverty Our Father has provided for all our needs.

So far as we know the new year on which we have entered is likely to call for:—

£40,000 for maintenance of Orphan Children in Glasgow and at Bridge-of-Weir.

£2,500 for Emigration and maintenance of the Canadian Home.

Gifts towards maintenance of Consumption Sanatoria.

Gifts towards maintenance of Colony of Mercy.

Christmas-Tree Gifts for 1,100 boys and girls at Bridge-of-Weir. Required early in December.

£2,000 for Home and Foreign Missions Fund.

Consecrated Christian men and women to fill vacancies as they occur for “fathers and mothers” in the cottages.

The letters and gifts which reach us almost daily from every part of the Empire on which the sun never sets—and from many parts of the world where the people do not live under the Union Jack—give us constant cause for thanksgiving and cheer. Will the thousands of our scattered friends accept the warm greetings and thanks which this page is intended to convey to them—and will they, above all things, continue to give us a real and regular place in their prayers?

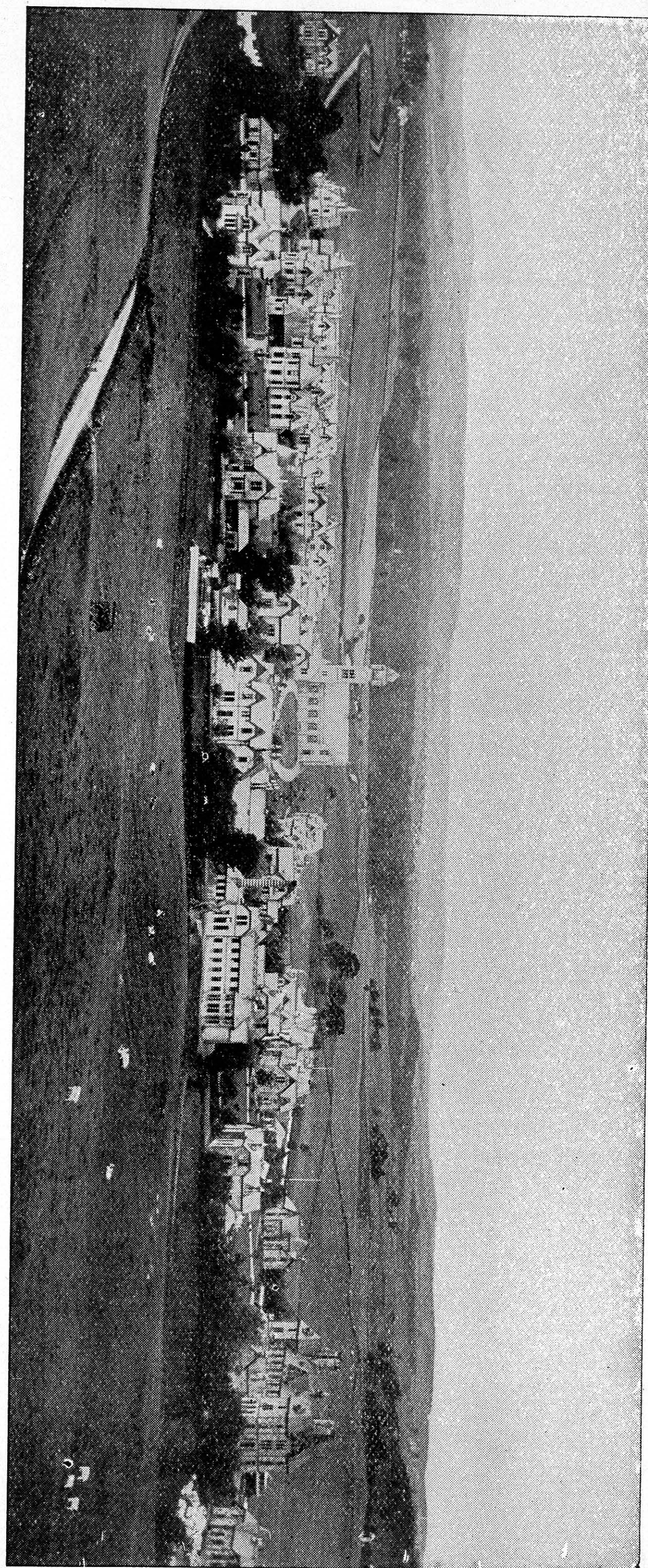
